# Luke 3:4, 6

Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths: all flesh shall see the salvation of God.



**December 7, 2025** 

Isaiah's vision of the world after the Messiah comes sounds like the Garden of Eden, where all God's creatures lived in peace and harmony. Try to imagine a lamb inviting a wolf to visit, a young goat lying down placidly with a leopard, and a baby playing with a cobra! Only in Eden or in heaven, right? Not since the fall of humanity could such a scene have taken place here on earth. But Isaiah says it will happen again. The dream of returning to an earlier time when your life, the world around you, or indeed the entire world was in a far better place is an alluring one. And it is not impossible. John the Baptist tells us how: "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand!" (Matthew 3:2). Repentance turns back the clock. Repentance returns us to a sinless, idyllic state. Repentance leads us to the kingdom, which is truly at hand, as much now as it was two thousand years ago, for Jesus is still with us, still calling us to repentance. O come, Emmanuel—"God with us"—lead us to your holy mountain, free from harm and ruin, to a place of peace and harmony.

Of what do you repent today to try to bring peace and harmony to your life?

# Second Sunday of Advent

Is 11:1-10 | Rom 15:4-9 | Mt 3:1-12

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE Today's Gospel is a challenging one, inviting us to consider how much spiritual fruit we are bearing in our lives. St. John the Baptist tells us, "Produce good fruit as evidence of your repentance," reminding us that the depth of our conversion will be measured by our fruit. Speaking to the Pharisees and Sadducees, John says it is not enough to say that "'We have Abraham as our father."" If he were speaking today, John might put it this way: it's not enough to say "I'm Catholic!" or "I belong to X Parish." Our lives must show outward evidence of the inward conversion we have undergone. The good news for us today is that we can pause and take stock of how well we are bearing spiritual fruit. Pay attention to what areas might need pruning or fertilizing to ensure that when we come to the Lord's threshing floor at the end of our lives,

#### **GO** EVANGELIZE

#### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

there is a bountiful harvest he can gather into his barn.

Our first reading gives us a glimpse of God's kingdom: The Son of David will rule with wisdom, understanding, counsel, and knowledge, judging "the poor with justice" and striking "the ruthless with the rod of his mouth." In his kingdom "the wolf shall be a guest of the lamb" and yet "there shall be no harm or ruin." What a poetic way of describing the harmony and wholeness that God longs for in society! As disciples, this is our mission. We're called to work so that God's kingdom vision can become reality. As we work for peace and justice, we're doing our part in the Church's work of evangelization. As the U.S. bishops reminded us in their letter *Communities of Salt and Light*, "social justice is an integral part of evangelization, a constitutive dimension of preaching the Gospel, and an essential part of the Church's mission."

#### REFLECT

In the Gospel, John the Baptist says of Jesus, "He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and with fire." Our ability to bear spiritual fruit comes from the power of the Holy Spirit within us. Take a moment to reflect on where you see the gifts (see the first reading from Isaiah!) and fruits of the Holy Spirit in your life. How might the Spirit of God be working to increase your spiritual fruitfulness this Advent?





# Lectio Divina for the Second Week of Advent

We begin our prayer:

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

May the splendor of your glory dawn in our hearts, we pray, almighty God, that all shadows of the night may be scattered and we may be shown to be children of light by the advent of your Only Begotten Son.

Who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit,

God, for ever and ever.

(Collect, Saturday of the Second Week of Advent)

# Reading (Lectio)

*Read the following Scripture two or three times.* Matthew 3:1-12

John the Baptist appeared, preaching in the desert of Judea and saying, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand!" It was of him that the prophet Isaiah had spoken when he said:

A voice of one crying out in the desert, Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths.

John wore clothing made of camel's hair and had a leather belt around his waist. His food was locusts and wild honey. At that time Jerusalem, all Judea, and the whole region around the Jordan were going out to him and were being baptized by him in the Jordan River as they acknowledged their sins.


When he saw many of the Pharisees and Sadducees coming to his baptism, he said to them, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath? Produce good fruit as evidence of your repentance. And do not presume to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our father.' For I tell you, God can raise up children to Abraham from these stones. Even now the ax lies at the root of the trees. Therefore every tree that does not bear good fruit will be cut down and thrown into the fire. I am baptizing you with water, for repentance, but the one who is coming after me is mightier than I. I am not worthy to carry his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fan is in his hand. He will clear his threshing floor and gather his wheat into his barn, but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

### **Meditation** (*Meditatio*)

After the reading, take some time to reflect in silence on one or more of the following questions:

- What word or words in this passage caught your attention?
- What in this passage comforted you?
- What in this passage challenged you?

If practicing <u>lectio divina</u> as a family or in a group, after the reflection time, invite the participants to share their responses.





