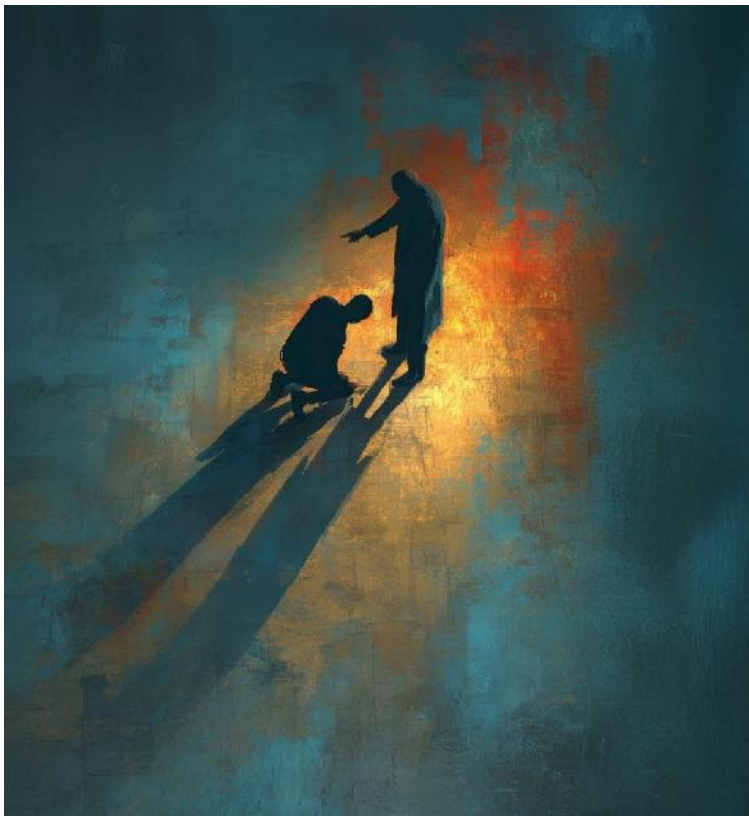

In his Gospel, Matthew uses the word *splagchnizomai* to describe the extreme compassion Jesus felt when people came to him in need. The Greek word connotes an emotion originating deep within oneself, literally from the inner organs that keep us alive. Today it describes the feeling of the master in Jesus' parable: "Moved with compassion the master of that servant let him go and forgave him the loan" (Matthew 18:27). His compassion was strong enough to outweigh the huge amount he was owed. When we are hurt by someone else, we naturally feel angry, maybe even vengeful. But as Sirach says, if we let anger fester or if we take vengeance on our neighbor, how can we expect mercy for our own sins? As God forgave the Chosen People time and again when they broke the covenant, as Jesus forgave sinners right up to his final hour, we are called to forgive those who hurt us and to have mercy on those who have done wrong. After all, we hope that when we die, God will have that same intense feeling of compassion for us as the master has in today's parable. And if we don't nurture and exercise that compassion ourselves, what right do we have to expect it in others?

Who needs compassion like this from you today?

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

It strikes me that the real issue in the Gospel is that the first man whose debt the king forgives fails to see that his fellow servant who owes him a smaller debt is just like himself. “Could anyone refuse mercy to another like himself, can he seek pardon for his own sins?” Sirach asks. I think we sometimes languish in unforgiveness because we think of others’ wrongful actions as being somehow worse than ours. As a result, we hold others to a higher standard, while expecting people to easily excuse our failings. Perhaps the first step toward the radical forgiveness that Jesus calls us to in today’s Gospel is to foster compassion for our fellow human beings. When we are wronged, it may be helpful to remind ourselves of the classic phrase, “There but for the grace of God, go I.” When we recognize that those who wrong us have the same struggles as our own, we are more likely to extend the same mercy we wish to be offered to us.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

After the attempted assassination of Pope John Paul II by Mehmet Ali Ağca in 1981, the future saint forgave his would-be assassin from his hospital bed, only four days after the shooting that nearly took his life. Later, the pope went to visit Ağca in prison, and the two spoke for more than 20 minutes. Since that time, John Paul’s example has stood as a witness to the power of God at work in us; the strength to forgive, it is clear, comes not from ourselves, but from the Lord. Our willingness to receive God’s grace and to extend forgiveness to others offers a powerful witness to the goodness of God, who is “kind and merciful, slow to anger and rich in compassion.”

PRAY

Radical forgiveness is a challenging spiritual practice; it is not easy! To forgive as Christ calls us to requires that we cultivate an interior disposition of humility and compassion. This ancient prayer from St. Ephrem can help to open our hearts to overcome anger or judgment toward those who have wronged us: *Lord and Master of my life, spare me from the spirit of indifference, despair, lust for power, and idle chatter. Instead, bestow on me, your servant, the spirit of integrity, humility, patience and love. Yes, O Lord and King, let me see my own sins, and not judge my brothers and sisters for you are blessed for ever and ever. Amen.*

Lectio Divina



Lectio Divina for the Twenty-Fourth Week in Ordinary Time

We begin our prayer:

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Look upon us, O God,
Creator and ruler of all things,
and, that we may feel the working of your mercy,
grant that we may serve you with all our heart.
Through our Lord Jesus Christ, our Son,
who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the
Holy Spirit,
God, for ever and ever.

