Baptism

The celebration of the Sacrament of Baptism for infants is scheduled after the baptismal preparation for the parents is completed. Baptisms are normally celebrated at a Sunday mass in the parish where the parents live. Adults (7 years or older) seeking baptism or confirmation are invited to inquire at the parish office for information about adult preparation.

Marriage

Couples seeking marriage in the church are asked to contact the parish at least four months in advance of their proposed wedding date. For those with prior marriages, additional time may be required. Marriages are celebrated in the parish in which one of the Catholic parties lives.

Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession)

Private confession is available every Friday evening 6:00 pm — 6:45 pm.

Pastoral Care for the Sick and Dying In the case of serious illness or failing health due to old age, parishioners should ask the church for the Sacrament of Anointing. This sacrament is administered by a priest and is celebrated by appointment as necessary. When a parishioner is near death, they should receive Holy Communion, called Viaticum (food for the journey). This sacrament can be administered by a priest or deacon or Eucharistic minister.

Flour, Sugar, Coffee & Tea

Stewardship Bulletin Reflection



August 17, 2025

Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time

[JER 38:4-6, 8-10; PS 40:2-4,18; HEB 12:1-4; LK 12:49-53](#)

Today’s readings set a high bar for us Christian stewards, reminding us that a stewardship way of life is meant to be a challenging way of life.



In the second reading, from the Letter to the Hebrews, we are told to live as Christ lived. And how did Christ live? “For the sake of the joy that lay before Him He endured the cross.” If we are tempted to complain about the sufferings we must endure in living as Christ’s disciples, we are told, “In your struggle against sin you have not yet resisted to the point of shedding blood.” In other words, “If you’re not bleeding, what are you complaining about?” That is quite a high bar!

The Gospel reading from Luke continues this challenging theme. Our Lord tells His disciples “I have come to set the earth on fire, and how I wish it were already blazing.” A couple of verses later Jesus adds, “Do you think that I have come to establish peace on the earth? No, I tell you, but rather division.”

Jesus’s life on this earth and the message He brought were not meant to simply make us feel good. In fact, His words can make us downright uncomfortable at times. That’s because His Good News (and it is indeed good news!) is meant to change us, to make saints of us.

The stewardship way of life sets a high bar indeed. But deeply embraced, this way of life focused on God and others will make us the saints we are called to be.

Take God with You this Summer

It might seem alarming to some that Jesus says that he came to bring division, not peace. Jesus is talking about the cost of doing the will of God. He speaks of accomplishing something great— the realization of God’s kingdom— and doing so with the kind of passion and fortitude that might harm our relationships with others. Others might have lukewarm responses to discipleship, an attitude that could cause rifts and conflicts. Jesus challenges us to continue his work and make this our highest priority.

Family Reflection:

- Give an example of how following God’s commandments might make a family member or friend uncomfortable with you.
- Ask your children what questions they have about today’s Gospel. Discuss whether they think that Jesus wants families to be divided. Why could his message have that effect.

Faith in Action:

We hold up saints as examples of those who followed Christ unconditionally. Some saints suffered ridicule, cruelty, and even death at the hands of family members because of the path they chose. Research a saint who was persecuted by his or her family. Some examples are St. Francis of Assisi, St. Clare, St. Thomas Aquinas, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, and St. Kateri Tekakwitha. Discuss their responses in light of today’s
