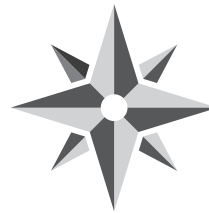

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PARKING

General Parking:

FREE street parking is available along State Route 6. By-donation parking can also be found along Preston Street.

ADA Parking:

ADA Parking is located along the closed section of Viking Way, in front of the Willapa Valley High School. ADA spaces will be clearly marked. Vehicle tag must be displayed.

Reserved Parking Pass:

Reserved parking is located along the closed section of Viking Way, in front of the Willapa Valley High School. Passes must be purchased at the Fair Office. Note: limited quantities available. - \$25.00

FAIR CAMPING

RV/Trailer Hookup - \$137.75 with taxes

For up to 7 days of camping and includes water, electrical hookup and one tow vehicle. This does not include your Fair entry button. You must purchase those buttons individually for all in your party. (Limited spaces available)

Tent Camping (dry camping) - \$27.55 with taxes

For up to 5 days, it does not include a parking pass for a vehicle or your Fair entry button. You must purchase those individually. (Limited Spaces Available)

FAIRGROUNDS POLICIES

1. No pets/animals allowed on the Fairgrounds, unless for exhibit or a Title II or Title III ADA service animal. These animals should be properly protected against infections and communicable diseases. Permitted animals may not enter animal areas or animal buildings to ensure the safety of all animals.
2. The general supervision of the grounds and the entire exhibition, security regulations and control of all entry and exit gates are vested in the Fair Management.
3. The Pacific County Fair Manager and Staff will exercise every possible precaution for the safety of its patrons.
4. Campaigning or the passing out of flyers is not permitted on the Fairgrounds. This may be done by renting a booth or table for this purpose.
5. Bikes and skateboards are not permitted on the Fairgrounds.
6. The consumption of alcohol beverages are only allowed within the area designed as the Beer Garden. Alcoholic drinks will not be permitted anywhere else on the Fairgrounds. Any patrons who fail to comply with this will be asked to leave the Fairgrounds.
7. The Fairgrounds are a weapons free zone. This includes concealed weapons.
8. The Fairgrounds is a drug-free and bully-free zone.
9. All tobacco use is prohibited on the Fairgrounds and is prohibited within a 25-foot distance from all entrances and exits of the Fairgrounds.

ENTRY RULES & PREMIUM INFORMATION

EXHIBITOR RULES

1. Upon entry of each article, an entry tag will be furnished to the Exhibitor, specifying the Exhibitor's name, Exhibitor's number, Section, Division, Class, Lot and Number/Name of variety of entry. This tag is to remain attached to such articles during exhibition. Animal exhibits will have all stall or pen cards attached to the stall or pen.

2. No animal or article will be allowed to compete for more than one premium, nor shall be entered into more than one Class or Lot, except as Champions or otherwise stated in each individual Department rules.

3. All animal exhibits will be clean and presentable to the public by 10:00am each day of the Fair. Each animal must be shown in accordance with their type.

4. Each Exhibitor is responsible for the feeding and care of his or her own animal. This includes grain and hay for all animals. All shavings are

provided by the Fair.

5. Exhibitors shall, at all times, give the necessary personal attention to whatever they may have on exhibit, and at the close of the Fair, take care of same. The Fair Management will have supervision of all articles and exhibits, but will not assume liability for loss or damages.

6. Pacific County, Pacific County Fair, or any personnel of either, shall not be responsible for any loss or damage to articles or animals exhibited.

7. All Fair entries will be judged by the Danish System, unless otherwise specified. NO PREMIUM CHECK will be paid that is \$2.00 or less.

8. In every Division, in every case, the decision of the judges are final. Anyone interfering with judging or changing judging results will result in the loss of Premium Points. All violations will be reported to the Fair Management.

9. No animal, article or product entered in the name of any person,

except the owner, manufacturer or producer, will receive premiums.

