

Charlie is a sports commentator for Darwin's ABC Radio. He is renown for his work in child protection and established the 'No More' initiative in 2006 which used sport to campaign against family violence in Australia. Charlie was awarded an Order of Australia Medal (OAM) for his service to broadcast media and the Indigenous community in 2015. This was upgraded to Member of the Order of Australia (AM) at the 2021 Queen's Birthday Honours for his service to the Indigenous community of the Northern Territory.

Charlie's topic will be "Reflections on the Territory".

Northern Territory Documentary Twenty to the Mile

Andrew Hyde's acclaimed film *Twenty to the Mile* sold out at its premiere showing at the Deckchair Cinema. There was so much demand to see it that people were turned away. Subsequently, a second showing a couple of weeks later also had a full house. The Q&A session after each viewing of *Twenty to the Mile* was also well attended. This should bode well for its future.

The film tells the story of Charles Todd's successful wiring of the Australian continent with the Overland Telegraph Line 150 years ago, and our subsequent telegraphic connection to London and Europe.

The star of the film is Australia. Hyde's awesome cinematography displays our country from the Flinders, through the desert and dust, to the tropics. The difficulties the OTL teams experienced, and the effect of their arrival on the Indigenous people who lived on their traditional lands, are treated with care and sensitivity, whilst not shying from the naked truth.

The producers were able to fund the film mostly via sponsorship, including from several dozen Darwin 'community sponsors'. "The help of friends and family got this film over the line. Without their support it's doubtful we would ever have been able to make it", said presenter Derek Pugh.

The film is yet to be sold, but there are several "irons in the fire" regarding television and film festival opportunities, and the producers are optimistic.
