



### **Progress report, September 2025**

A major step in the restoration of 23-003 N200Y was achieved on September 9, 2025 when it returned from having the paint stripped from the fuselage, tip tanks and horizontal stabilizer. As you can see in the photos below, we will have to manually remove the remaining bits of paint.

The next step is to complete some additional dry ice blasting and remove the windshield and windows then start the Non-Destructive Inspections (NDI) of the fuselage structure. This will identify any structural components, skin, frames, etc. that will require repair or replacement.

The crew that stripped the paint paused in front of the fuselage of 23-003 just before it was loaded onto a Patton Trucking trailer for the trip back to building 14. They are (not in order in the photo): Dave Lewis, Kevin Dome, Harold Haviland, Will Brown, Joseph Irwin, Adam Biggs and Jay Prideaux (not pictured).

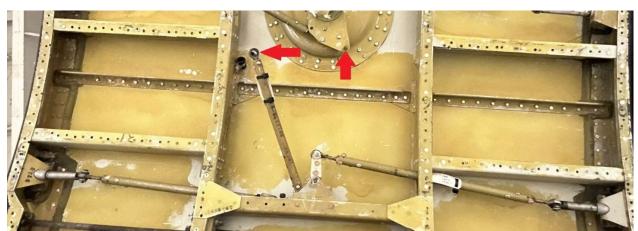
Also, *THANK YOU* to Patton Trucking for donating their equipment and personnel to take 23-003 to the paint stripping facility and bring her home again.





### All in a Day's Work!

After 23-003 returned from having the paint stripped we discovered the upper cabin door could not be opened. The external door handle turned but, it would not open! The upper door must be opened first in order to open the lower door. We were locked out of the airplane!! We could not get in through the emergency exit because the Model 23 does not have an external release handle. We were thinking that we would have to break a window to get in. Then Bill Kinkaid had the idea of using a broom stick through a hole in the bottom of fuselage, where the lower beacon light had been removed, to reach the interior release handle on the emergency exit door. It worked! Dan DeMott climbed inside through the now open emergency exit and was able to open the upper cabin door from the inside. It was discovered that the bolt on the inside of the external door handle was missing, preventing the retraction of the cabin door latching pins. This bolt held the rod that actuates the door pin mechanism. The bolt fell out sometime during the trip to have the paint stripped. This prevented two of the upper cabin door latching pins from retracting and allowing the door to open.

He was shown the CJ610-1 engines from 23-003. They have been disassembled, tagged, racked awaiting the start of overhaul to coincide with the restoration of Lear Jet 23-003. Chris got to see first-hand the capabilities of ITI for overhaul of General Electric CJ610 (engine type on 23-003), Honeywell TFE731, JT15D and PW500 series jet engines. ITI has full NDI and test cell capabilities in their expanded facility. CLJF is grateful to ITI for their fantastic support of the restoration of Lear Jet 23-003 to flying condition!

### **60 Years Ago**

The first meeting of shareholders was held on September 11, 1965 with about 100 in attendance.

Wichita employees now number 1,700!

Southeast Airlines evaluated the Lear Jet as a 'third level air carrier'. They flew from Miami, Florida to Key West and back at 500 mph. More the twice the speed of their current Twin Beech!





Dr Wernher Von Braun is flown coast to coast by a Lear Jet from his evening speaking engagement in San Francsico to Cape Kennedy in plenty of time to witness a 3:30 am series of test firings of the Saturn rocket.

Bill Lear addressed employees on September 15, 1965. Here is an excerpt from his speech that gives some insight into him:

"Few people realize the inroads that we have made in the aviation industry. The Lear Jet is getting the respect of the world," said Mr. Lear. "This respect that we are beginning to get makes it doubly important for us to bend over backwards to not only earn it but to deserve it and this means that of course we will expect to be even more perfect. A reason is the fact that we haven't sat down and said 'Well, we'll make this change on the second hundred,' or we'll make this on the next hundred.' Some of the things we have done--I could be criticized for, because I've said let's fix it now, lets make it retroactive, but it hasn't been foolish for one reason: It has generated this tremendous respect for our product."
