



HAPPY FIRST ANNIVERSARY, PARISH FAMILY!

As we mark the first anniversary of our Parish Family, we give thanks for all that God has done in and through our three parishes.

We're also so grateful for all the ways you've shown support, stepped up to serve, and helped build something truly special across our three parishes.

Together, we've built stronger relationships, unified our efforts, and started some great things that are already making a difference.

Below is a snapshot of what we've accomplished in our first year as one Parish Family. Thanks to your continued support and openness to the Holy Spirit's work among us!

1. Strong Foundation for Parish Family Integration

- **Early and consistent collaboration** among the three PAAs, the School Principals, and Fr. Parrish to support a smooth and coordinated transition into one unified Parish Family.
- **Updated Mass schedules** to better serve the unified Parish Family and increase overall attendance and participation.
- Fr. Parrish's **purposeful meetings with parish staff** to build early rapport and gain a better understanding of each parish's current realities.
- **Shared calendar for the Pastor and Parish Family** to support better coordination, minimize scheduling conflicts, and improve overall planning across all parish activities.
- **Community dinners with the key leaders of parish ministries**, allowing parish leadership and commission members to get to know one another and align more closely on Parish Family priorities.
- Strengthened community bonds and sense of belonging among parishioners from all three parishes through the **first Parish Family Picnic**.

2. Unified Efforts Across Parishes

- **Unified faith formation programs** to strengthen collaboration among the parishes and ensure a more consistent and supportive formation experience.
 - **Combined OCIA** for the three parishes
 - **Combined Youth Confirmation** for St. Alphonsus and St. Benedict
 - **A special group baptism** for students, friends, and family members in October
- Spiritual renewal and strengthened team connection among the Parish Family office staff through a **Staff Retreat led by Fr. Parrish**.
- **A single, streamlined communications approach** to ensure clear messaging, reduce duplication, and keep everyone informed and connected.
 - **One bulletin** which has the consolidated calendar, Pastoral letter, and Parish Family events, updates, and highlights
 - New Parish Family **Facebook and Instagram pages**
 - **Uniform mass announcements** after the final blessing
 - **Created a Design Commission** to establish branding for the Parish Family
- **Collaborative liturgical planning, execution, and evaluation** to enhance liturgical experience and strengthen sense of community.
 - **Combined choir** of St. Alphonsus and St. Benedict
 - **Unified celebration of holy seasons** such as combined Advent program, shared Lenten devotions across the parishes (Stations of the Cross and community dinners at one parish every week), and single Triduum and Pentecost Vigil
 - **Collaborative planning, joint debriefings, and sharing of liturgical ministries** such as sacristans, altar servers, lectors, and Eucharistic ministers

3. Strengthened Leadership and Collaboration

- **Hired new members of the Parish Leadership Team (PLT)** – Directors of Parish Operations and Communications to support the evolving needs of the unified Parish Family.
- **Weekly meetings of the PAAs and the PLT** to enhance communication and ensure consistent leadership across all three parishes.
- **Regular consultative meetings with Archdiocesan Liaison** Steve Donaldson to keep the alignment with archdiocesan vision and best practices.
- **Reconvened Pastoral and Finance Councils with harmonized meeting schedules** to foster greater collaboration and shared decision-making.
- **Established Parish Family Pastoral Leadership Council**, the Pastor's advisory group, to guide the long-term vision and support unified pastoral leadership throughout the Partners in the Gospel initiative.


Order of Christian Initiation for Adults Adapted for Children (OCIAAC)

FAITH IN FOCUS



Eucharistic Processions

THE BODY of Christ under the form of bread may be carried in solemn procession through public streets. The practice, more frequent in past generations and among certain ethnic groups, is still encouraged.

A Eucharistic procession forms after Mass or after a period of adoration. It is especially appropriate on the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ. Usually a priest places a large, unbroken, consecrated host inside a glass protector called a lunette. He then inserts the lunette into a monstrance. A monstrance is a beautifully crafted vessel that draws attention to the host.

The priest, vested for Mass or wearing a white cope, holds the monstrance aloft. Ministers carrying candles and incense join him. Additional ministers may carry a canopy above the priest and the monstrance. The faithful join the procession, singing hymns and offering prayers as they walk.

The procession may pause at stations decorated for the occasion, where the priest blesses the faithful with the monstrance. Ideally, the procession begins at one church and ends at another, where the priest gives a final benediction and reposes the Blessed Sacrament in the tabernacle. Alternatively, the procession may return to the church from which it began.

Eucharistic processions evangelize the civic community, as Catholics witness to their faith.

Throughout the twentieth century, the faithful began sharing communion at Mass more frequently than they did before, and many Eucharistic devotions faded. The main reason Jesus gave his body and blood was for us to take, eat, and drink. Although some Eucharistic devotions are rarely seen, it is more important to see the faithful sharing communion at Mass.



SAINT OF THE MONTH

Saint Veronica

Feast Day: July 12

Patron Saint of laundry workers and photographers

We hear the story of Veronica when we pray the Stations of the Cross. At the Sixth Station, Jesus stopped to allow Veronica to wipe the blood, sweat, and dirt from his face. This simple act of kindness is all we know about Veronica, a woman in Jerusalem. She is not mentioned in the Gospels, but Jesus' followers must have shared the story of her loving care for the Lord so often that it has become part of our tradition.