10. Violations of the above rules by an Exhibitor will result in forfeiture of all premiums and monies awarded.

11. All entries, including animals, must be removed from the Fairgrounds on Sunday, following the Fair, between the hours of 9:00am and 2:00pm.

PREMIUM PAYMENTS

1. The Pacific County Fair will pay, by check, premiums earned by each Exhibitor. Premium Checks will not be issued to an Exhibitor that earns \$2.00 or less.

2. Premium Checks will be mailed to individual Exhibitors as soon as possible after the closing of the Fair.

3. Premium Points are awarded to each entry by the Official Judge in the corresponding Department, Class and Lot, as listed in the Pacific County Premium Book.

4. Premium Points will be determined according to the budgetary

constraints upon the closing of the Fair.

5. Professionals exhibiting their goods at the Fair are not eligible for Premiums or Special Awards. Professionals will receive ribbons only.

6. Any Exhibitor wishing to donate their premium monies back to the Pacific County Fair or The Friends of the Pacific County Fair, must sign at the bottom of their Entry Form stating they would like to donate their premium monies. Upon the completion of the Fair, no premium check would be mailed to the Exhibitor.

SPECIAL AWARDS

Special Awards may vary from year to year, according to the availability of donor groups or individuals. These will be listed in each Department of the Premium Book.

SUPERINTENDENTS AND JUDGES

1. All Superintendents with 4-H exhibits must be qualified 4-H Superintendents and approved by the WSU Extension Educator and follow the 4-H Guidelines.

2. Each Department Superintendent or Assistant must be on duty at all times while the Fair is open and have general supervision of all articles or animals on exhibit in their department.

3. Each Department Superintendent will expose the name of the Exhibitor for each article as soon as judging has been completed.

4. Superintendents may not be the official judge in their perspective Department.

5. Each award/placing and corresponding Points awarded by the judge must be written clearly and legibly in the appropriate space on the Entry Form. Premiums will be paid according to this Entry Form.

6. Upon completion of judging and placing entry, the Department Superintendent must deliver all Open Class and FFA judging sheets/books to the Fair Office for data entry into computer system for premium payment. All 4-H judging sheets/books must be delivered to WSU Extension Staff.

7. Judges will evaluate only those articles or animals properly entered

and entitled to Premium Points.

8. In the Danish Judging System, each entry/exhibit is evaluated against a standard for that particular exhibit. No exhibits are evaluated against each other. Judgement is done, and ribbons and premiums awarded, as to how the exhibit compares to the standard.

9. The judge has the final decision on every placing of every exhibit. Superintendents, clerks or any individuals, may not change the official adjudication.

10. Any article not properly entered will be disqualified for ribbons, premiums and payments.

11. Judges will be paid for their services according to the contract signed prior to the Fair.

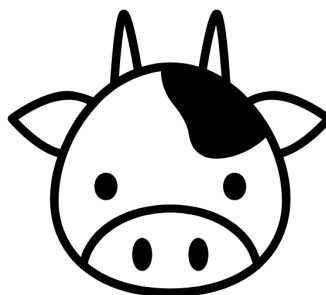

LIVESTOCK RULES

GENERAL RULES

1. All Open Class and FFA Dairy, Goat, Dog, Beef, Sheep, Swine, Cat, Poultry, Rabbit, Horse and Cavy Entry Forms must be postmarked by August 1st and delivered to the Pacific County Fair Office at 5 Fair Lane/PO Box 142, Menlo, WA 98561.
2. All 4-H Dairy, Goat, Dog, Beef, Sheep, Swine, Cat, Poultry, Rabbit, Horse and Cavy Entry Forms must be postmarked by August 1st and delivered to the WSU Extension Office at 1216 W Robert Bush Dr/PO Box 88, South Bend, WA 98586.
3. All Dairy and Beef must be tied using an appropriate halter and a security tie.
4. Out of County entries will be filled on a space available basis only, with Pacific County Open Class, 4-H and FFA Exhibitors having first priority.
5. Stall assignments will be made by the Superintendent of each Department.
6. Refer to the General Veterinary Information and Health Requirements for Animal Entries and the Sheep and Goat Scrapie Disease Control.
7. Exhibitors must furnish their own hay and grain for all livestock, including rabbits, poultry, geese & ducks.
8. Exhibitors must furnish their own feeding tubs, buckets, dishes, waterers etc. for all animals.

