# Social Impact

The World Health Organization estimates that 1 in 10 people globally feel lonely, with certain regions, including the UK, experiencing even higher rates. In Luton, we know that loneliness impacts many, and social isolation is linked to a variety of chronic conditions, including high blood pressure, heart disease, and even dementia.

However, gardening has been proven to provide a solution. According to the Mental Health Foundation, 88% of people who garden for more than 6 hours per week report higher life satisfaction. The National Garden Scheme found that 79% of residents felt their mental health and wellbeing improved through gardening.

By connecting people with nature and with each other, Luton in Bloom is making a difference in the lives of those who might otherwise feel disconnected. Our competition, workshops, and community events have provided opportunities for people to build new relationships and combat the negative effects of isolation.

### Our Workshops

#### **Our Seed Sharing Event - Luton Point**

We hosted a Seed Sharing Event inside Luton Point, which was attended by over 500 people.

The atmosphere was vibrant and filled with energy, as people of all ages and backgrounds came together to share seeds, plants, stories, and gardening tips.

This event exemplified the spirit of Luton in Bloom a celebration of community, diversity, and collective growth.

# Our Seed Sharing Event - Survey Results based on 109 participants

28.4% of participants told us that they do gardening weekly followed by 24.8% who said they do it monthly.

11% stated they never did gardening.



54.1% of our participants in this survey stated they had lack of time which is why did not do gardening.

Based on the information collected we based our future workshops on the needs of the community!



35.2% of our participants in this survey were aged 35-44.

#### Into the Wildlife with Matt



The Wildlife Trusts is a federation made up of 46 Wildlife Trusts and a central charity (the Royal Society of Wildlife Trusts).

Matt hosted a workshop on how residents of Luton can help make a difference to our wildlife. Many of us have foxes, birds, badgers and other wild animals which may pay a visit now and then to our gardens.

Matt showed the group how to ensure their gardens were safe for wild animals, but also how residents could make their own mini meadows in their back gardens



# Young Growers: A Guide for Kids to Grow







**Sowing microgreens -** This is really fun for families to take home and grow on a windowsill plus it teaches them a new skill.

**Wildflowers seed balls** - A messy one but again even good for those that don't have gardens as they can throw them at parks.

**Herb exploration area -** This includes a herb tray for sensory exploration along with colouring sheets. Children were also given some packets of coriander, basil and parsley to take home and sow.

#### Seed to Sprout with Shazeena Hussain





Shazeena hosted our "Seed to Sprout" workshop, where she guided participants through the fascinating life cycles of both flowers and vegetables.

With a warm and engaging approach, she explained the germination process in detail breaking down how a tiny seed transforms into a thriving plant. Beyond the science, Shazeena also made it practical and accessible by demonstrating how anyone can start germinating seeds at home using everyday items like a damp paper towel and a plastic bag.

Her hands-on examples and easy-to-follow steps inspired participants to try it themselves, showing just how simple and rewarding it can be to grow your own plants from scratch.

#### Stockwood Garden Tour: A look into beautiful gardens in Luton



The Stockwood Gardens Tour, hosted by Jo Oliver, offered participants a rare behind-the-scenes look at one of Luton's most stunning green spaces. With her deep knowledge and passion for horticulture, Jo guided visitors through the gardens, sharing fascinating insights into the history and unique features of Stockwood.

A highlight of the tour was the exploration of the dedicated sensory garden, where Jo explained how thoughtful design can engage all five senses sight, sound, smell, touch, and even taste. Participants not only experienced the sensory garden firsthand but also learned practical tips on how to create their own sensory spaces at home, using simple, accessible techniques to make gardens more inclusive and enriching for everyone.

#### Meet the Expert with Faizlet Khan



Faizlet Khan hosted our "Meet the Expert" workshop, which provided learners with valuable insights into gardening, including information about various flowers and fruits and their seasonal growth patterns. The workshop was delivered in both English and Bangla, allowing greater participation and engagement, particularly from the Bangladeshi community, who have a strong interest in gardening.

Participants had the opportunity to ask questions and gain practical knowledge about planting and caring for different types of plants and flowers, making the session both informative and interactive.

#### Gardening for Beginners with Advocacy 1st





We hosted a Beginners' Guide to Gardening session at the LETS Hub, welcoming the Advocacy 1st team from Community Connex Ltd. Community Connex works with people with learning disabilities, autistic individuals, those facing disadvantages, and their families, helping them lead healthier, happier, and more inclusive lives. Their vision is a world where everyone, regardless of ability or background, is treated as an equal citizen.

During the session, the group had the opportunity to get hands-on experience with gardening learning the basics, picking up useful tips and tricks, and even taking home their own plants to continue growing. More than just a gardening lesson, the session offered a space for connection, where participants bonded through shared experiences and the joy of growing something together.


