The Mission of Love is planning a building trip to the Pine Ridge Reservation again in May to build homes. Dates for the building trip are May 14-25, 2002.

Mission of Love will build a home for the Delane Stands family. Their home has been ravaged by problems with deadly black mold. An addition of two bedrooms will also be constructed for the family of Mary Fast Wolf, a woman who has adopted fifteen foster children.

During a visit to Mary Fast Wolf in February, she said, "I'd give my eyeteeth to have a few more bedrooms." Currently, her sons sleep in a trailer next to the house, as there is not enough room for all the children to sleep under one roof. (see "Letters of Need")

The new Black Hills Dialysis unit has opened on the reservation in Pine Ridge, South Dakota. The unit, which began construction in June of 2001, welcomed its first patients the week of March 5 after a final Medicare inspection.

The Pine Ridge Dialysis Unit, owned by Warren Buck Elk, will replace another unit discontinuing

service in Pine Ridge. It will provide much needed services for renal

patients on the reservation, some of whom traveled 115 miles to Rapid City three times a week to receive dialysis treatments and medical care

Linda Budd, RN and Mission of Love volunteer, spent three weeks in January on the reservation. Helping

set up the dialysis unit and order

supplies, Linda also worked in nearby Porcupine, SD as a dialysis nurse. "It was an awesome experience," Linda said. "We don't know how lucky we are to have accessible healthcare right around the corner." She returned to Pine Ridge in March after the Medicare inspection to provide staffing services.

Mission of Love assisted by supplying the Pine Ridge Dialysis Unit

with an 18,000 pound shipment of furnishings and medical supplies. Old Mill Transportation of Cleveland, Ohio provided the transportation for all supplies, arranged by John Wright, another Mission of Love volunteer.

Diabetes and renal failure are major health problems on any reservation, but especially so in Pine Ridge. Pine Ridge is located in the poorest county in the United States, and many of the people living there have little or no access to healthcare.



Dear Kathy,

Mitawa kola. Here's hoping all is well with you and your great organization. I talked to Louie (Fostvedt) in Vermillion this morning. He informed me of the need to have electricity at the proposed Delane Stand's residence. So I am getting LaCreek Electric to set 3 poles and hang the wires. I just wanted to thank you for the semi-truck load of furniture, clothes and dialysis equipment. A thousand shoes went to needy people the first day. Victims of Crime Assistance, VOCA, has been giving out easy chairs and mattresses to their clients. I see single moms with children coming in and getting groceries from VOCA, too. They are planning on having a potluck dinner in your honor Monday. I didn't tell them about the bread van you are donating to them for furniture moving. I want you to see their reaction. VOCA does so much for the elderly and children, yet they are the first to have their federal funding cut.

Dialysis has the equipment you sent. I put the word out that Mission of Love could get an x-ray machine for the Wanbli Clinic. Mission of Love will never know how happy that news was received.

By the time you get this letter, 8 families that were living in the stachybotrys (black mold) infested houses will be living in mold-free mobile homes. I've been in over 100 mold-infested homes. I've seen death from black mold. I've seen whole families whose respiratory systems have been permanently damaged by exposure to black mold. I now automatically get a rash on my legs and flu-like symptoms when I go into a mold-infested home. But I believe help is on the way for the 2400 families who live in these homes. Your help is appreciated here. Sometimes appreciation may not show on the faces, but the people have been hurt so much, it will take time to gain their trust. But Mission of Love is gaining respect rapidly in an area where other organizations have failed. I see it first hand, everyday.

A Letter from Bobbie Dunn Youngstown, Ohio

The Mission of Love is a local charity. The Mahoning Valley has many charities, but not all keep true to their mission statement. The Mission of Love is one of the few that works for all people of need. This 501(c)(3) has a small fund raising campaign. The money raised from local donations provide necessary assistance to people in need. These funds are not used to house fancy offices or to pay salaries of employees. This is working money raised by working people.