It is believed that Veronica used her veil to wipe Jesus' face. Afterward, the image of Jesus' face was imprinted on the cloth. Veronica's veil is a treasured Church relic, an object of personal or religious importance. According to legend, Veronica later touched Emperor Tiberius with the veil and he was cured of an illness. The veil has been preserved, or safeguarded, in St. Peter's Basilica in Rome since the eighth century.

We do not know if Veronica was a follower of Jesus before the day he was crucified or if she became a Christian because she was a witness to Jesus' suffering. We do know that Veronica responded to Christ on that first Good Friday by reaching out to comfort him.

The Church honors Veronica as a saint. We can imitate her loving and caring actions by doing all we can to help people who are hurting.

FEAST OF ST. BENEDICT, ABBOT - JULY 11




c. 480–c. 547

Patron Saint of Europe, monks and religious orders, architects, dying people, cave explorers, schoolchildren, agricultural workers, civil engineers, and coppersmiths
Invoked against erysipelas, fever, gallstones, inflammatory diseases, kidney disease, nettle rash, poison, temptations, and witchcraft

Canonized by Pope Honorius III in 1220

Declared Patron Saint of Europe by Pope Paul VI in 1964

Liturgical Color: White



“Hearken continually within thine heart, O son, giving attentive ear to the precepts of thy master. Understand with willing mind and effectually fulfill thy holy father’s admonition; that thou mayest return, by the labor of obedience, to Him from Whom, by the idleness of disobedience, thou hadst withdrawn. To this end I now address a word of exhortation to thee, whosoever thou art, who, renouncing thine own will and taking up the bright and all-conquering weapons of obedience, dost enter upon the service of thy true king, Christ the Lord.” ~From the Prologue of the Rule of Saint Benedict

Benedict was born into Roman nobility in Nursia, central Italy, roughly 100 miles northeast of Rome. His father was a prefect for the Western Roman Empire, which had fallen to the barbarians a decade prior to his birth. He had a twin sister named Scholastica, who also became a saint. As a youth, Benedict was sent to Rome for studies. However, he quickly became disillusioned by the prevalent immorality and disorder, particularly among his classmates. At the age of twenty, to find peace in his soul and avoid the traps that had ensnared many of his peers, he moved to the countryside of the town of Affile, about forty miles from Rome. Accompanying him was his nurse who cared for him like a mother. They moved in with some virtuous men in the Church of Saint Peter. While there, his nurse accidentally broke a dish used to sift wheat and was distraught. Witnessing this, Benedict miraculously mended the dish and returned it to her. News of this miracle spread quickly, and Benedict became the talk of the town.

Benedict wasn’t interested in the praise of men; he sought only holiness. Leaving his nurse behind, he moved closer to the town of Subiaco and took up residence in a cave. Nearby, he met a holy monk, Romanus, whom Benedict consulted for spiritual advice. At Romanus’ encouragement, Benedict took on the monastic habit and lived in the cave for the next three years as a hermit. Romanus visited him frequently, bringing him food as needed. As a hermit, Benedict prayerfully sought to root out all sin in his life, especially the three temptations common to most men: “the temptation of self-affirmation and the desire to put oneself at the center, the temptation of sensuality and, lastly, the temptation of anger and revenge” (Pope Benedict XVI, General Audience, April 9, 2008).

After spending three years as a hermit near Subiaco, he became an abbot and founded twelve monasteries. At fifty, he moved to Monte Cassino, where he established a large monastery and wrote the “Rule of Saint Benedict,” which became the standard for Western monasticism. His sister Scholastica also founded a women’s monastery guided by his Rule. Benedict’s monasteries became centers of education and culture in Europe. He is known as the “Father of Monasticism” and was declared the Patron Saint of Europe by Pope Paul VI in 1964.

As we honor this important figure in Church and world history, reflect on his humble beginnings. He witnessed the immoralities of his day and fled from those temptations to embrace a life of holiness. At that time, it would have been difficult for him to comprehend the influence he would have had on all of Europe and, in fact, upon the whole world for many centuries to come. Reflect on the fact that God also calls you to flee from sin and embrace a life of holiness. When that happens, God can do great things through you in ways you may never comprehend. Follow the example of Saint Benedict and commit yourself to holy daily living, and leave it up to God to use you as He wills.

Prayer: *Saint Benedict, you witnessed the moral corruption in Rome at an early age and fled to the wilderness to seek out God’s will. Through your prayerful obedience to God’s will, inestimable good fruit has been borne. Please pray for me that I will always seek out God’s will in my life, leaving behind the many temptations to sin that I encounter, so that God can use me in ways known only to Him. Saint Benedict, pray for me. Jesus, I trust in You.*



On July 1, 2024, the 136 parishes in the Archdiocese of Seattle became 60 parish families, with eight stand-alone parishes. Led by a pastor or pastoral coordinator, along with a parochial vicar, parish families just completed the first year of the three-year process of creatively re-envisioning parish life to bring the love of Jesus Christ to others in Western Washington.

Focused on welcoming and getting to know each other, this first year was full of community events, pastor meet and greets and getting to know the gifts of each parish in a parish family.

Pastors met their assigned parish liaisons who will support the parish family through the process. First steps for staff included getting to know each other and for some parishes, joint staff retreats were held.

Later in the year, each parish family formed new groups including the Parish Family Leadership Team comprised of parish staff and the Parish Family Advisory Council comprised of parishioners representing the rich diversity of the parishes in the parish family.

Now that these groups are in place, the parish family will dive into the planning work outlined in the One Parish Planning process. This process is designed to help parish families develop a vision for the future and the plan to execute it – ensuring these are grounded in listening and community discernment to foster local decision-making.
