Step Four: Courage - Look Within

"Made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves."

Step Four, which begins on the very end of page 63 in the Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous, states that after we take Step Three, we must "launch out on a vigorous course of action, the first step of which is a personal house cleaning."

It says that, while turning our will over to our Higher Power in Step Three was a "vital and crucial step," it can have "little permanent effect unless at once followed by a strenuous effort to face, and be rid of, the things in ourselves that have been blocking us."

What does this mean? A personal house cleaning? A moral inventory? What is that?

Like a business that takes an inventory of what products they have in stock, we take an inventory of our lives. What things are we holding on to that no longer profit us? What items have turned rotten and are making us sick? What items are downright ugly? What assets do we have that we want to keep? What behaviors do we keep repeating that are keeping us stuck? These are the types of things we will look for throughout this Fourth Step process.

Another word for "moral" is truth. By reviewing our past — the people, situations, beliefs and fears we have engaged with throughout our lives — we can begin to see the truth about ourselves and the role we've played in our troubles. Through writing, we begin to see ourselves and our lives clearly.

This whole process might sound terrifying and complicated, but it is not. There is a very clear-cut method for reviewing our lives, which is outlined in the Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous. Many of us like to overcomplicate this process by writing novels about our lives and getting bogged down in the messy storylines of our pasts. This is not necessary.

An inventory is a list. A bulleted list. An organized list. And the Big Book tells you exactly how to do it.

Fourth Step Promises

If we have been thorough about our personal inventory, we have written down a lot. We have listed and analyzed our resentments. We have begun to comprehend their futility and their fatality. We have commenced to see their terrible destructiveness. We have begun to learn tolerance, patience and good will toward all men, even our enemies, for we look on them as sick people. We have listed the people we have hurt by our conduct, and are willing to straighten out the past if we can (p. 70). We begin to see that:

- 1. Mental health can be achieved.
- 2. We can begin to change.
- 3. We see the pointlessness of our past antipathies and how damaging they can be.
- 4. We see that we can be prepared to make amends.



The Responsibility Statement



The Alcoholics Anonymous (AA) Responsibility Statement is:

"I am responsible - when anyone, anywhere reaches out for help, I want the hand of AA always to be there. And for that: I am responsible."

It emphasizes individual accountability for ensuring AA's continued availability to those seeking help.

Origin, Core Message and Purpose:

The statement was introduced at the 1965 AA International Convention in Toronto. The statement underscores the idea that each member has a responsibility to ensure that AA's help is always available to those in need. The statement serves as a reminder that AA's future depends on the collective efforts and responsibility of its members.

Key Concepts:

The statement is closely linked to the concepts of unity, service, and the importance of AA's traditions and is often paired with the Declaration of Unity, which emphasizes the importance of placing common welfare first and keeping the fellowship united.

Historical Context:

In 1963, a national magazine published a critical cover story about AA, prompting a focus on taking stock of AA's shortcomings and the need for members to take responsibility for their actions and attitudes. At the time, AA as a whole had an arrogant persona and presented that AA "was always right' and projected the idea that it was the only method available for alcoholics to recover.

Bill W.'s Perspective:

As a result of the events of 1963, Bill W., a co-founder of AA, discussed the importance of taking responsibility in his article "Responsibility Is Our Theme" in the July 1965 Grapevine. He noted how we might have alienated people through our arrogant conviction that we were always right and had the only answers to alcoholism. We needed to correct such attitudes and behavior in order to continue reaching the alcoholic who still suffers.



Do you remember the name of your kindergarten teacher? I remember mine. Her name was Mrs White. And I remember thinking she must be some older relation of Walt Disney's Snow White, because she had the same bright blue eyes, short dark hair, red lips and fair skin.

And it occurs to me that if Mrs White had used her red pen more precisely I probably wouldn't be telling you about this now. Which is kind of obvious but also kind of not. I look back now and think she must have been a rather extraordinary teacher - to exercise such red-pen-restraint.
