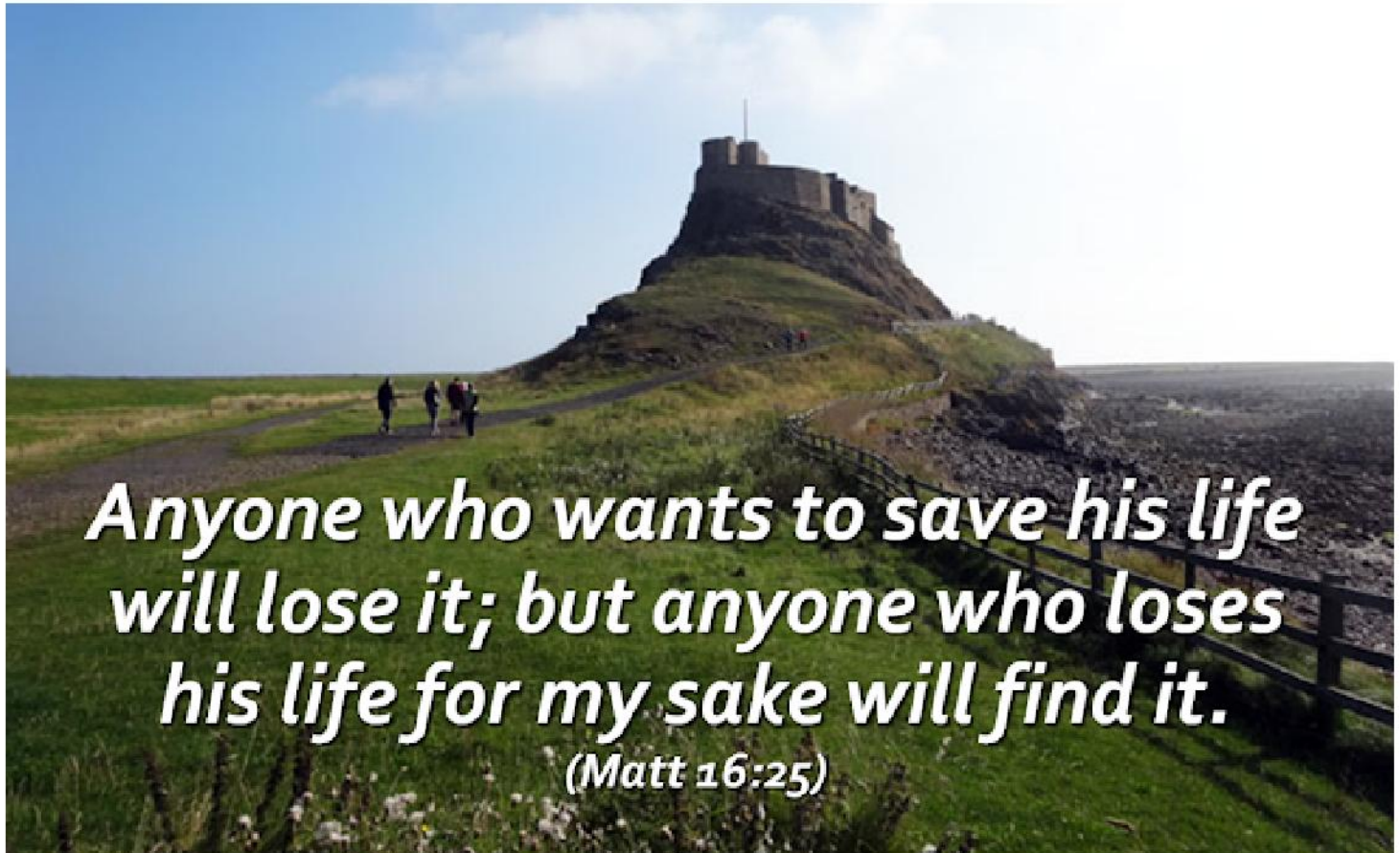

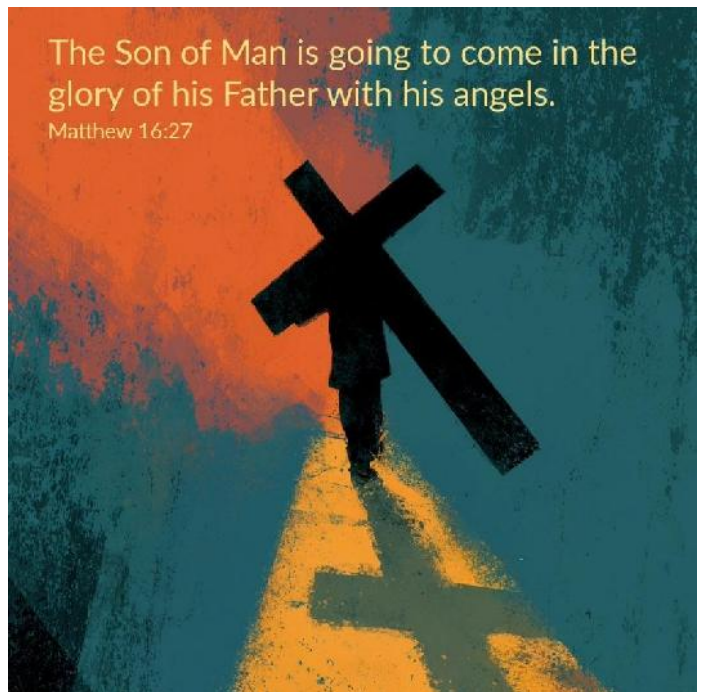

Peter the obstacle. Just last week, he was Peter the rock, the one who received the keys to the kingdom. A couple weeks before that we heard of Peter the brave, daring to walk on water during a fierce storm. But today he objects when Jesus says he will be persecuted and killed by the authorities in Jerusalem. Peter is likely only saying what all the disciples feel. They expect their journey to Jerusalem to end with their Messiah anointed king—not executed. But Jesus did not come to fulfill human expectations or achieve worldly triumph. Peter’s demand is an obstacle on the way to the cross that Jesus knows he must accept. So Jesus turns it around and tells the disciples that they too must deny their ambitions, carry their crosses, and be willing to give their lives for his sake. They must exchange their own wills for the Father’s will, just as he had taught them to pray. This is what Jesus continues to call his disciples to do today. As Paul urges the Romans, “offer your bodies as a living sacrifice,” as Jesus himself did, following God’s will, doing what we wisely discern is good and pleasing to God (Romans 12:1).

What do you need to sacrifice in order to do what is good and pleasing to God?

Twenty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jer 20:7-9 | Rom 12:1-2 | Mt 16:21-27

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Peter, understandably, responded to Christ's foreshadowing of his death with shock and horror – insisting that Jesus would not suffer and die. But Christ's words to his disciples taught them all to respond with humble obedience, trusting in the mission of God without fully understanding it. And Jeremiah in the first reading felt that God had “duped” him. Perhaps the message here is to expect the unexpected when taking on a life of holiness. In my own vocations of marriage, motherhood, and teaching, I regularly encounter challenges and surprises. As disciples, when we discern the will of God in our lives and choose to live according to his will, we do so not because we know all that it will entail, but because we know and trust the One who calls us. We are not promised an easy life, but we are promised abundant life. God calls us to a life of holiness because he knows that is what will bring us fulfillment and peace.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

