



September 7, 2025

A single word in today's Gospel makes its lesson difficult to accept. Jesus tells the crowds that no one can be his disciple without first hating all their own family members. How could Jesus, who had just taught them to love their neighbor, say such a thing? Bible scholars suspect that Jesus may be employing Semitic exaggeration here, choosing an overly strong word instead of renouncing or refusing. Jesus' lesson is that discipleship demands total commitment: a willingness to carry one's cross, to renounce one's possessions, to put Jesus first. After all, the first disciples left their families to follow Jesus, sharing in his ministry and becoming his family. In the second reading, Saint Paul, having converted Philemon and then his runaway slave Onesimus, urges Philemon to accept Onesimus, not as a slave, but as a brother in Christ, serving the gospel rather than himself. As his disciples now, we too are called to put Christ first, even as we serve our neighbor, our spouse, our parent. Loving our family is great, but building up the kingdom of God is greater. Participating in this mission as Jesus' disciple is our most important calling.

What should you renounce or sacrifice in order to share in Christ's mission more fully?

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

I am particularly struck by this line from Solomon's prayer in today's first reading from the Book of Wisdom: "Or who ever knew your counsel, except you had given wisdom and sent your holy spirit from on high?" Solomon doesn't seem to be seeking direct answers to the questions he presents today, but rather, uses them as a sort of poem of praise to honor God in all his glory. In modern language, we could rephrase his questions: What do we know that God has not instilled into our minds? What wisdom do we have that was not infused by the Holy Spirit? There are many things that we cannot understand without the wisdom God gives us. May we, like Solomon, praise and thank God for this gift. Let us trust that where our feeble, corruptible humanity falters, our heavenly Father is our refuge in every age.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Today's Gospel is certainly one that we need God's wisdom to understand. This reading always makes me do a double take or a read-over. "What did Jesus just say?!" His words today are stark and can feel disconcerting. "If anyone comes to me without hating his father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters, and even his own life, he cannot be my disciple." When I encounter a challenging Scripture such as this one, I try to immediately root myself in concrete truths about the Lord. First, I acknowledge that he is good and desires my good. He is all-knowing, all-powerful and all-loving. After centering on those realities, I can look at this Gospel again, but this time through a clearer lens. Ultimately, this Gospel is a piercing reminder of the radical renunciation desired by the Lord. It is a rubric for the narrow road and for sanctity. Jesus does not mince his words, nor does he seek to confuse or confound: to follow Jesus is to release our hearts from earthly attachments, to embrace our cross and to set our lives in proper order. Clear and direct? Certainly. Easy? Not at all. But doing this in union with Jesus? Absolutely possible.

REFLECT

Today, consider reflecting on your attachments - the places you cling to anything that is not Christ. As you go into these tender places, invite Jesus to gently reveal where he wants to grant you his freedom.



Lectio Divina for the Twenty-Third Week in Ordinary Time

We begin our prayer:

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

O God, by whom we are redeemed and receive adoption,

look graciously upon your beloved sons and daughters,

that those who believe in Christ may receive true freedom and an everlasting inheritance.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit,

God, for ever and ever.

Reading (Lectio)

Read the following Scripture two or three times. Luke 14:25-33

Great crowds were traveling with Jesus, and he turned and addressed them, "If anyone comes to me without hating his father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters, and even his own life, he cannot be my disciple. Whoever does not carry

Meditation (*Meditatio*)

After the reading, take some time to reflect in silence on one or more of the following questions:

- What word or words in this passage caught your attention?
- What in this passage comforted you?
- What in this passage challenged you?

If practicing <u>lectio divina</u> as a family or in a group, after the reflection time, invite the participants to share their responses.





Prayer (Oratio)

Read the Scripture passage one more time. Bring to the Lord the praise, petition, or thanksgiving that the Word inspires in you.

Contemplation (Contemplatio)

Read the Scripture again, followed by this reflection:

What conversion of mind, heart, and life is the Lord asking of me?

Whoever does not carry his own cross and come after me cannot be my disciple. What crosses am I carrying right now? How can I grow as a missionary disciple?

Otherwise, after laying the foundation and finding himself unable to finish the work the onlookers should laugh at him. What spiritual projects have I failed to complete? When have I been subject to ridicule for my faith?

Anyone of you who does not renounce all his possessions cannot be my disciple. Am I a steward of my possessions or am I subject to them? How can I grow in generosity and develop a healthy relationship with my possessions?

After a period of silent reflection and/or discussion, all recite the Lord's Prayer and the following:

Teach us to number our days aright, that we may gain wisdom of heart. Return, O LORD! How long? Have pity on your servants!

Fill us at daybreak with your kindness, that we may shout for joy and gladness all our days. And may the gracious care of the LORD our God be ours;

prosper the work of our hands for us! Prosper the work of our hands!

(From Psalm 90)

Closing Prayer:

George Shinn was a pastor back in 1880. He was summoned one midnight to the bedside of an old woman who lived by herself. She had little money and few friends, and she was dying. She told Shinn that she wanted another woman to come stay with her for such time as she might have left, so Shinn and the old woman's doctor struck out in the darkness to try to dig one up for her.

They knocked at doors and threw pebbles at second story windows. One woman said she couldn't come because she had children. Another said she simply wouldn't know what to do, what to be, in a crisis like that. Another was suspicious of two men prowling around at that hour of night and wouldn't even talk to them. But finally, they rapped at the humble door of an Irish woman, the mother of a brood of children. She put her head out of the window. "Who's there?' she said. "And what can you want at this time of night?" They tell her the situation, her warm, Irish heart cannot resist. "Will you come?" "Sure and I'll come, and I'll do the best I can." And she did come," the story ends. "She did the best she could."

This woman was willing. She was available.

Is there a warmer word in our language? Available. It means, I'm here when you call. I'm ready, willing, able. Great crowds were following Jesus. He turned around and said to them: "Anyone who wants to be my follower must love me far more than he does his own father, mother, wife, children, brothers, or sisters yes, more than his own life otherwise he cannot be my disciple."

CATHOLIC QUIZ 7 September 2025

This week's Question: "What is the 'Nave' of a church?"

The answer to last week's Question: "What is a 'Chancel'?"

The Chancel is the area around the altar reserved for the clergy and those assisting them at Mass. It comes from the Roman custom of separating lawyers from the public in court by a lattice screen (Latin: cancellus, screen). The word "Chancery" is also derived from this legal term. Before the liturgical reforms of 1963, the Chancel (also called 'the Sanctuary') was divided from the nave of the church by an 'altar rail' – strictly setting the limits to which laypersons could approach the altar. This 'screening' of the altar was an 'Imperial innovation' following the legalization of Christianity in 325 A.D., it was unknown in the early Church! Like the iconostases (the wall which 'shields' the altar from the nave in Eastern Rite and Eastern Orthodox Churches), the altar screen evolved into major architectural and decorative element - but limited the participation of the Faithful to 'viewing' the Mass.