Many area people question local charities and their mission. It has been thought that the Mission of Love spent donations only outside the United States. This assumption is not true. The mission is here to help those in need. I was able to take advantage of these arms of love. I was working for a local Cancer Society when I got a call from a social worker in Ashtabula, Ohio. She thought I might be able to find her help. She was desperate. Her call came after 6:00 PM. She explained that her agency was following an eight year old boy with Multiple Sclerosis. The town where the boy was raised had given help to his poverty-stricken family. The boy's family used all donations, including a wheelchair van, as income for their drug habits. They not only spent all the money, but also sold the van. When all the money was gone, they began to abuse their son. This is when the agency was called. When the agency found this frail boy, he had two broken knees and several bruises. The child was removed from the home and the parents were

The child did not have long to live. The social worker was able to find a foster family in Struthers, Ohio willing to take the child and give him the love and attention he needed. However, the family's home in Struthers did not have a wheelchair ramp. The child was moving into the home in 5 days, and the lack of time and materials to build a ramp was a problem. I did not even have to think about my next move. I called the Mission of Love from home, placing a call to Kathy Price at 9:00 PM. I explained the situation and Kathy agreed to help this unseen child that night. The wheelchair ramp was built in 3

Letters of Need

From Delane Stands, Pine Ridge Reservation, South Dakota

To Kathy Price and the Mission of Love:

I, Delane, was asked by yourself, how would I feel to have my own home? It's kind of hard to think about, knowing what you've had to live in your whole short life, growing up with other families, mostly aunts and their kids. We and the older kids grew up living in basements. Then I was old enough to go to boarding school. I went because usually there was too much kids around. My mom had other duties. One handicapped sister, she's 25. Another sister, she's 22. Two younger brothers, 21 and 18, all going to finish high school.

My whole life, I had to share housing with someone because not enough housing available. About 5 years ago my girlfriend and I met and have 2 kids right now. I started kind of late in life on having kids. My first baby came when I was 25 years old. One is 15 months old. Her name is Delena Paula. My son is 3 years old, his name is Lawrence Baylor. Me and my spouse thought it would be OK for us to turn the basement into an apartment, but after living in the basement, the kids started to suffer diarrhea and a lot of coughing. The walls started turning black. I scraped it off with a paint scraper, but it came back. Washing it with Lysol just made it smell better, it didn't go away. During the whole time, we were all sleeping in a wet basement that wasn't safe. I tried all kinds of tribal things, like asking for a trailer from FEMA, but was told there were not any. I guess it depends on who you know and how well you know them.

Well, it's kind of hard to give you an answer to your question, but I'll tell you right now it will be the most beautiful house in the region. Especially the surroundings. Just a little imagination and a lot of labor of love...it could be the most beautiful thing that could happen for my kids. They could start their roots. Along with my own, they'd have a room to themselves so they won't have to share. My brother is going to school for Auto Mechanics, so was thinking of building a kind of shelter or carport with walls so we could make some money, a lot of money when he's finished with school. He'll just need some kind of shelter that's all for both. That's what we both have a dream of, of having a certified mechanic's shop. We really know how to use all sorts of tire machines, hoists, and racks. It's just hard to get the money to purchase some of the equipment.

All through the years before my kids, I've learned how to use my skills. My woodshop teacher told me that if you could measure, know your tools and how to use a level, you will make yourself some money. He knew that I was smart to build things. My welding teacher spent a lot of time with me. So did my auto teacher. All are very and deeply respected for what they have taught me, because little did I know they were just preparing me for my future on how to better myself. Also, I owe my life skills to a lot of people, but it's hard to say that one day there is or might be a house for me. *That's only a dream, an American dream.*

Today it's kind of hard for me because there's family members going down quicker than they ever used to. I don't know what's making a lot of people sick. My mom's sick. She's living in the same house I used to live in, and I know her heart and kidneys aren't good anymore, but we're praying for everyone to make it through the year.