In the process of discernment, we consider our gifts and talents, humbly reflect upon what is needed to build the kingdom of God, and listen carefully in prayer to the voice of God. We have the immense gifts of Sacred Tradition and Scripture to facilitate the “renewal of [the] mind” (Rom 12:2) as we allow our minds and hearts to be transformed by God's will. And in humble obedience, we must be honest with ourselves about whether we are fully open to God's call, even when it is contrary to our plans. When we believe with our entire being that we are living according to God's will, we will not be able to remain quiet or live in a mediocre way. Just as Jeremiah was unable to keep himself from speaking on the Lord's behalf, the Good News of Christ will come pouring forth from our being in everything that we do. And in this outpouring of God's love, we will give others the opportunity to encounter Christ through us.

REFLECT

Spend some time this week considering the vocation to which you are being called. Reflect upon how you can grow in trust of God to depend upon his care and guidance as you serve according to his will. Although our specific call may be challenging and may seem overwhelming, we can trust in the promise that following God's will leads to a life of joy and peace.

Lectio Divina



Lectio Divina for the Twenty-Second Week in Ordinary Time

We begin our prayer:

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

God of might, giver of every good gift,
put into our hearts the love of your name,
so that, by deepening our sense of reverence,
you may nurture in us what is good
and, by your watchful care,
keep safe what you have nurtured.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son,
who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the
Holy Spirit,
God, for ever and ever.

