Over the past few weeks, our community and our nation have faced profound moments of grief and mourning that have left many reeling from their impact. We have witnessed the heartbreaking loss of loved ones in a tragic house fire and a devastating car accident. We have taken a solemn pause to commemorate the anniversary of 9/11, reflecting on the collective trauma woven into the fabric of our society. Most recently, we have been shaken by the horrific assassination of a father and husband who was speaking on a college campus, an act of violence that stole away not just a life, but the hopes and dreams of his family.

Grief, with all its complexity and weight, is one of life's heaviest burdens. When we endure a tragic loss, the emotional load can feel utterly insurmountable. Amidst the sorrow that envelops us, we often find ourselves asking: where do we turn when we feel broken beyond repair?

Not long ago, I experienced a small yet poignant reminder of brokenness in my own home when I accidentally dropped a glass cup onto the kitchen floor. Upon impact, it shattered into countless pieces, each fragment representing an aspect of what was once whole. Some shards were sharp and jagged; others were tiny, overlooked remnants; while some pieces were mere splinters, scattered across the kitchen. Each shard carried a story of its own, much like the pieces of our lives that scatter in the wake of tragedy.

This visceral experience of brokenness parallels what many in our community have felt over the past few weeks as they grapple with their immense losses. The families and friends of those gone too soon are left to pick up the pieces, often feeling overwhelmed as they attempt to navigate their new reality without their loved ones.

Yet here lies an undeniable truth that we can cling to during these challenging times of mourning: God reaches directly into our lives when we feel most shattered. He doesn't merely sweep the remnants away; instead, He gathers each one in His hands, knowing exactly where each fragment belongs. In His divine craftsmanship, He begins the process of refashioning these broken pieces into something beautiful and whole once more. God stands as the Master Craftsman, taking the shattered glass of crushed hearts and transforming it into something remarkable.

This profound truth resonates deeply with the comforting words of Psalm 34:18: "The Lord is close to the brokenhearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit."

In our moments of grief and despair, God is not distant, observing our struggles from afar without concern. He draws near, closer than we might even feel, and begins the delicate work of restoring shattered lives through His unwavering presence and love.

It's important to recognize that this restoration does not happen overnight. Healing is a process; sometimes the pain lingers long after the tragedy, embedded in our hearts. However, we can take comfort in the assurance that God walks with us, fortifying us for the journey ahead. As our Lord proclaimed, "Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted." (Matthew 5:4) This promise infuses our grief with hope.

A friend of mine who lives in Washington State operates a stained-glass business that specializes in crafting beautiful windows for churches. One of the aspects he cherishes most about his work is the art of taking individual pieces of glass-each boasting unique shapes, sizes, and colors-and assembling them into a cohesive masterpiece that reveals an incredible picture when completed.

This is a poignant reflection of our community at this moment. Yes, we are broken and mourning the loss of those we hold dear. We are grieving alongside those who are heartbroken. Yet, within this shared sorrow, God is with us, walking beside us, and yearning to redeem even our most profound levels of suffering.

My prayer is that as we move forward into the weeks ahead, His presence and peace will be unmistakable in our lives. May we, too, have open hearts, ready to support those who mourn, guiding others toward the enduring hope we can find in Christ, who makes all things new. Together, let us lean into the healing journey, knowing that from our brokenness, God can create something utterly beautiful.



What you need:


- Clear plastic cup





"You Meant It for Evil, God Meant It for Good"
"Beauty from Ashes"

The above two sayings (from Genesis 50:20 and Isaiah 61:3) have been resonating among our staff and board of directors since the fire that destroyed Lincoln Hall on the evening of July 30. As we begin the cleanup of the rubble, it is challenging to envision beauty. However, we are reminded of God's sovereignty. We are grateful that no one was injured and that the adjacent buildings were spared from the blaze.

A significant amount of ashes ended up in our nearby swimming pool, which created operational issues with the filtration system. As a result, we decided to close the pool for the year to carry out extensive repairs. Several end-of-the-year parties had to be canceled because of this situation. However, an idea emerged to host a "Back to School Bash." We rented some inflatables, and students and their families had a fantastic time at the event. It turned into a wonderful celebration that arose from the "ashes". We are now considering making this an annual event.

Our vision statement is "Impacting a broken and hurting world with the Christ of redeeming love." This reminds us that God can bring beauty from our brokenness, which is especially evident in our Project Restart program. This initiative allows us to work with selected inmates from the local detention center. Under our supervision, these inmates assist in unloading trucks at our thrift store and help with campus cleanup. Through our interactions with them, the inmates learn to trust us, and we have the opportunity to share the Gospel message—illustrating that our Lord is willing to forgive and will never fail us. It's a story of hope, a story of beauty emerging from our brokenness.

We do ask for your prayers, as we continue to navigate through the aftermath of the fire, for protection as we go through the cleanup process, and as we seek God's guidance on how to replace the building. Thank you for your partnership with us.
