Why Latin Still Matters at Mass

You may notice that some prayers at Mass are sung or spoken in Latin—Sanctus (“Holy, Holy, Holy”), Agnus Dei (“Lamb of God”), or Kyrie eleison (“Lord, have mercy”). These aren’t just old words; they’re part of our unique Catholic identity.

Vatican II guidance: The Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy (Sacrosanctum Concilium), reminds us that “the use of the Latin language is to be preserved in the Latin rites” (SC 36). It also encourages the faithful to know and sing parts of the Mass in Latin (SC 54).

Our heritage: As members of the Latin Rite Church, Latin is our “mother tongue” of worship. It links us with Catholics across the world and across centuries.

Why it’s beautiful: Latin gives a sense of universality, connects us to tradition, and adds reverence and mystery to our prayer.

So when we sing Agnus Dei or the Sanctus in Latin, we’re not stepping back in time—we’re stepping into the living stream of our faith, united with the universal Church, across all time. What a gift!

I have a fear of being late for things. As a result, I always leave early. Consequently, I arrive at most of my appointments about 15 minutes early. The result is I have time to settle myself and prepare my thoughts. It works great for mass on Sundays. I have time to look over the readings and preview the music. Overall, it teaches me to be patient, which I truly believe is a learned skill.

Last week, I went to mass in Brussels. On the cover of the missalette was a picture of an old church. Inside the cover it explained that the church was the Cathedral of St. Joseph in Hanoi, Vietnam. As communist regimes tend to do, they shuttered the church when they took over in 1954. It lay vacant throughout the conflicts that ensued. Despite the turbulence and disuse, it remained undamaged. In 1990, on Christmas Eve, it was reopened for services. Often, we wonder where God is in these situations. Sometimes, He's just waiting for us to do the right thing. I'm glad I showed up early.

**Mass Minutes

A part of the mystery of the Mass, not recognized or understood by many of our non-Catholic brothers and sisters is that the celebrant priest or bishop is standing in the Person of Christ, in *Persona Christi*. The celebrant is not speaking on behalf of himself but in the name of and with the power of Christ. It is not the priest who changes the bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ but Jesus Christ himself. Repeating the words Jesus used the night before he died, it is Jesus speaking through the instrument of the priest with the lips and mouth of the priest saying, "This is my Body, and "This is the chalice of my Blood." as explained by Pope Pius XII in 1947 and the bishops in the Vatican Council in 1964.

Words have power for good or ill and some words have the power to cause what they describe. Bishop Barron uses the example of a baseball umpire; when he says, "You're out!", you are out by his very word. When a police officer says, "You are under arrest," you are arrested. When God said, "Let there be light," there was light. When Jesus says, through a priest, "This is my Body," it is his Body.




Inclement Weather – Mass Cancellation Policy
