Progress report, January 2026

We are making great progress in getting all the removed parts identified with part numbers and returned to the storage racks. We are working with Katie Yaverski to get all the racks identified and labeled for location identification.

We are moving forward with a partnership with S.E.A.L. Aviation for overhaul and repair of numerous items and components! They will be a great asset to CLJF and the efforts to rebuild 23-003.

The wing from of 23-003 is now in a stored position on its leading edge against the south hangar wall in order to give us some additional working room in the hangar.

We are building the last cradle to hold the fuselage in position so we can remove some of the skins that need to be replaced and facilitate the completion of the NDI Inspection. When Hartney Hummer finishes the last cradle, for the aft fuselage, we will secure all the cradles and supports in position to ensure no shifting occurs while the skins are removed.

Careful disassembly of the throttle quadrant, recently donated by Kevin Betson in November 2025, has started. All parts will be cleaned, inspected and repaired or replaced if needed, then during reassembly, we will be replacing all the wiring, electrical components and a new overlay will be installed. We are currently looking for a new flap switch P/N MS25125-B1 / 8857K40. Do you have one or know where we can find one?

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2025 In Review

Wow another fantastic year for 23-003 N200Y and the Classic Lear Jet Foundation!

2025 started with the purchase of many tools and airplane jacks from a local auction. In January, all cables, tubes, wiring, plumbing, controls, etc. were removed with the exception of the main wire bundle at the aft pressure bulkhead. Next, we mounted the wing in the 'rotisserie' tool, removed the fuselage fuel bladders and started to manually remove the fuselage interior foam.

All of the remaining wire harnesses of the total 2 1/3 miles of 60 year old wiring and the fuselage fuel bladders were removed by the end of March.

On April 26, 2025 the registration number "N200Y" was officially assigned to 23-003 by the FAA!

In late April through early May, we followed the progress of Captain Bart Gray, President of Global Jetcare (also CLJF Vice President) and the Global Jet Care flight crew as they circumnavigated both poles from south to north in Learjet 36A-022 N31GJ to earn the coveted Polar Circumnavigation Diploma. The flight, named 'The Polar Mission', was dedicated to William Powell (Bill) Lear, Junior and made on behalf of Classic Lear Jet Foundation. The Polar Mission flight was entirely funded by Bart Gray and Global Jetcare. This allowed the Classic Lear Jet Foundation to use the flight for our fundraising efforts to restore 23-003 through sponsorships for each leg of the flight and the sale of mission patches and stickers (donated by Bart Gray) and t-shirts. We had launch party, bon voyage and welcome home events. Many well-wishers watched 36A-022 N31GJ takeoff from the Learjet factory, where she was built in 1976 (49 years prior), at 7:02 pm on April 30th and land back in Wichita at 2:10 pm on May 5th with zero issues (squawks) throughout the entire mission. Lilly Wu, Wichita Mayor, was in attendance to welcome home Bart and crew. She read a proclamation declaring May 5, 2025 as "Classic Lear Jet Foundation - Polar Mission Day". She also presented each crew member with a Certificate of Excellence on behalf of the City of Wichita.

Starting on May 9th we began removing the remaining foam in the fuselage by using the new technique of *dry ice* blasting. Just like sand blasting except using dry ice pellets instead of sand. This method does not harm the metal, paint or sealant. Ryan Timesch, owner of Best Engineered Performance Coatings (BEPC), donated his time and equipment to save us the numerous labor hours that would have been necessary to manually scrape out the foam, helping us rapidly prepare for the necessary structural inspections.

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Also, in May, we hired archivist Kayla Nelson to inventory, catalog and preserve the numerous items in the 'Greenwood Collection'. She is going through every box, envelope, file, etc., cataloging each item and separating out duplicate and non-Learjet items.

On July 15, 2025 we mourned the loss of Sharkey Baz. He had a long and personal connection with 23-003, was Chief Pilot for 23-003 N3BL and came to own her at one point. He was the last pilot to fly her before she was put into storage at Bartow Executive Airport, Bartow, Florida. Sharkey came out to the Bartow airport to visit 23-003 N3BL on February 21, 2023 as we were preparing to disassemble her for her long truck ride back to Wichita. He enthusiastically supported our restoration and looked forward to flying her again.

In August, 23-003's fuselage, horizontal stabilizer and tip tanks were loaded up and taken to an anonymous donor to have their paint stripped. They returned in September. The cabin windows and cockpit windshields were removed in October allowing the start of the structural inspections. Also, each wire in the various harnesses was identified on drawings, their purpose determined, then their length measured and recorded in a 'cut file' to assist in the build of the new harness.

Pressure testing of the right wing began on September 2nd to verify that there were no leaks in the wing. Any leak would result in a fuel leak which would make the wing unusable. The wing passed the test!

International Turbine Industries (ITI), hosted a visit on September 27, 2025 from CLJF board member Chris Marshall. He was shown the CJ610-1 engines from 23-003. They have been disassembled, tagged and racked awaiting the start of overhaul to coincide with the restoration of Lear Jet 23-003.

Non-Destructive Inspection (NDI) testing started on the forward fuselage of 23-003 on December 11, 2025 by an anonymous donor who provided both the labor and the specialized equipment. Less than two years since we started the restoration of 23-003! NDI testing is a lengthy, slow and steady process that uses X-ray photography to detect structural defects such as corrosion, cracks, etc. NDI testing will continue into 2026.

During the course of the year, we spent considerable time evaluating the necessary repairs and restoration of 23-003's structure and systems. We made many field trips in search of aircraft structural and system components. Most of which are long obsolete. We found some, have leads on others and know that we will have to fabricate some.

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By the end of the year, we had surpassed **1,900** volunteer hours! **1,400** of these were in 2025!

CLJF is extremely grateful to our donors for services, like those mentioned above, components, fasteners, tools, fabrication of replacement parts, etc. We sincerely appreciate your very generous support to make 23-003 N200Y airworthy again.

60 Years Ago

In 1965, 158 business jets were delivered. Lear Jet delivered more than all other manufacturers combined: Lear Jet 80, Jet Commander 32, Sabreliner 28, Jetstar 18. Lear Jet delivered 14 of these airplanes in December.

The price of the new Model 24, currently in Flight Testing, was reduced to \$649,000 including paint and complete interior.

Model 40 Lear Liner is progressing toward scheduled 1st flight in the spring of 1967. A full-scale mockup is in work. It will have a full interior, one half in the passenger configuration and the other half in the executive configuration.

Ford Motor Company becomes the 1st car company to offer the 8-track system, beginning with the 1966 models. 8-track systems are now being shipped nationwide to Ford and Chrysler dealerships and to B.F. Goodrich and Sears Roebuck outlets.

23-048 N805LJ flies 3 round trips from the Sugar Bowl taking 15 fans home to New Orleans, Florida and Illinois covering 4,548 miles in 10 hours 50 minutes in a single day.