AWARDS

1. A Champion Ribbon will be awarded to the top exhibitor in each Lot of the Fitting and Showing Classes for Beef, Dairy, Goat, Sheep, Rabbits and Swine
2. Champion and Reserve Champion Ribbons will be awarded in each Class of Beef, Dairy, Goats, Sheep, Rabbits and Swine.

GENERAL VET INFORMATION AND HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR ANIMAL ENTRIES

1. The health status of all entries will be ascertained by the Official Fair Veterinarian at the time of entry and will continue while on the

Fairgrounds.

2. Individual Health Certificates on Washington animals are not required for entry into the Fair.
3. Out of State animals MUST comply with Washington State import regulations. NO EXCEPTIONS.
4. The Fair Veterinarian will inspect all classes of livestock and poultry (including horses, pet animals, rabbits, pigeons, ducks, geese, turkeys, etc.) before they are allowed entry into Fair buildings or exhibit areas to determine that there are no clinical indications of contagious, infectious diseases or parasites.
5. The Fair Veterinarian must reject any animal that is determined to have infectious or contagious diseases or ectoparasites. Exhibitors should be aware that ringworm, pinkeye, warts, strangles, scabies, contagious ecthyma, lice, mites, ticks and fleas fall into this category.
6. Animals exhibiting disease symptoms during the course of the Fair will be rejected by the Veterinarian and removed from the Fairgrounds.
7. It is recommended, but not required, that cattle be vaccinated in the current year against respiratory diseases.
8. The Fair Veterinarian's professional decision as to the health status of an animal will be final and will be upheld by Fair Management.
9. The Official Fair Veterinarian will check in all animal entries at the beginning of the Fair at the Fair's expense. Any need for professional veterinary services during the course of the Fair after initial check-in will be at the expense of the animal exhibitor requesting veterinary service.
10. Exhibitors should note and respect the potential for exposure to health threatening conditions while at the Fair. Crowding of animals and birds, long distance hauling and changing environmental conditions are major stress factors to which exhibits are subjected.

SHEEP AND GOAT SCRAPIE DISEASE CONTROL

1. Washington State Department of Agriculture requires that black-faced breeding sheep be identified with a flock ID number assigned by the State Department of Agriculture before movement of such sheep from the premises of origin for show, sale, purchases or other movements.
2. Tattoos, electronic implants or tamperproof tags from an approved supplier may be used.
3. Black-faced sheep are defined as Suffolk or Hampshire breeds or any breed crossed with Suffolk or Hampshire.
4. Goats must also be identified, except castrated males, and those moving directly to slaughter channels must have official USDA National Scrapie Eradication assigned flock identification.

2. Professionals will receive a ribbon only. Non-Professionals will receive Premium Points.
3. All work must have been done in the past two years.
4. Adult and Senior Division work not wired and framed for hanging will not be accepted for display.
5. Painting by number, reproduced by squared, and the like, should be entered in the Hobby Department.
6. No work will be accepted that has been entered at a previous Pacific County Fair.
7. Pacific County Fair will award \$3 and a Special Ribbon for Senior Class A.
8. Exhibitors will be judged on the Danish System.

