



Progress report, July 2025

We are prepping the fuselage, tip tanks and horizontal stabilizer for transport to a paint facility for paint stripping. The keel beam and doors have been reinstalled to prevent the fuselage from twisting or bending during lifting and transport.

The parts room has been set up and we now have a couple of volunteers that are developing the inventory control system and ordering parts.

When the airplane comes back from paint strip, we will remove the windows, finish the internal foam removal and get the Non-Destructive Inspection (NDI) started. We will then start repairing or removing any corrosion that is found on the skins and structure. Also, we are looking into a potential repair of the discovered wing corrosion.

We will also get the wing leading edges cleaned up and inspected for any excessive corrosion.

It is with great sadness that we announce the loss of Sharkey Baz on July 15, 2025. He had a long and personal connection with 23-003 when she was registered as N3BL. Sharkey was Chief Pilot for 23-003 N3BL and came to own her at one point. He was the last guy to fly her before she was put into storage at Bartow Executive Airport, Bartow, Florida. Sharkey came out to the Bartow airport to visit 23-003 N3BL on February 21, 2023 as we were preparing to disassemble her for her long truck ride back to Wichita. He told us many stories of flying 23-003 and asked if he could climb aboard. He said that since he was at the controls when 23-003 last put her wheels on the ground almost 20 years ago, he wanted to be at the controls when they come off the ground again. So, with Sharkey in the pilot's seat, we jacked 23-003 to get the wheels off of the ground. Not exactly what he had in mind!

Greenwood CollectionProgress

In May we hired Kayla Nelson, an experienced archivist, to help organize, inventory and preserve the Jim Greenwood Collection. Here is her latest report:

Significant progress has been made on the ongoing archival organization efforts for the Jim Greenwood Collection. I have completed the assessment of 70 boxes of books, determining appropriate disposition or collection accession. Once the materials designated for disposition are removed from the storage unit, shelving can be installed. I am pleased to report that work has begun on a collection preservation plan that will establish protocols for maintaining the integrity and longevity of the Jim Greenwood Collection. Additionally, Catalogit collection management software has been implemented, which will streamline documentation, improve search capabilities, and enhance overall collection accessibility. These efforts represent important steps toward establishing professional archival standards for the Classic Lear Jet Foundation's collections.

60 years Ago

The first seminar for Lear Jet pilots, an industry first, was held on June 29, 1965.

Frank Sinatra took his 23-031 N175FS on a 10 day, 17,000 mile trip to Europe, Israel, etc.





23-028 N818LJ left Dallas, Texas on June 22, 1965 on a three week tour of Europe not missing a single ETA by more than 15 minutes! She was the 1st Lear Jet to cross the Atlantic Ocean by both the northern and southern routes. They flew 15,000 miles over 21 days.

23-028A N803LJ was the 1st Lear Jet in Latin American and flew a four day demonstration tour in Caracas, Venezuela. Every 30 minutes the Caracas radio broadcast: "The jet aircraft flying over the city is not from the military and does not mean a revolution. It's a Lear Jet from America giving demonstrations!"

Executive Jet Aviation (EJA) operates eight Lear Jets as an air-taxi averaging 150 hours flying time each month. The Lear Jet is the only business jet approved for air-taxi operations.

Bill Lear, Sr. is the 1st man in history to design, build and win certification for a jet airplane....all with his own money too!

A new Model 23 is priced at \$595.000. Lear Jet now has 120 firm orders!

Father Richard Spellman, Vice president of the National Association of Priest Pilots, becomes the 1st clergyman in the world to earn the coveted Lear Jet Gold Pin.
