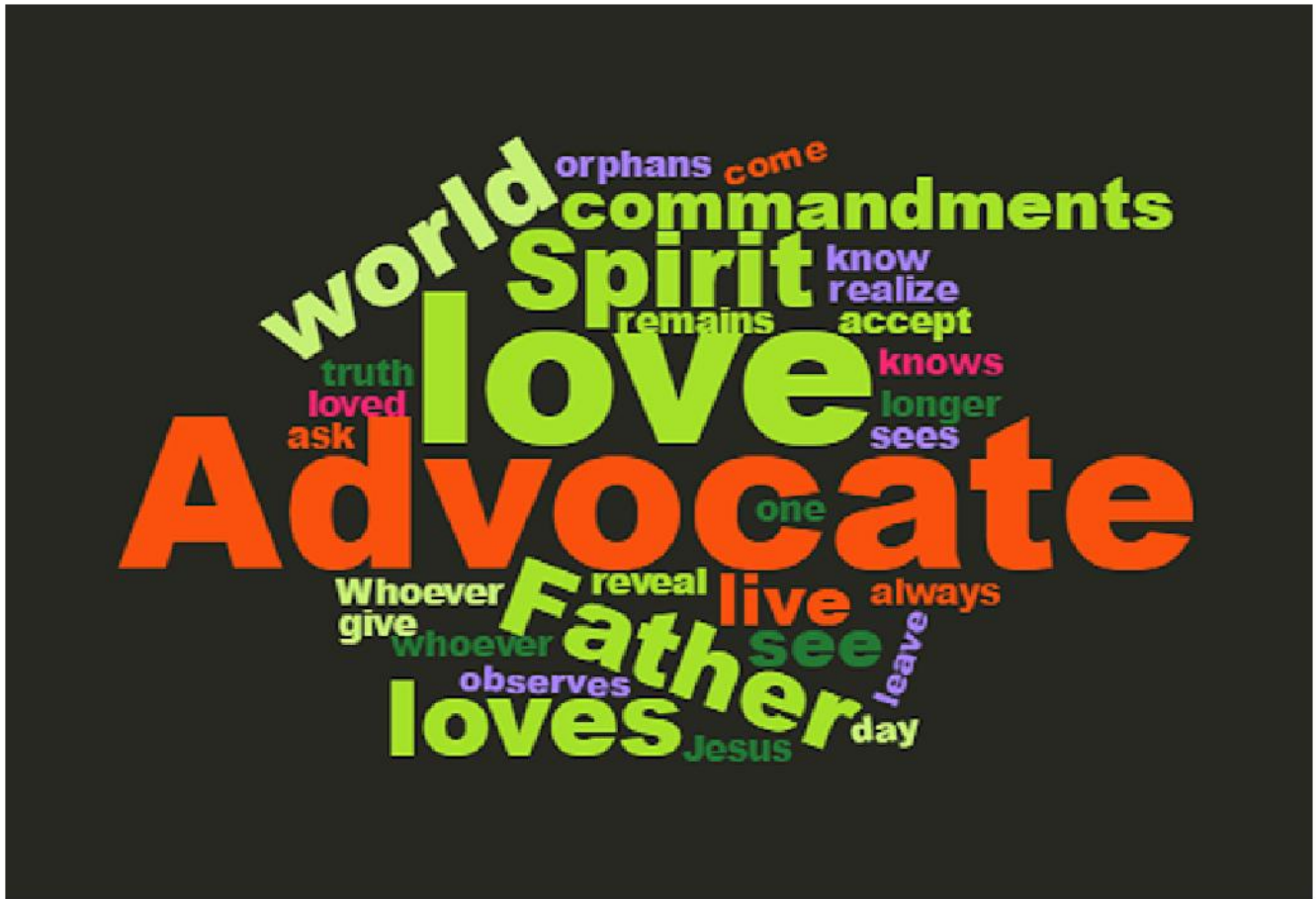

Think of someone you love dearly. Perhaps it's your spouse or significant other. Maybe it's a parent or a child. Since today is Mother's Day, you may be thinking of your mother or someone who is like a mother to you. For your loved one, you're willing to make sacrifices, right? Ideally, we come to want what they want so it doesn't feel like so much of a sacrifice. What Jesus wants most is for God's will to be done and for us to want God's will to be done. When Jesus told his disciples, "If you love me, you will keep my commandments" (John 14:15), he was not issuing a demand so much as he was reminding them what love inspires a person to do. Recall that he had already taught them that the greatest commandment is to love God and to love your neighbor as yourself. Keeping these commandments is what you already want to do if you love Jesus and see him revealed in your neighbor. "I will come to you . . . you will see me," he tells his disciples (John 14:18–19). Our challenge is to see him coming to us in the person in need, in the person we are willing to sacrifice for, in the one we come to love.