(Collect, Twenty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time)

Reading (*Lectio*)

Read the following Scripture two or three times.
Matthew 16:21-27

Jesus began to show his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem and suffer greatly from the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed and on the third day be raised. Then Peter took Jesus aside and began to rebuke him, “God forbid, Lord! No such thing shall ever happen to you.” He turned and said to Peter, “Get behind me, Satan! You are an obstacle to me. You are thinking not as God does, but as human beings do.”

Then Jesus said to his disciples, “Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me. For whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it. What profit would there be for one to gain the whole world and forfeit his life? Or what can one give in exchange for his life? For the Son of Man will come with his angels in his Father’s glory, and then he will repay all according to his conduct.”

Meditation (*Meditatio*)

After the reading, take some time to reflect in silence on one or more of the following questions:

- What word or words in this passage caught your attention?
- What in this passage comforted you?
- What in this passage challenged you?

If practicing lectio divina as a family or in a group, after the reflection time, invite the participants to share their responses.

Prayer (*Oratio*)

Read the Scripture passage one more time. Bring to the Lord the praise, petition, or thanksgiving that the Word inspires in you.

Contemplation (*Contemplatio*)

Read the Scripture again, followed by this reflection:

What conversion of mind, heart, and life is the Lord asking of me?

Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me. How can acts of self-denial help me to grow in faith? How can acts of self-denial help me to grow in solidarity with the poor?

For whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it. How do I show respect for God's gift of life? How can I offer support to those whose lives are not valued?

For the Son of Man will come with his angels in his Father's glory, and then he will repay all according to his conduct. How am I preparing my soul for God's judgment? How can I grow in my reliance on God's justice and mercy?

After a period of silent reflection and/or discussion, all recite the Lord's Prayer and the following:

Closing Prayer

O God, you are my God whom I seek;
for you my flesh pines and my soul thirsts
like the earth, parched, lifeless and without water.

Thus have I gazed toward you in the sanctuary
to see your power and your glory,
For your kindness is a greater good than life;
my lips shall glorify you.

Thus will I bless you while I live;
lifting up my hands, I will call upon your name.
As with the riches of a banquet shall my soul be
satisfied,
and with exultant lips my mouth shall praise you.

You are my help,
and in the shadow of your wings I shout for joy.
My soul clings fast to you;
your right hand upholds me.

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Take It Up



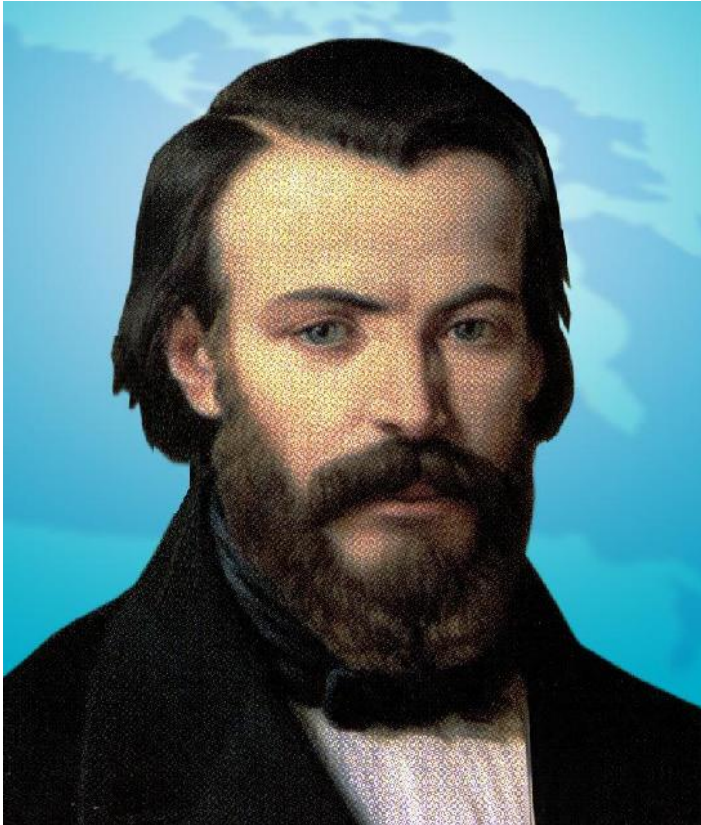
Two young brothers were caught stealing sheep. The punishment was to brand the thief's forehead with the letters **ST** which stood for Sheep Thief.

As a result of this, one brother left the village and spent his remaining years wandering from place to place indelibly marked by disgrace. The other remained in the village, made restitution for the stolen sheep, and became a caring friend and neighbor to the townspeople. He lived out his life in the village--an old man loved by all.