(Collect, Twenty-Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time)

Reading (*Lectio*)

Read the following Scripture two or three times.
Matthew 18:21-35

Peter approached Jesus and asked him, “Lord, if my brother sins against me, how often must I forgive? As many as seven times?” Jesus answered, “I say to you, not seven times but seventy-seven times. That is why the kingdom of heaven may be likened to a king who decided to settle accounts with his servants. When he began the accounting, a debtor was brought before him who owed him a huge amount. Since he had no way of paying it back, his master ordered him to be sold, along with his wife, his children, and all his property, in payment of the debt. At that, the servant fell down, did him homage, and said, ‘Be patient with me, and I will pay you back in full.’ Moved with compassion the

master of that servant let him go and forgave him the loan. When that servant had left, he found one of his fellow servants who owed him a much smaller amount. He seized him and started to choke him, demanding, ‘Pay back what you owe.’ Falling to his knees, his fellow servant begged him, ‘Be patient with me, and I will pay you back.’ But he refused. Instead, he had the fellow servant put in prison until he paid back the debt. Now when his fellow servants saw what had happened, they were deeply disturbed, and went to their master and reported the whole affair. His master summoned him and said to him, ‘You wicked servant! I forgave you your entire debt because you begged me to. Should you not have had pity on your fellow servant, as I had pity on you?’ Then in anger his master handed him over to the torturers until he should pay back the whole debt. So will my heavenly Father do to you, unless each of you forgives your brother from your heart.”

Meditation (*Meditatio*)

After the reading, take some time to reflect in silence on one or more of the following questions:

- What word or words in this passage caught your attention?
- What in this passage comforted you?
- What in this passage challenged you?

If practicing lectio divina as a family or in a group, after the reflection time, invite the participants to share their responses.

Prayer (*Oratio*)

Read the Scripture passage one more time. Bring to the Lord the praise, petition, or thanksgiving that the Word inspires in you.

Contemplation (*Contemplatio*)

Read the Scripture again, followed by this reflection:

What conversion of mind, heart, and life is the Lord asking of me?

Moved with compassion the master of that servant let him go and forgave him the loan. Who is waiting for a compassionate response from me? What old grudges can I let go of?

Now when his fellow servants saw what had happened, they were deeply disturbed, and went to their master and reported the whole affair. What injustices do I see in the world around me? What actions can I take to address these injustices?

Should you not have had pity on your fellow servant, as I had pity on you? What care or acknowledgment am I seeking from others? How can I share God's loving mercy with others?

After a period of silent reflection and/or discussion, all recite the Lord's Prayer and the following:

Closing Prayer

Bless the LORD, O my soul;
and all my being, bless his holy name.
Bless the LORD, O my soul,
and forget not all his benefits.

He pardons all your iniquities,
heals all your ills.
He redeems your life from destruction,
crowns you with kindness and compassion.

He will not always chide,
nor does he keep his wrath forever.
Not according to our sins does he deal with us,
nor does he requite us according to our crimes.

For as the heavens are high above the earth,
so surpassing is his kindness toward those
who fear him.
As far as the east is from the west,
so far has he put our transgressions from us.

Living the Word This Week

How can I make my life a gift for others in charity?

If possible, extend forgiveness to someone who has hurt you.

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Forgive



A six year old girl named Ruby Bridges taught the world an unforgettable lesson about forgiveness. In 1960, Ruby walked into the William France Elementary School in New Orleans, Louisiana the first day after a federal judge mandated the desegregation of the New Orleans school district.

Ruby was the only African American student in the entire school. Every day she walked through a gauntlet of angry adults who insulted her with

racial slurs and foul language. Robert Coles, the Harvard psychologist, interviewed Ruby Bridges in the midst of this pressure packed situation. Coles had seen the little girl walking through the crowd with her lips moving. He asked, what she was saying? Was she talking back to them? "No!" she replied.

"Then what were you saying?" Coles asked. "I was praying!" answered Ruby.

"Praying?" Robert Coles asked in a surprised voice. "Why were you praying?"

Ruby said, "I usually pray before I go to school but this particular morning, I forgot so I prayed as I walked into the school." "What did you pray?" Coles asked.

I prayed, "God forgive them." "Why" asked Dr. Coles. Because that's what Jesus did on the cross." Replied Ruby. Dr. Coles said that Ruby Bridges' gracious act of forgiveness transformed his own life. May this reminder of Jesus' forgiveness change ours.