Whom do you love dearly? When have you put their will before your own?

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Several years ago, while praying in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament, I heard the words, “I just couldn’t bear to leave you.” It was one of the clearest responses to prayer that I have experienced, and it occurred at a time when I was feeling incredibly lonely. I have spent years reflecting on those words, which resurface often as I receive Christ in the Eucharist. In the Gospel today, I hear echoes of those words again as Christ explains to the Apostles the many ways in which they – and we – will not be abandoned after his ascension into heaven. As the rest of the Gospel unfolds, the events of his passion and resurrection reveal the Lord’s faithfulness to them. After the resurrection, the Apostles know they can trust his word because they remember Jesus’ promise that the Father will send an Advocate to be with them. We, also, can trust him believing that out of complete and utter love for humanity, Jesus remains with us.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

The Apostles accompanied one another in their community of faith, and they walked with those who had recently responded to God’s call to know the truth, as we see with the newly baptized in Samaria. In our lives today, the value of accompaniment cannot be underestimated. In our busy world when it is easy to feel disconnected and alone, being with one another is a powerful way to be a vessel through which Christ proclaims his promise to never leave us. By sitting with another in a time of grief, listening to the questions of a friend who is struggling, or rejoicing with a friend in response to good news, we accompany each other through life’s ups and downs. Sometimes accompaniment consists of proclaiming the Good News of Christ’s love and thereby helping others to have the courage to do the same. In whatever ways we are called to accompany another in their journey of faith, we do so with the promise that Christ is doing the same for us.

ACCOMPANY

In this joyful season of Easter, we continue to celebrate those who entered or were fully welcomed into the Catholic Church at the Easter Vigil. This week, consider reaching out to someone who is new to the Church to celebrate with them, offer your continued prayers for them, or invite them to a parish event.

Lectio Divina



Lectio Divina for the Sixth Week of Easter

We begin our prayer:

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Hear our prayers, O Lord,
so that what was promised
by the sanctifying power of your Word
may everywhere be accomplished
through the working of the Gospel
and that all your adopted children may attain
what the testimony of truth has foretold.
Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son,
who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the
Holy Spirit,
God, for ever and ever.

(Collect, Friday of the Sixth Week of Easter)

Reading (*Lectio*)

Read the following Scripture two or three times.
John 14:15-21

Jesus said to his disciples: “If you love me, you will keep my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate to be with you always, the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot accept, because it neither sees nor knows him. But you know him, because he remains with you, and will be in you. I will not leave you orphans; I will come to you. In a little while the world will no longer see me, but you will see me, because I live and you will live. On that day you will realize that I am in my Father and you are in me and I in you. Whoever has my commandments and observes them is the one who loves me. And

whoever loves me will be loved by my Father, and I will love him and reveal myself to him.”

Meditation (*Meditatio*)

After the reading, take some time to reflect in silence on one or more of the following questions:

- What word or words in this passage caught your attention?
- What in this passage comforted you?
- What in this passage challenged you?

If practicing lectio divina as a family or in a group, after the reflection time, invite the participants to share their responses.

Prayer (*Oratio*)

Read the Scripture passage one more time. Bring to the Lord the praise, petition, or thanksgiving that the Word inspires in you.

Contemplation (*Contemplatio*)

Read the Scripture again, followed by this reflection:

What conversion of mind, heart, and life is the Lord asking of me?

If you love me, you will keep my commandments.
Which of God's commandments do I struggle most to keep? How can I open my heart to embrace God's commands more fully?

The Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot accept, because it neither sees nor knows him. When have I felt unaccepted because of my faith? When have I denied acceptance to others?

I will not leave you orphans. When have I felt abandoned and alone? Who in my life is in need of accompaniment and companionship?

After a period of silent reflection and/or discussion, all recite the Lord's Prayer and the following:

Closing Prayer

Shout joyfully to God, all the earth,
sing praise to the glory of his name;
proclaim his glorious praise.
Say to God, "How tremendous are your deeds!"

"Let all on earth worship and sing praise to you,
sing praise to your name!"
Come and see the works of God,
his tremendous deeds among the children of
Adam.

He has changed the sea into dry land;
through the river they passed on foot;
therefore let us rejoice in him.
He rules by his might forever.

Hear now, all you who fear God, while I declare
what he has done for me.
Blessed be God who refused me not
my prayer or his kindness!