One day a stranger came to town and inquired about the **ST** on the old man's forehead. "I'm not sure what it means," another told him. "It happened so long ago, but I think the letters must stand for saint."

We have a choice. We can lay down the cross we have been given to bear and passively live life with no challenge to change or we can take it up and be transformed, living for something greater than ourselves: The Kingdom of God.

The choice is ours. Take it up!



Inspired By Love

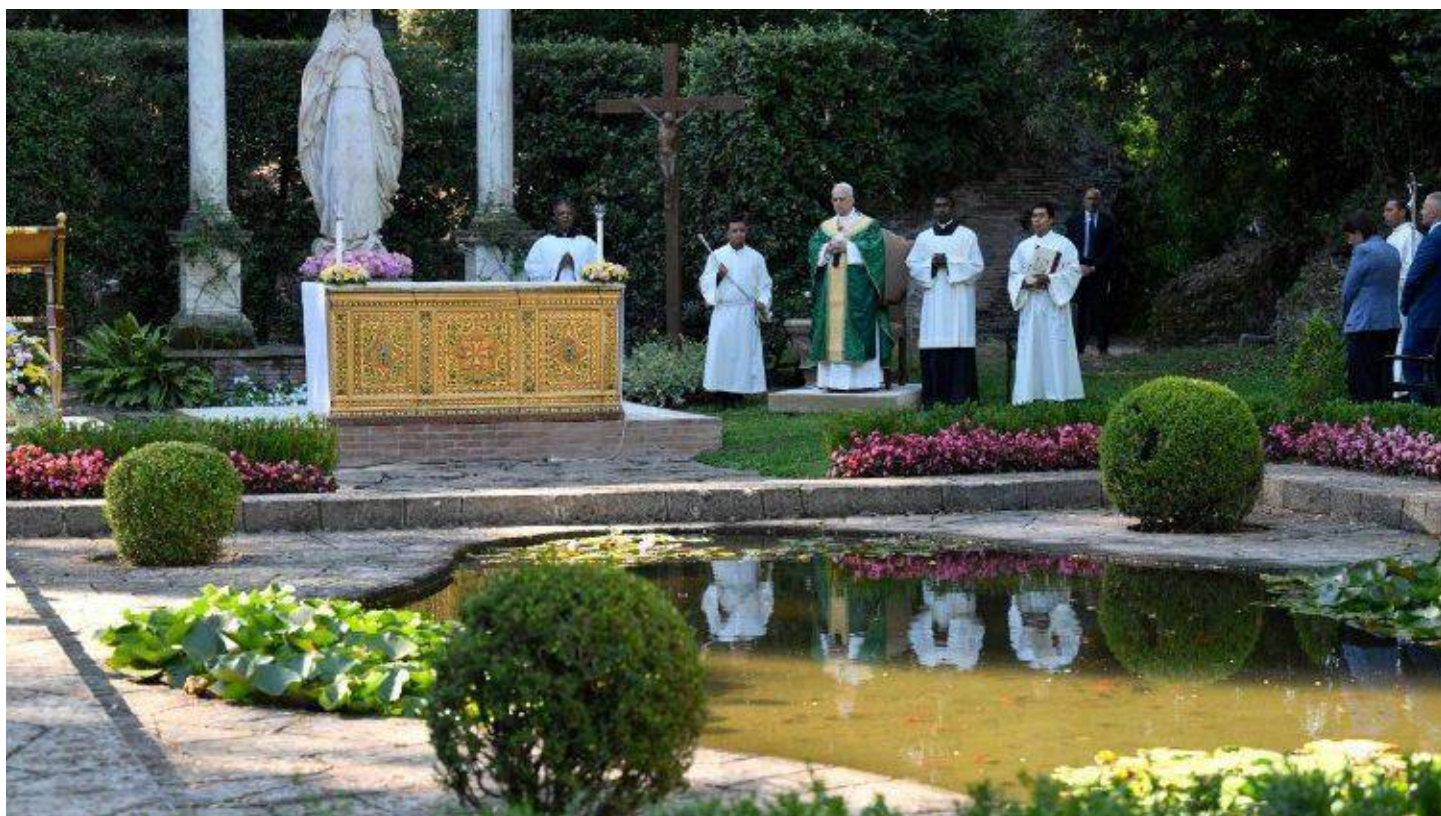
Frederic Ozanam was a Frenchman whose life of only forty years ended in 1853. The France in which he lived remained torn as a result of the French Revolution in the late 1700s. The Roman Catholic Church had suffered the loss, not only of property and power, but of many lives, and its leadership had become reactionary. As a result, the Church, and even Christianity itself, was treated with distrust by the working class and with disdain by many

intellectuals.

