




Priest: May almighty God have mercy on us, forgive us our sins, and bring us to everlasting life.

NICENE CREED

While the congregation sings, the priest says the prayer of preparation, blessing and thanking God for the gifts of bread and wine.



EUCHARISTIC PRAYER



SANCTUS


Sanctus is from the Latin, meaning "Holy."




Hosanna is a liturgical word from Hebrew meaning "praise" or "adoration."

LORD'S PRAYER

Priest: ...[Invites all to say the Lord's Prayer.]

Response: Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

Priest: ...Deliver us, Lord, we pray, from every evil, graciously grant peace in our days, that, by the help of your mercy, we may be always free from sin and safe from all distress, as we await the blessed hope and the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ.

Response: For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and forever.

SIGN OF PEACE

Priest: ...Lord Jesus Christ, who said to your Apostles, Peace I leave you, my peace I give you, look not on our sins, but on the faith of your Church, and graciously grant her peace and unity in accordance with your will. Who live and reign for ever and ever.



Priest: ...Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb.


Response: Lord, I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof, but only say the word and my soul shall be healed.


COMMUNION PROCESSION Come to the Water 202 (blue)
