# Celebrating the Great Air Race Centenary England to Australia (Darwin) 1919 - 2019 (10 December)

In 1919, the Australian government offered a prize of £A10,000 for the first Australians in a British aircraft to fly from Britain to Australia. Six entries started in the race with the winners being pilot Ross Smith, brother Keith Smith as co-pilot, and mechanics, Sergeants James Bennett and Wally Shiers, in a modified Vickers Vimy bomber.

The crew left Hounslow Heath, England at 8.30am on 12 November 1919. They flew via Lyon, Rome, Cairo, Damascus, Basra, Karachi, Delhi, Calcutta, Akyab, Rangoon racecourse, Singoa, Singapore, Batavia (Indonesia) and Surabaya where the aircraft was bogged and had to make use of a temporary airstrip made from bamboo mats. The crew reached Darwin at 3.40pm on 10 December 1919.

The flight distance was estimated to be 17,911 kilometres (11,123 miles) and total flying time was 135 hours 55 minutes over 29 days. The flight was an extraordinary achievement because it was not only the first flight to connect the two countries - but they also delivered the first airmail from England.

The prize money was shared between the crew and the Smith brothers received a knighthood. Their aircraft was presented to the Australian Government and is on display at Adelaide Airport.

#### The Naming of James Mallett Bennett Park, Muirhead - 7 December

The recognition of James Bennett's role in the Great Air Race had been neglected when considering the naming of roads. While Ross and Keith Smith and Wally Shiers had been acknowledged in the naming of streets in Fannie Bay and Ludmilla<sup>1</sup>, James Bennett was omitted from any street naming.

Due to the advocacy work by the Fannie Bay History and Heritage Society and in conjunction with the Place Names Committee, an unnamed park on the corner of Colin and Fuhrmann Streets, Muirhead was identified. Hon Nicole Susan Manison MLA. Deputy Chief Minister unveiled a plaque commemorating the James Mallett Bennett Park.

#### Re-enactment of the Flight of the Great Air Race

To honour the Great Air Race Centenary, 2016 Australian Geographic Adventurer of the Year, Michael Smith followed as much as possible, the original route from London to Darwin. Mike left Hounslow on 19 November in his *Southern Sun*, a custom built flying boat. In addition, he brought along a bag of commemorative mail postmarked in Hounslow which was distributed to mark the occasion.

Mike landed in Darwin Airport on 10 December at 3.45pm, the same time the Smith brothers landed their Vicker's Vimy. In accordance with tradition, Mike and his plane were greeted by water cannons from Territory fire trucks.
