

On this day that follows the longest night of the year, as an ever-increasing amount of light begins to dawn, we hear of two men of the house of David who face momentous decisions. The light dawns for one, but not for the other. The Lord offers Ahaz, king of Judah, a sign, but he refuses to place his faith in God. Isaiah's prophecy that the Lord will present a sign in the form of a virgin who will bear a son called Emmanuel, "God is with us," falls on deaf ears. Centuries later, Joseph, after finding out that his betrothed is pregnant and not by him, intends to divorce her. But the angel of the Lord comes to him and tells him that his betrothed, Mary, is the virgin who will fulfill the prophecy Isaiah told, a prophecy Joseph certainly knows well, a prophecy whose fulfillment he certainly has longed for, but a prophecy he must have found difficult to believe he will witness himself. Still, Joseph places his faith in God, taking Mary into his home and giving her child the name Jesus. Because Mary and Joseph each place their faith in God, a new day with God's indwelling and our salvation dawns for us all.

Is 7:10-14 | Rom 1:1-7 | Mt 1:18-24

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Throughout my life, I have had a litany of requests for God. I have asked for mundane and ultimately inconsequential favors and also for guidance in much more important matters. But I have often hesitated to ask for the deepest desires of my heart. Those requests feel too big, too impossible, and possibly too selfish — as though asking these things would take away from God's ability to provide for others. But in thinking this way, I am putting limits on a limitless God. In today's first reading, the Lord speaks to Ahaz and tells him to ask for a sign — "let it be deep as the netherworld, or high as the sky!" When Ahaz refuses, God speaks through the prophet Isaiah to deliver the most impossible promise — that "the virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall name him Emmanuel." God wants to give us everything we need to be close to him, so much so that he sent his Son to open the pathway to eternal life with him. God wants us to ask for him to do the impossible because he longs to give generously to us.


GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

God brings about his plan of salvation in an extraordinary way: The virgin Mary conceives Jesus in her womb through the power of the Holy Spirit. Although God does all the spiritual heavy lifting here, notice that our Gospel tells us that he also desired and asked for Joseph's cooperation. "Do not be afraid to take Mary your wife into your home," the angel tells Joseph. The Gospel tells us that Joseph "did as the angel of the Lord commanded him." In our work of evangelization, God does the heavy lifting: it's God who moves the hearts of others to seek him. But the amazing thing is that God still wants us to be part of the way his plan unfolds. We, too, cooperate with God's work of sharing the faith and bringing salvation to others by our actions and obedience.

PRAY

As we begin this final week of Advent, the Church continues to pray with the O Antiphons, which we hear in the hymn, "O Come, O Come Emmanuel." Listen to the refrain, which speaks of Israel's immense longing to be set free and for her savior to appear. As you reflect on the first reading and upon this hymn, bring your own deepest desires to the Lord. Spend some time in prayer asking for what you need to draw closer to God.



Emmanuel

Emmanuel is God-with-us in the cancer clinic and in the Alzheimer's ward at the local nursing home. Emmanuel is God-with-us when the pink slip comes and when the beloved child sneers, "I hate you!" Emmanuel is God-with-us when you pack the Christmas decorations away and, with an aching heart, you realize afresh that your one son never did call over the holidays. Not once. Emmanuel is God-with-us when your dear wife or mother stares at you with an Alzheimer's glaze and absently asks, "What was your name again?"

Ever and always Jesus stares straight into you with his two good eyes and he does so not only when you can smile back but most certainly also when your own eyes are full of tears. In fact, Jesus is Emmanuel, "God with you" even in those times when you are so angry with God that you refuse to meet his eyes. But even when you feel like you can't look at him, he never looks away from you. He can't. His name says it all.



Emmanuel

G. K. Chesterton, the noted British poet and theologian, was a brilliant man who could think deep thoughts and express them well. However, he was also extremely absent-minded and over the years he became rather notorious for getting lost. He would just absolutely forget where he was supposed to be and what he was supposed to be doing. On one such occasion, he sent a telegram to his wife which carried these words: "Honey, seems I'm lost again. Presently, I am at Market Harborough. Where ought I to be?" As only a spouse could say it, she telegraphed back a one-word reply "HOME!"

This is precisely what this classic passage in the first chapter of Matthew does for us... it brings us home...

- -- Home to the real meaning of Christmas
- -- Home to the most magnificent truth in the entire Bible
- -- Home to our Lord's greatest promise
- -- Home to the reason we celebrate Christmas

Namely this: "GOD IS WITH US!" When we accept Christ into our lives, nothing, not even death, can separate us from God and His love. It is what Christmas is about. God is with us. The great people of faith have always claimed that promise. Just think of it:

- -- Moses caught between the Pharaoh and the deep Red Sea in a seemingly hopeless situation believed that God was with him and he went forward and trusted God to open a way and He did!
- -- Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego went into the fiery furnace into a seemingly hopeless situation and they trusted God to be with them and He was!
- -- Little David stood before Goliath. What chance could a small boy with a slingshot have against this giant of a warrior? But David believed that God was with him, and it made all the difference He was!

Now, it's interesting to note that when the writer of Matthew's gospel wanted to capture the meaning of Christmas, the meaning of the Christ event, the meaning of Jesus in a single word, he did a very wise thing. He reached back into the Old Testament, pulled out an old word, dusted it off, and used it to convey the message:

The word was Emmanuel – God With Us!

"They didn't let me call the school to let them know what was happening. They denied me any chance to communicate with my children. It was so cruel!"

"All these years I've worked hard to support my kids. I have never committed a crime or even a violation, and my children are citizens. The only thing I have left is to trust that God will take care of them while I'm gone."



CATHOLIC QUIZ 21 December 2025

This week's Question: "What is a parochial vicar?"

The answer to last week's Question: "How many candles must be on/near the altar?"

The simple answer is at least two. The two candles represent the two Natures of Christ: Divine and Human, because JESUS is the "Light of the World". But typically four or six candles, especially for Sunday Mass or a holy day of obligation can be used. The six candles on the retablo (or high altar) recall the seven-branched candelabra in the Jewish Temple, with Christ Himself as the Seventh, again, because He is the Light of the World! Seven-branched candelabra are also used during Eucharistic exposition or adoration, but there is no specific number legislated.

SOUL FOOD 21 December 2025

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Parish Hall Request

Outrageous! Unbelievable! How can this be?

These are typical responses from people, after someone with no authority, but with good intentions, yet not clear on the facts, has shared what they think the cost of renting our parish hall might be. Unfortunately, the terms and dollar amounts (thousands of dollars) that are often stated are incorrect, misleading, and alarming.

This misrepresentation and dissemination of wrong information frequently cause much anxiety and grief. It bewilders and hurts the people or families who approach the church with a simple request and honest inquiry.

Anger and resentment sometimes develop that negatively affects relationships between community members, parishioners, and parish administration. This sad result is divisive and certainly damages the good work in ministry we strive to live as disciples.

I think we can do better, I know we can do better. We must do better.

Please, help our parish to do better by directing all inquiries regarding our parish hall availability and rental fees to your parish pastoral administrator. He is the only one who can speak factually on the matter.

So many factors and life situations must be considered before deciding on a rental fee. My meeting with the people inquiring, and later with our parish hall volunteer manager, enables the facts of the request to guide our work so the terms established will be compliant, fair, and pastoral. Anything less is a disservice to the people and our faith community.

Again, please direct all inquiries regarding our parish hall availability and rental fees to me your parish pastoral administrator.

Your attention to this request and understanding are appreciated and will help reduce the spread of wrong information and ensure that we are doing our best for the good of the people we serve.