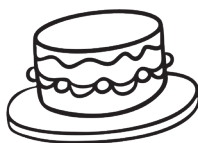

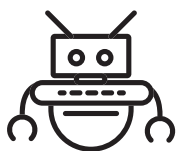

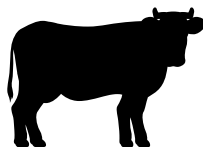

GENERAL RULES:

1. All participants must follow the General Rules of the Pacific County Fair.
2. Open Class participation is open to all exhibitors the ages of 7 to 50 & older.
3. EXHIBITORS MUST HAVE horse handling experience.
4. All horses, ponies, minis, mules and donkeys welcome.
5. **All horses must go through vet check.**
6. Open Class Horse Entry Forms are available at the Pacific County Fair Office and on the Fair's website.
7. Out of County participants are welcome.
8. Exhibitor may bring more than one horse to exhibit or show. All horses must be broke to ride. Entry Forms are due August 1st in the Fair Office. Exhibitor is responsible for choosing and decorating their stall. Decorating to the theme of the Fair is encouraged. Tack and feed rooms are shared.
9. All participants must participate in Herdsmanship and barn duty. Minor children must be accompanied by an adult. All exhibitors must be available on the barn isle way to answer questions from the public and participate in Herdsmanship.
10. Exhibitors between the age of 7 and 17 years of age, must wear an equestrian helmet and be supervised in arena by parent/guardian during exercise time. Helmets are suggested for all. Appropriate footwear/riding boots are mandatory.
11. Show attire specific to discipline.
12. **NO 30 DAY HEALTH CERTIFICATES WILL BE ACCEPTED.** All horses must go through vet check at the Fairgrounds before entering horse barn. Once horse has been vetted in it becomes an exhibit of the Pacific County Fair and shall remain at the Fairgrounds until haul out on Sunday. Stalls must be completely stripped before leaving.
13. **NO STALLIONS ALLOWED.**
14. Horses must remain in their stalls at all times, with the exception of exercise times and showing.
15. **NO RIDING AFTER DARK.**
16. Horses that are blanketed must have their blankets removed by 10AM each morning to be ready for the Fair. Blankets my be returned after the close of the Fair every evening. Hay nest must be removed from stall at close of Fair each night.
17. The horse is an exhibit of the Fair and must be kept clean and presentable at all times during the Fair for the public enjoyment.
18. Stalls and isle ways must be cleaned before the Fair opens each day. Stalls, hay and tack rooms and isle ways must be kept clean from the opening of the Fair to closing each day.
19. Horses are to be ridden by the exhibitor only.
20. Exhibitors only are allowed in the horse stalls.
21. The general public is not allowed in the horse stalls or allowed to pet or hand feed the horse.
22. Judging will be done under the Danish system.
23. Exhibitor orientation will be held in the Horse Barn immediately after all horses have been vet checked. Minors must be accompanied by an adult.
24. **High Point Awards:** To be eligible for High Point Awards, exhibitors must participate in Showmanship.
25. Once horse is vetted in it becomes an exhibit of Pacific County Fair and shall remain on the grounds until haul out on

Sunday.

26. Awards Ceremony: The awards ceremony will be held in the Horse Barn after the conclusion of all horse events and Points have been tallied. Time and day TBA mid-week of Fair.

GENERAL RULES:

1. Refer to **General Veterinary Information and Health Requirements for Animal Entries**.
2. Exhibitors are responsible for the cleaning of their cages after the Fair. All used shavings must be taken to the muck bin located outside the cow barn. The poultry cages must be clean at the end of the Fair. Fair premiums will be withheld until cages are clean.
3. All poultry going to exhibit must test negative for Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid (P-T). This rule applies to chickens, exotic fowl and game birds; but excludes waterfowl, doves and pigeons. Exhibitors that meet one of the two options below **do not** need to have their birds P-T tested prior to exhibiting:
 - a. NPIP participants;
 - b. Hatcheries (must be an NPIP participant);
 - c. Feed stores (must be an NPIP participant)
4. Exhibitors that do not meet the criteria above **must** test negative for P-T within 90 days of going to exhibition. Exhibitors can meet the requirements using the options below:
 - a. A veterinarian, vet tech or trained personnel can draw 1/2 cc of blood from each bird and send the sample to the WSU Avian Health and Food Safety Laboratory in Puyallup; or
 - b. A WSDA field veterinarian can perform P-T testing at the Fair (applicable fee will apply). If you are interested in this service, please contact Beth Corder at (360) 725-5494 or via email at bcorder@agr.wa.gov; or Dr. Lynden Badcoe at (360) 725-5763 or email at badcoe@agr.wa.gov. 5. The Fair will use every precaution in its power to protect the exhibits, but will not be responsible for injury, loss, damage by theft, fire or otherwise.
6. All production birds shall be

