



Upon their return to Jerusalem, Isaiah tells his fellow Israelites that God has some blunt commands: Feed the hungry, shelter the homeless, clothe the naked, and aid the oppressed. In doing so, Isaiah promises, their light will shine forth and their souls shall be healed. Jerusalem, the holy city, now freed from captivity, will reveal the Lord's glory when its people sacrifice what they have for those in need. Jesus invokes this image when calling upon his disciples to let their light shine for all to see, as a city on a mountain is visible from all around. Jesus and his disciples are conspicuous among the people of Galilee and Judea, drawing crowds wherever they go. Jesus wants the good deeds that his disciples carry out to be seen by all, glorifying God and giving everyone a glimpse of the kingdom he preaches. Even Saint Paul, who wrote to Christian communities more extensively than anyone, told the Corinthians he preaches not with words but with the power of the cross. For it is in that ultimate sacrifice that Jesus revealed God's mercy and love most fully. It is our turn now. May the good works we do reflect the light of Christ for all the world to see.

What concrete action will you do this week that can shine Christ's light in your corner of the world?

Is 58:7-10 | 1 Cor 2:1-5 | Mt 5:13-16

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

My understanding of prayer changed when I read St. Teresa of Calcutta's statement that says, "I used to believe that prayer changes things, but now I know that prayer changes us and we change things." Prayer is not an incantation that can change the will of God. It is the act of raising our hearts and minds to God, and of opening ourselves — our will, our understanding, our joys, and our sorrows — to be sanctified. The prophet Isaiah seems to be saying something similar in the first reading. He lists off the commands of the Lord to clothe the naked, feed the hungry, and shelter the homeless, and then tells the faithful that if they do these things, "then your light shall break forth like the dawn." We certainly serve those who are vulnerable because each person has immeasurable dignity and deserves to be cared for as a child of God. But the act of caring for another also changes us. We are made more fully into who we were created to be — not an individual living in isolation, but one who is deeply connected in community to the rest of humankind.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

An act of service, then, is much bigger than simply donating money or giving of our time. In caring for our neighbor, we proclaim God's goodness to a world in darkness, bearing witness to the love of God which is the source of all our actions. In the Gospel, Christ calls his followers to be "the light of the world," reminding us that he wants to shine his light through us. But we are not the source of the light. Even when we are the ones serving, we still remain only the vessel the true light shines through. When we love others, we are changed because we allow ourselves to be conformed more closely to Christ, allowing others to encounter his love in our actions.

SERVE

The corporal works of mercy are to feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, shelter the homeless, visit the sick, visit the imprisoned, and bury the dead. This is not a list meant to overwhelm, but rather to provide opportunities to care for God's children. What act of service can you and your family engage in this week to allow the light of Christ to shine through you?

Lectio Divina



Lectio Divina for the Fifth Week in Ordinary Time

We begin our prayer:

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the
Holy Spirit. Amen.

Keep your family safe, O Lord, with unfailing care,
that, relying solely on the hope of heavenly grace,
they may be defended always by your protection.
Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son,
who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the
Holy Spirit,
God, for ever and ever.

(Collect, Fifth Week in Ordinary Time)

Meditation (*Meditatio*)

*After the reading, take some time to reflect in
silence on one or more of the following questions:*

- What word or words in this passage caught your attention?
- What in this passage comforted you?
- What in this passage challenged you?

*If practicing lectio divina as a family or in a group,
after the reflection time, invite the participants to
share their responses.*

Reading (*Lectio*)

Read the following Scripture two or three times.
Matthew 5:13-16

Jesus said to his disciples: “You are the salt of the earth. But if salt loses its taste, with what can it be seasoned? It is no longer good for anything but to be thrown out and trampled underfoot. You are the light of the world. A city set on a mountain cannot be hidden. Nor do they light a lamp and then put it under a bushel basket; it is set on a lampstand, where it gives light to all in the house. Just so, your light must shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your heavenly Father.”

Prayer (*Oratio*)

*Read the Scripture passage one more time. Bring to
the Lord the praise, petition, or thanksgiving that
the Word inspires in you.*

Contemplation (*Contemplatio*)

Read the Scripture again, followed by this reflection:

What conversion of mind, heart, and life is the Lord asking of me?

It is no longer good for anything but to be thrown out and trampled underfoot. What bad habits and sinful behaviors do I need to remove from my life? How can I replace these things with holier practices?

Nor do they light a lamp and then put it under a bushel basket. When have I hidden my light under a basket? When have I failed to appreciate God's blessings?

It gives light to all in the house. Who has shared the light of Christ with me? How can I share the light of Christ with others?

After a period of silent reflection and/or discussion, all recite the Lord's Prayer and the following:

Living the Word This Week

How can I make my life a gift for others in charity?

Keep a gratitude journal for a week, taking notice of God's blessings and thanking him for them.

Closing Prayer

Light shines through the darkness for the upright;
he is gracious and merciful and just.

Well for the man who is gracious and lends,
who conducts his affairs with justice.



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Language

There was a mother mouse who decided to teach her children about the world. So she gathered all of her little mice and set out for a walk. They walked down the hall and turned to the right. Then they went down the hall and took another right. And suddenly they found themselves in front of the family cat dozing in the sunlight. The mother mouse was scared. But she didn't want to give in to her fright. So she signaled to the children to be very quiet and to follow as she began to tip toe quietly and slowly past the sleeping cat. Just as she was about to get past the cat, the cat's eyes popped open and raised its paw.

The little mice were petrified. What would their mother do? Well, just as the cat's paw started to come down, that mother mouse looked the cat right in the eye and started barking like a dog. And do you know what? The cat was so startled and frightened that it jumped up and ran away! The mother mouse, wiped her brow, shook a little and then turned to her little mice and said, "Children, I hope you learned a valuable lesson. Sometimes it's good to know a second language!"

It's the same with us.

It's good to know a second language. Salt and light are the language of God; the language of Grace; the language of Hope and Love. And when this language is translated into action it becomes the most beautiful language ever spoken. We're called to be salt and light and to speak the language of God as we live our faith. We're called to live the Word. Do we?



Reflectors

Beth drove to the summit of a local mountain. After watching the sunset, it became dark and she became anxious about the descent down the steep, winding road. When she left the parking lot the median strips on the road suddenly came alive with reflectorized lights. They provided a much-needed directional guide on the mountain road.

The reflectors illuminated the way for Beth, who made her descent safely down the treacherous mountain road. The reflectors, however, were useless without Beth's headlights shining on them. The light they gave depended on the light from another source. Otherwise, they could not help her see.

When Jesus told his disciples they were the "light of the world," he meant they were to be reflectors of the light of God. God is the illuminating source. God provides the light that is reflected through us. And God needs us to be reflectors of His light to a world of darkness.

Are we?



The answer to last week's Question: "What is a 'Papal Bull'?"

It is a type of papal letter, so named from the Latin term *bulla* (seal), of wax or lead that was added to documents to certify its formal nature, that it was coming from the pope himself. From the Middle Ages until early modern times 'papal bull' was the name given to all papal letters and pronouncements, regardless of their purpose or nature. The modern terminology for an official letter from the pope is: an 'apostolic letter' or an 'apostolic brief', if it is of a less important or limited nature.