Me and my family will be doing good until we meet again, Kathleen. May God bless you and make happiness come your way. Love, **Delane Stands and family**

I would like to have a wood stove, as this is our premium heat. I would like to have it in one of the bedrooms. I use our wood stove to heat the house, so I could save on our propane so I could cook and have hot water to take baths. I try to look every way to save or cut corners. Some of my kids sleep on the floor in the front room. The boys do, but they don't mind, so they tell me, it's like camping out. This is a wish I would like to have happen for my family. We would all be ever so thankful. I read in the paper how much you all do for the people here on the reservation and all over the world. I know that your work doesn't just stop here, that you try to help everyone.

Dear Kathy Price,

Thank you so very much for your visit to Pine Ridge in February and for the much needed medical supplies. I have to say the highlight of your trip was when you and the Mission of Love offered to build us our much needed Hospice Palliative House on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation. This, as you know, will be the only hospice service on any reservation in the country.

As you may know, life on Pine Ridge is very difficult, being in the poorest county in the United States with 86% unemployment. In the last 2 years, we have found it necessary to place 15 patients into the government hospital here. This has been unacceptable. We have striven to provide in-home Hospice service for hours, even a day or two. But the families were unable to continue care in their homes, so patients had to be transferred to the hospital. The patients are placed at the end of the hall and looked in on once in a while. All the work that was done for comfort care then goes down the drain, and there is no continuity of care. There are many end of life issues that have to be addressed, and by going to a hospital, these are not met.

Not only is the cancer rate increasing here on Pine Ridge, but HIV is alive and well. No one here wants to take care of AIDS infected people.

When Mission of Love completes the Hospice House, end of life health care will be improved by 100%. This will allow family members to continue to stay with their loved ones in their last hours. I went to the BIA in search of land. The gentleman I traveled with found 2.5 acres right along the main road in Kyle, in the center of the reservation. I feel that this request will be granted, because many people here remember Ellen Stephen, whom the hospice service is named after.



When the agency found this frail boy, he had two broken knees and several bruises. The child was removed from the home and the parents were prosecuted.

The child did not have long to live. The social worker was able to find a foster family in Struthers, Ohio willing to take the child and give him the love and attention he needed. However, the family's home in Struthers did not have a wheelchair ramp. The child was moving into the home in 5 days, and the lack of time and materials to build a ramp was a problem. I did not even have to think about my next move. I called the Mission of Love from home, placing a call to Kathy Price at 9:00 PM. I explained the situation and Kathy agreed to help this unseen child that night. The wheelchair ramp was built in 3

Everyone talks about the joy of "giving". We read books and see movies about it. Talk show hosts dedicate long shows discussing it. People give of their time, talents, material goods and finances just for the joy that they feel upon "giving". What we don't often discuss though, is the joy of "receiving". I discovered this while on a mission trip to the Mayan jungle towns in Mexico.

As part of our trip with the Mission of Love, Kathy Price scheduled visits to several different remote Mayan villages. We loaded up her van in the morning with a suitcase full of small toys from fast food restaurants, maybe some sandals and baseball hats. We took along a doctor and nurses with suitcases full of Tylenol, Advil, and cough and cold medicine. Before we arrived, Kathy would find out how many families were in the village and we would stop at a small grocery store to buy supplies for each family that would include a bag of dried beans, a bag of rice, a bottle of oil, bananas, and a half dozen eggs.

As we entered the village, people appeared from out of their huts. The children were let out of school early to see the Americans. Villagers would line up and stand in the hot sun for hours for a chance to see the American doctor. The volunteers spoke not a word of Mayan—the villagers not a word of English. Yet we were able to communicate with each other at the most basic level-the communication of caring. They live in squalor-yet ask for nothing. They were surprised and grateful for the small amount of food we were able to give them. They proudly wore the new hats and sandals we brought. The children lined up single file and patiently waited for their chance to pick out one tiny toy.

We loved them, hugged them, and shared whatever we had. There was a beautiful feeling involved in the giving of so little.

It was when we were ready to leave that we found the joy in "receiving". As we said our goodbyes to the beautiful people of these poor villages, a surprising thing would happen. There would be a knock on the van window, or one of us would be grabbed by the arm, and a few of the older women would be standing there offering *US* gifts of homemade tortillas, tamales, or soup. What little they had to feed their families—and they were giving it to *US*! What a joy it was to receive their love in return!