- judged according to the American Standard of Perfection.
7. All birds will be in the charge of the Superintendent during the Fair and cannot be removed without the consent of the Superintendent. No one will be allowed to handle any birds, except their own.
8. No broods will be exhibited.
9. Water, feed and care will be furnished without charge.
10. No one but the Superintendents or authorized personnel will feed and water.
11. All birds must be clean and healthy. Birds not in show conditions and suffering from any disease or parasites will be refused entry.
12. The same bird will not be shown in Open Class and 4-H Competition.
13. No one is allowed to remove animals from cages, except for the 4-H Fitting and Showing contest.
14. Special ribbons for Grand Champion, Reserve Champion and Best in Class will be awarded when there are enough entries in a class or breed to warrant the special attention. This is completely at the discretion of the judge and the Superintendent.
15. Building Superintendents are in charge of all exhibits and will enforce the rules.

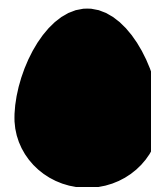

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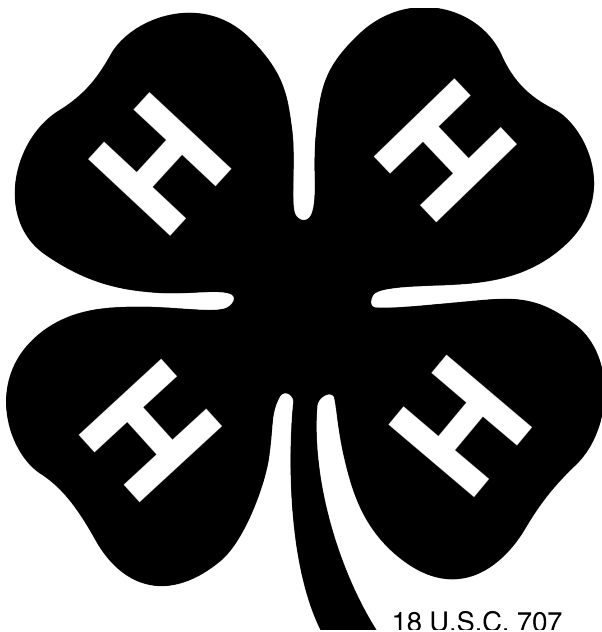

4-H GENERAL RULES

Thank you for exhibiting your 4-H projects at the Pacific County Fair! The following general rules will help you know what to expect as you prepare to share what you've raised, made, grown and learned this year.

1. All youth entering exhibits in this department must be properly enrolled members of the 4-H Youth Development program. To be eligible to participate in the Pacific County Fair, project enrollments must be submitted by May 1 of the current year. When exhibits and contests are divided into age groups, the WSU Extension 4-H Youth Development Policy applies. 4-H age is determined by October 1st of the current 4-H year.