Ozanam was in his late teens when he arrived at the University of Paris to study law. He was appalled to encounter there an atmosphere of bitter hostility to the Christian faith. With a number of his fellow students, he formed a study circle in order to present a positive intellectual witness to their faith. The group engaged in many debates and public controversies on behalf of Christianity. Then one day, a student threw at Ozanam this derisive challenge: "You Christians are fine at arguing, but what do you ever do?"

It was in that moment that young Frederic Ozanam was struck by a basic insight: Christianity is not about ideas, but about deeds inspired by love. His fine arguments were useless unless they were validated by how he lived his life. He resolved to start a fellowship of Christian lay people who would immerse themselves in the world of the poor and perform acts of service at personal sacrifice. This fellowship became the St. Vincent de Paul Society.

In making this commitment, Frederic Ozanam died to himself. He picked up his cross, and followed after Jesus.



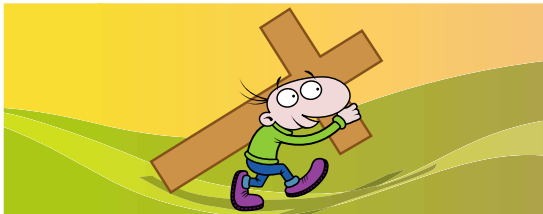
Care of Creation

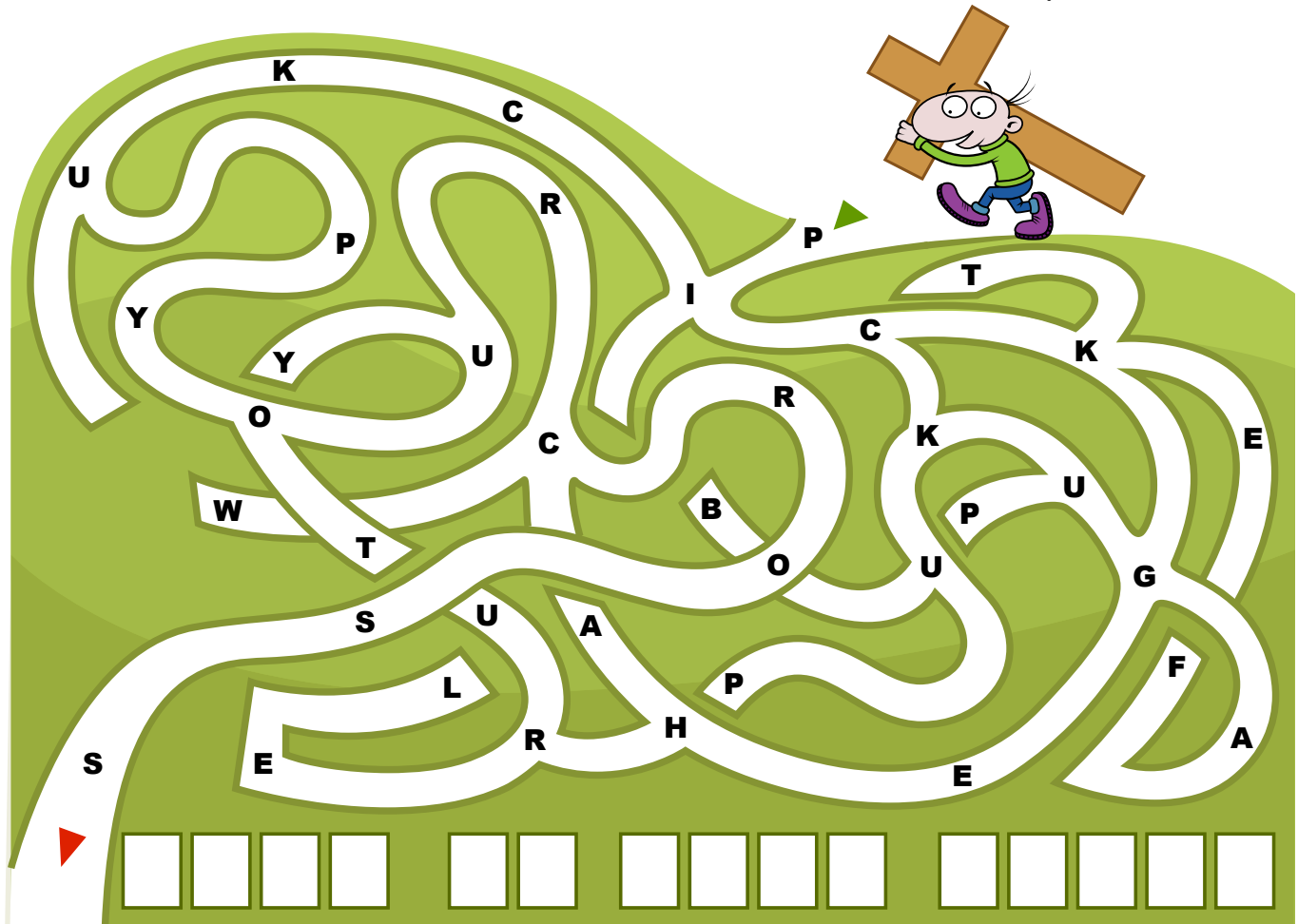

CATHOLIC QUIZ 30 August 2026

This week's Question: "What is the 'Nave' of a church?"

The answer to last week's Question: "What is a 'Chancel'?"

The Chancel is the area around the altar reserved for the clergy and those assisting them at Mass. It comes from the Roman custom of separating lawyers from the public in court by a lattice screen (Latin: cancellus, screen). The word "Chancery" is also derived from this legal term. Before the liturgical reforms of 1963, the Chancel (also called 'the Sanctuary') was divided from the nave of the church by an 'altar rail' – strictly setting the limits to which laypersons could approach the altar. This 'screening' of the altar was an 'Imperial innovation' following the legalization of Christianity in 325 AD, it was unknown in the early Church! With the restored understanding of the Mass as being 'offered' by all of those present, altar rails as a symbol of limited access were removed, and Lectors, Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist, and Servers – all members of the Laity – now serve in the Chancel with the clergy.

BELFAST/DOWNPATRICK/BELFAST

WED, OCT 20