# Prayer (Oratio)

Read the Scripture passage one more time. Bring to the Lord the praise, petition, or thanksgiving that the Word inspires in you.

# **Contemplation** (*Contemplatio*)

Read the Scripture again, followed by this reflection:

What conversion of mind, heart, and life is the Lord asking of me?

Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand! How does Scripture describe the kingdom of God? What elements of the kingdom do I see in the world around me?

Jerusalem, all Judea, and the whole region around the Jordan were going out to him and were being baptized by him in the Jordan River as they acknowledged their sins. What sins do I need to acknowledge? What conversion of life should I seek?

Produce good fruit as evidence of your repentance. How can I live God's will more fully? What sort of amends do I need to make?

After a period of silent reflection and/or discussion, all recite the Lord's Prayer and the following:

The LORD himself will give his benefits; our land shall yield its increase.

Justice shall walk before him, and prepare the way of his steps.

(From Psalm 72)

# Living the Word This Week

How can I make my life a gift for others in charity?

Make a good examination of conscience and make plans to celebrate the Sacrament of Penance before Christmas.

# **His Face**

Do you feel insecure this Advent season? Marriage is less than solid, your job at risk, medical problems? You are not alone.

There was a young man whose wife had died, leaving him with a small son. Back home from

the cemetery, they went to bed early because there was nothing else, he could bear to do.

As he lay there in the darkness--grief-stricken and heartbroken, the little boy broke the stillness from his little bed with a disturbing question, "Daddy, where is mommy?"

The father got up and brought the little boy to bed with him, but the child was still disturbed and restless, asking questions like "Why isn't she here?" and When is she coming back?"

Finally the little boy said, "Daddy, if your face is toward me, I think I can go to sleep now. And in a little while he was quiet and asleep.

The father lay there in the darkness, and then in childlike faith, prayed: "O Jesus, I don't see how I can survive this. The future looks so miserable. But if your face is toward me, somehow, I think I can make it."

That's a message of Advent. That Jesus' face is always towards us, that Jesus' heart is always open to us, and His compassion and mercy are limitless. Let Jesus replace your insecurity this Advent with the following bedrock conviction: Jesus and you are in this together. Nothing can happen that Jesus and you together cannot manage. Nothing will ever be able to separate you from his love, nothing. Now, that's real security.

Have a blessed Advent.




# **Together**

A youngster learning to play the piano attended a Paderewski concert with his mother. Soon after both were seated, the mother spotted a friend a short distance away and walked

down the aisle to greet her. The time got a little too long for the youngster, and he wandered off, exploring the wonders of the concert hall, eventually making his way through a door clearly marked NO ADMITTANCE.

When the house lights dimmed, the mother returned to her seat, only to find her son missing. At that moment the curtains on the stage parted, and to her shock, there was her son seated at the keyboard of the impressive Steinway. Oblivious to the crowd, he began to pick out the notes to "Twinkle, twinkle, little star." Just then Paderewski came on stage, quickly moved to the piano and whispered in the boy's ear, "Don't quit. Keep playing." Leaning over the boy, the concert pianist reached down with his left hand and began filling in a bass part. Soon his right arm reached around the other side of the boy and added another part. Together the old master and the young novice transformed a frightening situation into a wonderfully creative moment. The audience was captivated.

Just so, is not God able to work through our sometimes-feeble efforts, wrapping arms around us, urging us on, transforming our work into something beautiful? Indeed, God equips us to dream new dreams; God taxes our imaginations, prodding us to envision far more than we ever thought possible. Is this not the power of the Advent season, that we set aside time to consider anew God's gracious gifts, time for wonder and amazement, time for mystery and growth, time to dream with eyes-wide-open. And the promise is that God is with us, encouraging, upholding, challenging, renewing, recreating us, that we might dream new dreams and imagine new possibilities. Possibilities of peace, possibilities of compassionate love and servanthood, possibilities of new life. Happy Advent.



# My faith is strong, but so is the injustice

"It's been 28 years since I arrived in the United States. I worked day and night so I could give my children a good future. They were able to go to college and are now hardworking professionals," shared Juan José, a widowed father who was deported to Nogales.

"I was born in a small town in the state of Guerrero. There were days when my family and I had nothing to eat but tortillas or rice. We all went out to work in the fields to cover our expenses. My dream was to escape that life."

"I've been so angry. The way it all happened was heartbreaking. God knows I sought Him to ease my pain, because He knows my faith is strong, but the injustice I'm living through is, too. I looked for Him every single day of the almost 100 I spent at [the] Eloy [Detention Center], and I know He heard me. Now I ask Him to take care of my children and give me patience and understanding so I can see how to build this new path ahead."