Forgiveness



A ship at sea is caught in a terrific storm.

Buffeted by the waves, the ship rocks to and fro, when suddenly the crew hears an awesome crashing sound below deck.

They know what it is. A cannon they are carrying has broken loose and is smashing into the ship's sides with every list of the ship.

Two brave sailors, at the risk of their lives, manage to go below and fasten it again, for they know that the heavy cannon on the inside of their ship is

more dangerous to them than the storm on the outside.

So it is with people. Problems that stir within us are often much more destructive than the problems outside.

Today, our Gospel should take us "below decks" to look inside ourselves. What is running loose within that is causing us damage. To stop the damage:

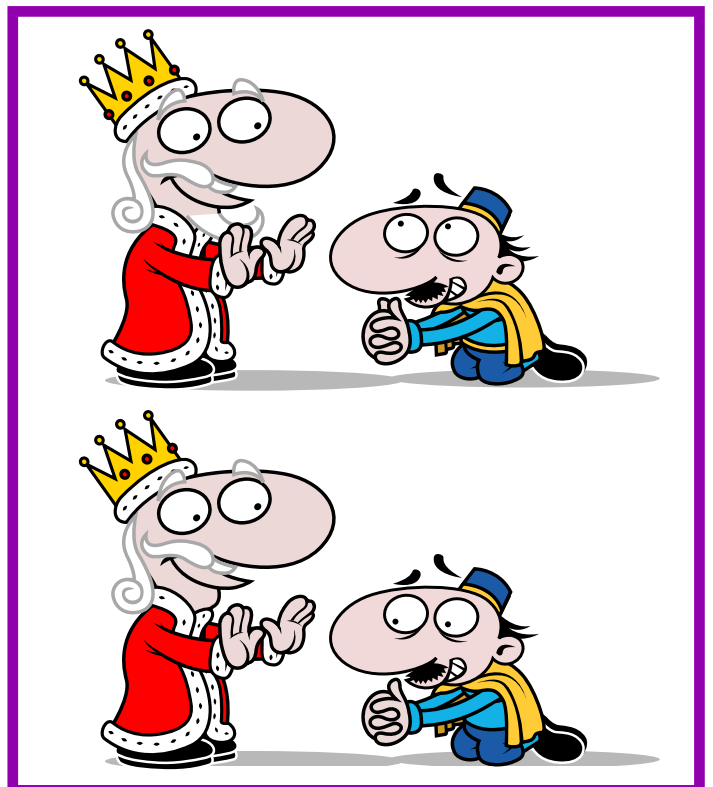

Once a major industrial city known especially for its master ship builders, Belfast has transformed itself into a major cultural center. On your morning sightseeing tour in this Victorian designed city you will see Queens University and the Titanic Quarter where the tragic liner was built. Also view the City Hall built in 1903 and the Albert Memorial Clock Tower. This afternoon, drive south to the town of Downpatrick to visit the burial site of St. Patrick. Return to Belfast for the night. **(B,D)**

BELFAST/GIANT'S CAUSEWAY/DERRY

THU, OCT 21

Depart today and drive along the northeastern coast to view the Nine Glens of Antrim and continue to visit the famous Giant's Causeway. It is one of nature's most spectacular wonders—40,000 six-sided symmetrical lava columns that range in size from 2 inches to 36 feet. The causeway was formed by volcanic activity over 60 million years ago and today is recognized as a World Conservation site. Continue to Derry for a walking tour including the Guildhall with its famous stained-glass windows and the historic Walls of Derry. **(B,D)**

DERRY/DONEGAL/KNOCK SHRINE/GALWAY

FRI, OCT 22

This morning journey through County Donegal and drive along the Barnesmore Gap past the Blue Stack mountain range and the picturesque Donegal Town. Continue to follow the western coast through "Yeats Country" and head south to County Mayo to visit the village of Knock. Regarded, as the premier place of pilgrimage and shrine to our Lady in Ireland, it was here in Knock that the blessed Mother appeared at the little parish church in 1879. Later continue to your hotel in the Galway area Galway for overnight. **(B,D)**

GALWAY/CONNEMARA/GALWAY

SAT, OCT 23

Today, drive through the wild, majestic Connemara region, home of Aran knits. Your tour embraces the rugged country lying between Lough Corrib and the Atlantic Ocean, a breathtaking region of mountains, lakes and tiny cottages, visiting Leenane, Clifden, and Kylemore Lakes. Here, St. Patrick fasted for 40 days and nights. Return to the Galway area for overnight. **(B)**

GALWAY/CLIFFS OF MOHER/KILLARNEY

SUN, OCT 24

Depart Galway today stopping enroute in a local village to see the awe-inspiring Cliffs of Moher soaring hundreds of feet above the sea. Continue south through County Clare. Drive by the picturesque village of Ardara to Killarney, located in the kingdom of Kerry. **(B,D)**