Once a major industrial city known especially for its master ship builders, Belfast has transformed itself into a major cultural center. On your morning sightseeing tour in this Victorian designed city you will see Queens University and the Titanic Quarter where the tragic liner was built. Also view the City Hall built in 1903 and the Albert Memorial Clock Tower. This afternoon, drive south to the town of Downpatrick to visit the burial site of St. Patrick. Return to Belfast for the night. **(B,D)**

BELFAST/GIANT'S CAUSEWAY/DERRY

THU, OCT 21

Depart today and drive along the northeastern coast to view the Nine Glens of Antrim and continue to visit the famous Giant's Causeway. It is one of nature's most spectacular wonders—40,000 six-sided symmetrical lava columns that range in size from 2 inches to 36 feet. The causeway was formed by volcanic activity over 60 million years ago and today is recognized as a World Conservation site. Continue to Derry for a walking tour including the Guildhall with its famous stained-glass windows and the historic Walls of Derry. **(B,D)**

DERRY/DONEGAL/KNOCK SHRINE/GALWAY
FRI, OCT 22

This morning journey through County Donegal and drive along the Barnesmore Gap past the Blue Stack mountain range and the picturesque Donegal Town. Continue to follow the western coast through "Yeats Country" and head south to County Mayo to visit the village of Knock. Regarded, as the premier place of pilgrimage and shrine to our Lady in Ireland, it was here in Knock that the blessed Mother appeared at the little parish church in 1879. Later continue to your hotel in the Galway area Galway for overnight. **(B,D)**

GALWAY/CONNEMARA/GALWAY
SAT, OCT 23

Today, drive through the wild, majestic Connemara region, home of Aran knits. Your tour embraces the rugged country lying between Lough Corrib and the Atlantic Ocean, a breathtaking region of mountains, lakes and tiny cottages, visiting Leenane, Clifden, and Kylemore Lakes. Here, St. Patrick fasted for 40 days and nights. Return to the Galway area for overnight. **(B)**

GALWAY/CLIFFS OF MOHER/KILLARNEY
SUN, OCT 24

Depart Galway today stopping enroute in a local village to see the awe-inspiring Cliffs of Moher soaring hundreds of feet above the sea. Continue south through County Clare. Drive by the picturesque village of Ardara to Killarney, located in the kingdom of Kerry. **(B,D)**

RING OF KERRY

MON, OCT 25

Today you have an opportunity to enjoy what is perhaps Ireland's most breathtaking tour.