2. All General Rules of the Pacific County Fair must be observed and followed.
3. All State 4-H Policies and Procedures (updated 10/01/2024) must be observed and followed.
4. All Pacific County 4-H Policies (Policy Handbook) must be observed and followed.
5. Youth carrying projects in both 4-H and FFA must abide by the Memorandum of Understanding, effective March 2022.
6. Pacific County Youth Livestock Auction members must observe and follow their Policy Handbook.
7. Exhibits must have been preserved, raised, grown or made by the exhibitor during the current 4-H year and represent the project(s) in which the member is currently enrolled.
8. All 4-H animals are to be left outside the 4-H barns until the animals are checked by the veterinarians outside the barns. Superintendents have the authority to refuse entry until the animal is examined and approved for entry by a veterinarian.
9. All exhibitors showing animal projects must enter a Fitting and Showmanship class with their animals. Premiums will be withheld if member does not Fit and Show. Exhibitors are not required to enter conformation, equitation or other classes.
10. Exhibitors will not stay overnight in the exhibit barns.
11. Priority for exhibitor space will be given to members enrolled in Pacific County 4-H.
12. Veterinary care costs or tests of any animal at the Fair are the responsibility of the exhibitor.
13. Criteria for participation in the State 4-H Fair are published in the State Fair Premium Handbook, which is online at: <https://extension.wsu.edu/4h/state-4-h-fair/>
14. To be eligible for the 4-H State Fair, youth must be Junior, Intermediate or Senior 4-H members. Cloverbuds are not eligible for State Fair.
15. All entries (except livestock, small animals, garden, baking, sewing and educational exhibits) must be accompanied by a 3" x 5" card explaining what it is, where it is to be used and why it was made. Also, be sure to check each department for anything else that

needs to be included on the 3" x 5" card. Cards are not judged as part of the exhibit; the information they give assists the judge in determining the appropriate evaluations.

16. All 4-H Member numbers must be included on all entry tags and entry forms. This number is assigned by the WSU Extension Office and can be obtained by contacting your 4-H club leader or Extension staff.
17. All exhibits must remain in place until 9AM Sunday. Leaving early will result in loss of ribbons and premium money.
18. Fair Management and Superintendents are not responsible for exhibits after noon on Sunday. All unclaimed exhibits will be disposed of or left at the Fairgrounds by Superintendents unless prior arrangements are made.

If repairs and embellishments are done to the outfit, the cost of repairs and embellishments must be included in the total cost.

8. Only one entry is allowed per 4-H club/group in each lot.
9. The community service displays will be evaluated on the following criteria: Project Completion (50%) – Need for Projects Selected – 15%; Project Plans – 10%; Cooperation from Other Groups – 10%; Project Evaluation – 15%; and Display Construction (50%) – Design (color, lettering, illustration, layout) – 20%; Originality and Creativity – 10%; and Educational Value – 20%.
10. The promotional displays will be evaluated on the following criteria: Design (color, lettering, illustration, layout) – 40%; Originality and Creativity – 20%; and Educational Value – 40%.

- In Quilting Classes 94-100, a quilted entry is defined as a textile article consisting of layers of fabric stitched together by hand or machine and machine or hand quilted with single tacking stitches or multiple stitching lines. Fabrics may be whole cloth or pieced. They may be embellished with fiber art techniques and/or found items. They may be embellished with fiber art techniques and/or found items (beads, charms, feathers, etc).

May be a decorated Styrofoam, plastic, or cardboard form and the actual baked item. Will only be evaluated on the artistic work. A 3" x 5" card is needed to tell with – a) What was used for frosting, b) What tips (if any) that you used, c) How you made the decorations and from what.

LOT 2 – Decorated Cupcake – submit 3 decorated cupcakes.

- Processing methods and times must follow current Washington State University and USDA recommendations. WSU publications are available online. Jams and jellies need not be USDA recipes. All water bath canning must follow current USDA or Ball Blue Book recommendations. All pressure canning must follow current USDA recommendations. Recipes and processing times listed by the National Center for Home Food Preservation are approved by USDA. Youth may find this information at their website <https://nchfp.uga.edu> Due to the potential presence of e-coli and salmonella bacteria in raw meat, Extension-approved instructions on making jerky must be followed. Instructions can be found in the publication PNW 632 Making Jerky at Home Safely available at <https://pubs.extension.wsu.edu/> Dried meats prepared using this publication will be accepted.
- Recipes are required for all entries in Lots 1, 2, 3, and 4, except applesauce, with source. Include exhibitor name

on all recipe cards.

