



Progress report, October 2025

We continue to work toward preparing 23-003 for the Non-Destructive Inspection (NDI) phase of her restoration. The cabin windows were removed on October 8, 2025.

As of October 9, 2025, we are moving forward with the preparation efforts for the removal of the windshields. Lee Aerospace will do the actual removals in order to accurately manufacture duplicate windshields to fit into the existing structural framework and fastener hole pattern. Lee Aerospace will also manufacture new cabin windows for 23-003 N200Y!

We are going through the wiring from each connector in the wiring bundle, that was previously removed from 23-003, comparing each wire to the production wiring diagrams to identify the purpose of each wire. This information will be used when we build the new wiring harness to ensure that it accurately covers all of the needs of 23-003.

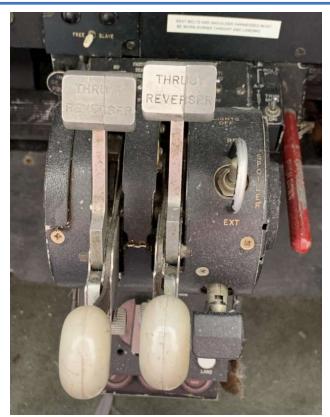

She was modified sometime after her original delivery to install thrust reversers. Since we intend to restore 23-003 back to her original configuration, we will need to replace the current throttle quadrant with a non-thrust reverser original version.

60 Years Ago

At the 1965 NBAA show in Los Angeles, Bill Lear announces the new Lear Jet Model 40, "Lear Liner". Two seating configurations were to be offered: a 28-passenger airliner version or one with an executive interior. The 10th Lear Liner was sold at the show, which happened to be the exact number of sales that Bill said he needed to start production!



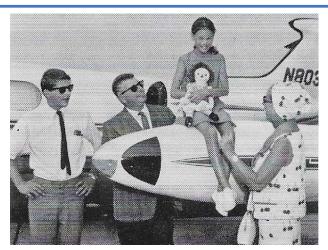
Lear Jet Model 40 "Lear Liner" model

Bill Lear, Jr., 37, was elected to the Lear Jet Board of Directors.

Bill Lear, Sr. and family flew 23-045A N803LJ to Europe on a 10-country tour of Europe. It was the first time the Bill Lear, Sr. had been back to Altenrhein, Switzerland since moving the company and production of the Lear Jet Model 23 (formerly SAAC 23) to Wichita, Kansas in 1962. Being a demonstration airplane, 23-045A N803LJ was sold at the conclusion of their European trip. The Lear family flew back to Wichita by commercial airline.
