One of the reasons I love the Bible is that it tells the stories of real people navigating real challenges while experiencing a genuine relationship with God. It doesn't shy away from the struggles individuals faced, whether during famines or moments of doubt. The narrative highlights the hardships, including the confiscation of homes and times of imprisonment.

Notably, after the Babylonian exile, some Israelites remained in the Promised Land, grappling with their own struggles, which are documented in Lamentations 5. This chapter intricately captures their plight and the profound sense of loss they experienced. It serves as a poignant reminder that even in the face of adversity, their experiences resonate deeply with our own struggles today.

This is what is described in the book of Lamentations:

"We must pay for the water we drink; the wood we must get must be bought. Our pursuers are at our necks; we are weary; we are given no rest. We have been given the hand to Egypt, and to Assyria, to get bread enough. Our fathers sinned, and are no more; and we bear their iniquities." (Lamentations 5:4-7)

This passage highlights the immense hardships faced by the Jewish people. After the Babylonian siege, their lives became even more challenging. The hope of victory was extinguished, their nation lay in ruins, and they found themselves in desperate circumstances, pleading for assistance from their enemies. It's hard to imagine a more difficult time to endure.

Yet, this experience can resonate with many of us, serving as a metaphor for our own challenging seasons—those moments of scarcity or instances when it feels like we're being pursued by relentless troubles.

When we recognize that the experiences recorded in Lamentations are not mere poetic musings, but rather profound reflections shaped by intense suffering, we can understand how these passages speak to our own lives.

This is because, while we can empathize with their struggles, we can also identify the source of their hope. Just as God guided them through their challenges, we can have confidence that He will also lead us through any valleys we experience in our lives. It's a powerful reminder that, even in our darkest moments, there is a light of hope waiting to be discovered.

Let me end with a thought from Psalm 55, because God always hears us: "Evening and morning and at noon I utter my complaint and moan, and he hears my voice. He redeems my soul in safety from the battle that I wage..." (Psalm 55:17-18)

May we always hold onto this truth, whether it pertains to our own struggles or those of a friend or someone in need. Let us strive to be the encouraging voice for others who may feel lost or overwhelmed.

We are blessed with a hope that endures, rooted in the incredible love of our Heavenly Father. The Bible tells the story of where this hope comes from and how it touches each of our lives. This hope is not something we earn or deserve; it's a gift given to us through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus.

If you haven't had the chance to read your Bible or participate in a Bible Study, I invite you to start this Fall. God has provided us His Word to encourage, strengthen, and sustain us every day. If you're unsure where to begin, I would be more than happy to suggest some practical first steps to help you engage with His Word regularly.

We are excited to announce that we will be starting some new groups soon, along with our ongoing Bible Studies that you can join. This is a wonderful opportunity to deepen your relationship with God and connect with others in meaningful ways. Whether you are new or looking to continue your journey, we encourage you to get involved!




Create adorable sheep using graham crackers, marshmallows, and a little imagination!



Dear Parents,

We are looking forward to another great education year with your family. As a committee, we are very grateful for the teachers and helpers who willingly give of their time and talents! Please take note of the following information.

Our Sunday School Kickoff will be on September 7. During the service that day, we will hand out Bibles to the 4th graders. Right after the service, we will dismiss the children by classes (through 8th grade). All classes will meet their teachers and see where their classroom will be held. There will not be a Sunday School lesson on this day, the Fellowship squad is planning a church meal and activities for the kids.

Beginning September 14, Sunday School classes will begin at 11:05am and end at 11:45.

Singing precedes Sunday School for the students in 8th grade and lower. Children in 3rd grade and younger will meet in the church basement. Children 4th through 8th grade will meet in the choir room. Both groups will meet at 10:50am and be dismissed to their Sunday School classes at 11:05am. The Sunday School offering will be taken at this time. The offering goes to pay for the class materials.

We encourage students in the 4th grade and up to bring their Student Bibles to class, both Sunday and Wednesday.

For the younger students, 3rd grade and below, a parent or close family member should pick up the child from their classroom. If someone else will be picking up your child on a regular basis, please give the teacher a written note so the teacher can feel comfortable releasing their child to a non-family member.

We will be starting our Wednesday night programs on September 10. ARK (1st-3rd grade), (4th-6th grade), and 7th & 8th grade will meet from 7pm to 8pm. NOTE: Wednesday night programs will be canceled if Boyden Hull has no school or lets out early that day. Also there will be no programs when Boyden Hull students participate in district and state events.

Parents of ARK students, grades 1, 2, and 3: please pick up your child promptly at 8pm. No child will be allowed to leave the church unless accompanied by a family member or well known adult.

Regarding the 3-4 year old class, if your child is 3 years old by September 1, he/she can start Sunday School in September. If your child turns 3 years old between September 1 and December 31, he/she can start Sunday School in January.
