- Support recorded as Ordinarily Available, Targeted, or Specialist

& What Do We Offer Additionally?

- Time-bound interventions to close learning gaps

- Outcomes agreed with pupils and parents

□ What Kind of Special Educational Needs Is Provision Made For?

We support needs across four broad areas:

- Communication & Interaction: Speech, Language, Autism
- Cognition & Learning: General and specific learning difficulties (e.g. Dyslexia)
- Social, Emotional & Mental Health: ADHD, ODD, Anxiety

 Sensory & Physical: Visual/Hearing impairments, Sensory Processing Disorder

Q Targeted Provision

- Children with SEND receive support additional to and different from peers
- Added to the SEND register at **School Support** level
- Specialist Support for complex needs with an EHCP

□ How Do We Identify That a Child Has a Special Educational Need?

- Entry assessments and prior attainment
- · Observations, classroom data, and behaviour tracking
- · Parent meetings and external advice
- · Identification based on progress and attainment gaps
- Support determined through Assess-Plan-Do-Review

♦□ How Does the School Know If My Child Needs Extra Help?

- Concerns raised by parents, teachers, or the child
- Progress tracking and pupil progress meetings
- Changes in behaviour or academic performance

&& Consulting and Involving Pupils and Parents

- Early discussions to understand strengths, concerns, and desired outcomes
- Parents share strategies and long-term goals
- Notes recorded in the pupil's file and APDR document

- Formal notification when SEN support begins
- Contributions from families via meetings, reviews, and pupil voice

- SEND Support Plans created by Class Teacher
- Monitored by SENCO
- Follows Assess-Plan-Do-Review cycle
- Shared with parents for feedback
- EHCP outcomes tracked and reviewed

M Assessing and Reviewing Pupils' Progress Towards Outcomes

- Teachers and SENCO analyse pupil needs using:
 - o Assessments, prior attainment, behaviour
 - o Parent and pupil views
 - o External advice if needed
- Staff informed of strategies and goals
- Progress and impact of support reviewed regularly

Who Will Be Working With My Child?

- Class Teacher and Teaching Assistants
- SENCO and support staff

External agencies (with parental consent) may visit and advise

□ What Assessment Arrangements Are in Place to Support My Child?

- Baseline data collected to plan provision
- Graduated response: Assess → Plan → Do → Review
- Universal support through Quality First Teaching
- · Targeted and specialist support as needed
- Additional resources or adult support provided
- Referrals to external agencies made with consent

How Will the Academy Monitor the Effectiveness of Its SEND Arrangements and Provision?

- SENCO monitors APDR cycles and provision impact
- Feedback shared with Headteacher and senior leaders
- Monitoring includes drop-ins, work scrutiny, pupil voice
- DEMAT conducts audits and quality assurance
- Termly meetings with Trust Lead for Inclusion

■ Curriculum Concerns

Adaptations to the Curriculum and Learning Environment

- Quality First Teaching is the foundation
- Staff plan and scaffold learning based on individual needs
- Adaptations include:
- Grouping, 1:1 support, varied teaching styles
- Use of aids: laptops, overlays, visual timetables, large fonts
- Longer processing time, pre-teaching vocabulary, reading aloud

- All teachers are responsible for every child's progress
- Teaching is adapted for individual needs
- Interventions include:
- SoundsWrite
- Maths on Track Meetings
- Targeted Reading
- Speech & Language
- Sensory Circuits
- Pre/Post Teaching

- Attention Autism
- Lego Therapy

□ Partnership: Planning, Monitoring and Review

What Do We Offer to Parents and Carers?

- Termly meetings with Class Teacher to review SEND Support Plans
- Annual EHCP reviews for children with plans
- Informal discussions, phone calls, and virtual meetings available
- SENCO available for appointments

Evaluating the Effectiveness of SEN Provision

- Termly progress reviews
- · Impact of interventions assessed
- Pupil and parent questionnaires
- SENCO and DEMAT monitoring
- Provision maps used to track progress
- Annual EHCP reviews include pupil voice

♥ Support for Improving Emotional and Social Development

- Access to PSHE/RSE curriculum
- Small group and 1:1 Emotional Literacy sessions
- SEND pupils encouraged to take on leadership roles
- Consistent Behaviour Curriculum taught across school
- Daily wellbeing monitored by staff
- SENCO oversees pastoral, medical, and social support
- · Liaison with health professionals for care plans
- Staff trained in Paediatric First Aid

- Collective Worship
- Lego Therapy
- · Road safety, online safety, anti-bullying
- Referrals to Early Intervention Family Worker
- APDR targets reviewed with pupils before/during parent meetings
