### Thirty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

In today's Gospel Jesus challenges us to "Stay awake" by taking time to seriously look at ourselves, the priorities of our lives., and how we are

growing spiritually

Ask yourself "What would Jesus Christ do? And then remember those who are suffering in poverty. Support the Society of St. Vincent de Paul in prayer and donations so that we can assist our "Friends in need."

I was recently asked why we do "Home Visits" on those that request our help. Would it not be easier just to have them come to the office? Easier for us, but certainly not easier for those in need Transportation, child care, work hours, all complicate the issue for our "Friends" to come to us. Many other needs, others than those requested, become very evident on a "Home Visit." If you had a friend that needed your help you would not tell them to come to your office. But rather you would go to them. That is exactly what we do. In the tradition of our founder, Blessed Frederic Ozanam, "We go to the Poor." "Let us complain less of our times and more of ourselves. Let us learn of Him to forget ourselves, to devote ourselves to the service of God and the good of men." (Frederic Ozanam) We are still in need of personal hygiene items, shampoo, toilet paper, deodorant, ect., to bring on our home visits. Items may be placed in the basket in the entrance to church. ### MASS MINUTES By Deacon Ed Winter

At the Offertory, after asking God to accept the gifts, the celebrant prays, "With humble spirit and contrite heart may we be accepted by you, O Lord and may our *sacrifice* in your sight this day be pleasing to you, Lord God." and we respond, "May the Lord accept the *sacrifice* at your hands..." At the consecration of the bread and wine, the celebrant repeats the words of Jesus at the Last Supper, "This is my Body which is given for you..." and, "This cup that is poured out for you...", predicting the sacrifice he would make the next day. "Since Jesus is divine, all of his actions including and especially the sacrificial act by which he saved the world, participate in the eternity of God and, hence, can be made present at any point in time." (Bishop Robert Barron, *This is My Body*, p. 63)

**Therefore**, the sacrifice of Jesus 2000 years ago is not just "remembered" in the usual sense but is made present. When the celebrant receives the host, Jesus' life is consumed as it was consumed on the Cross not again but still. As St. Paul proclaimed, "As often as you eat the bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes." (1 Cor. 11:26) Next: More on the Sacrifice.

### Deacon's Corner By: Deacon Mark Bortle

Many may wonder what are the roles and responsibilities of Permanent Deacons. The Deacon's ministry, as Pope John Paul II has said, "is the Church's service sacramentalized." Within the Christian community the Deacon is particularly called to a ministry of service and presence. Some call the Deacon the bridge between the secular world and the church, since many Deacons work in a secular vocation. The Deacon is to call others to shared responsibility and ministry. He is further called to facilitate the ministry of others so that the priests are freed for their presidential and sacramental roles. He accomplishes this through his ministry of service, whether it be a ministry of Charity, Word or Liturgy. Each Deacon is expected to be involved in some aspect of these areas of ministry. The specific roles for each deacon will vary depending upon the gifts of the Deacon and the needs of his parish and community. The ministry of the word includes such things as proclamation of the Gospel, preaching, catechesis, and evangelization. The ministry of the liturgy includes such things as assisting at Mass, presiding at the liturgy of the word both with or without Communion, presiding at baptisms and marriages, presiding at funeral services, and presiding at Benediction and other devotional services. The ministry of charity, justice and pastoral outreach includes such things as reaching out to those who are poor or in need, being present to those who are on the margins of society, serving those who are lonely or hurting in any way, advocating for the dignity of al people, encouraging and facilitating the service work of others In addition to all of these roles, the Deacon is also able to bless sacramental items, such as rosaries and medals. Deacons are more than willing to talk to and walk with others through many of life's hardships. Feel free to contact one of the Deacons or Fr. Matthew if you have any questions.