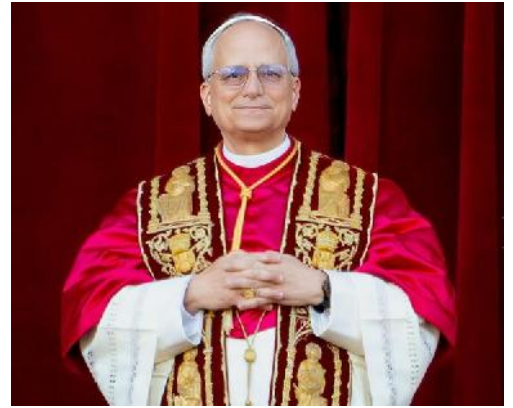

DID YOU KNOW – 10 May 2026

that Friday, 8 May, marked the first anniversary of the election of *Pope Leo XIV* – an American – as the Successor to St. Peter?

In his first year of shepherding the 1.4 billion Catholics around the world, he has certainly fulfilled his role as “Pontifex Maximus” – which means “Supreme Bridge-Builder” – for the world!



While many ‘talking heads’ in social media and the news industry analyze, predict, propose and dissect *Pope Leo* from their various perspectives, it is helpful to remember that for Catholics, it is a matter of faith to believe, to trust, that the Holy Spirit is the true “Elector” of Peter’s Successors.

Before the Papal Conclave which elected *Pope Benedict*, one of the Cardinal-Electors was asked by an (American) newscaster, ‘Who the ‘front runners’ were in the coming election’. The Cardinal gently corrected the reporter, saying that it was not an ‘election’ as is usually understood. He said, “God has already chosen Peter’s Successor. It is up to us, the College of Cardinals, to pray until we are clear as to whom God has already chosen.”

It is helpful to consider the words of *Pope Benedict XVI*, who wrote of Peter’s Successors: “*We have grown accustomed to making a distinction between ‘Peter the Rock’ and ‘Peter the Denier of Christ’: that is, Peter as he was before Easter (‘Peter the Denier’) and as he was after Pentecost (‘Peter the Rock’), the Peter of whom we have constructed a singularly idealistic image. But he was in reality at both times both of these. . .Has it not been thus throughout the history of the Church that the Pope, the successor of Peter, has been at the same time ‘petra’ and ‘skandalon’ – both the ‘Rock’ and a ‘stumbling block’? In fact, the Faithful will always have to reckon with this paradox of Divine choosing that shames pride again and again.*”

If we believe that Christ chose Simon Peter, with all of his weaknesses and his stumblings, his intense faith and his courageous following, to lead his fellow apostles then we believe that God has likewise chosen, through the college of Cardinals guided by the Holy Spirit, *Pope Leo XIV* for us, the Church.

Pope Leo XIV, who was a Missionary Bishop in a poor, rural Diocese in Peru before he was called to head the Dicastery (Office) of Bishops in Rome, said:

“We must seek together how to be a missionary Church, a Church that builds bridges, dialogue, always open to receive. . .with open arms. Everyone, everyone who needs our charity, our presence, dialogue and love.”

Please pray for our Pope!

The answer to last week’s Question: “What is ‘Mystagogia’?”

The final stage of the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA) – the process of instruction, by which an adult is brought into full Communion in the Catholic Church, is called “mystagogia” (or “mystagogy,” from the Greek word meaning “to lead through the mysteries.” Traditionally mystagogy extends throughout the Easter Season, until the Feast of Pentecost, and is meant to assist the newly initiated into a deeper appreciation of the Sacramental life of the Church, now that they are full participants. The Greek word can ‘mystify’ modern hearers, but it simply designates a special time of ‘continuing education’ for those who were baptized, Confirmed, and received the Eucharist at the Easter Vigil!

May is Hepatitis Awareness Month

*The main types that affect the most people are Hepatitis A, B, and C

*Hepatitis A can be prevented with a vaccine

Hepatitis A causes a mild, short-term illness with symptoms like fever, joint pain, and jaundice (yellowing of the skin)

There is no specific treatment for Hep A

One gets this by eating food or drinking water that contains the virus

*Hepatitis B can be prevented with vaccines

Often, people have no symptoms of disease

Getting tested is the only way to know one has this

There is treatment for this but no cure

Hep B is spread by close contact with someone who has the disease (through blood and bodily fluids)

*Hepatitis C can be cured

There is now treatment available that is more highly tolerable, lasting 8-12 weeks

There is no vaccine available for this type

Hep C is spread by close contact with someone who has the disease (through blood and bodily fluids)

*Thousands of people do not know they are affected

Get vaccinated

Practice good hygiene

Left untreated, Hepatitis B and C can cause serious health problems, such as liver damage, liver cancer, and even death

*If you are found to have hepatitis:

Get treated (for Hep B or Hep C)

Avoid alcohol

Eat a well-balanced diet

Get support for your mental health