- All canned products must be exhibited in standard canning jars, sealed with flat metal lids and screw band rings. Rings should be included with the exhibit, but must be able to be removed by the judge. The minimum jar size on all canned products shall be 8-ounces (one-half pint).
- All canned exhibits must be labeled using round C0803 labels (available from your Extension office or at WSU Publications at <https://pubs.extension.wsu.edu>). Indicate "hot" or "raw" pack on canned food exhibit labels.
- Please provide ¼ cup of dried food product for exhibit and judging. All dried foods exhibits must be exhibited in glass jars for display purposes and labeled with round C0804 labels (available from your Extension office or at WSU Publications at <https://pubs.extension.wsu.edu>).
- Products canned at higher altitudes will need additional processing time as described in food preservation publications. Fair judges will accept longer processing times if the words "adjusted for high altitude" appear in parentheses after the time processed.
- The exhibitor should indicate if lemon juice or citric acid has been added to any canned tomato product.

- All images can be sandwiched/cut & paste; retouched/cloned; filters or any other special effects used.
- Minimum printer output of 300 DPI or PPI should be used.
- Original image must be part of the mounted display, on the front of the exhibit mat for comparison.
- A typed index card must be part of the mounted display, on the front of the exhibit mat, explaining what was done to arrive at the final image. 4-H Photography Label C0890E must be attached as instructed on the label, and filled out correctly. The original image, finished picture, and index card should be mounted on a display board (poster board or other suitable mounting surface) no larger than 14" x 22". Do not use dry mount; it will destroy your print. Use spray adhesive or adhesive mount only.
- Exhibits in Class 154 will be scored on the following criteria as in WS4HF/9.54b: Quality of image - 20%, Composition - 20%, Color correction - 20%, Retouching - 10%, Cropping done correctly, if necessary - 10%, Mounting - 10%, and Correct category and inf. cards - 10%.

NOTE: All building superintendent information is listed in preceding sections of the premium book along with all animal health requirements! You can find this information online as well.

FFA PREMIUM BOOK

FFA GENERAL RULES

1. Exhibitors must turn their registration forms into the FFA Advisor **no later than August 1, 2026**. All late entries will be up to the discretion of the FFA Advisor, Fair Manager and Barn Superintendents.

2. Exhibitors must be FFA Members and have Advisor's permission. Advisor shall make arrangements with the Department Superintendent for supervision and care of exhibitors and projects. Any exhibitor who does not meet standards required by Fair Manager or FFA Advisor may have their premiums withheld.
3. Exhibits must correspond to type, kind and amount listed in the Fair Premium Book. An animal or article will not be allowed to compete for more than one premium or entered in more than one division, except as listed in the Premium Book. Any FFA exhibitor showing similar articles or animals in 4-H will not receive premiums for those entered in FFA.
4. Exhibits shall be displayed in the manner and location assigned by the FFA Advisor. This includes stall and exhibit cards, chapter identification, decorations, any part of display or materials to maintain display and awards won by the display. Premiums shall not be awarded if the exhibit is unworthy, even though there is no competition.
5. Still Life Exhibits shall be entered Monday, August 17, 2026 from 2PM to 7PM on the Fairgrounds.
6. Livestock exhibits must go through vet check before entering any barns on the Fairgrounds
NO EXCEPTIONS. The Official Fair Veterinarian's professional decision as to the health status of an animal will be final and will be upheld by the Fair Manager, Fair Board and FFA Advisor. Check the Pacific County Fair Webpage for vet check times at pacificcountyFair.com.
7. **All exhibits entered in the Fair for display, must remain on the Fairgrounds until Sunday, August 23, 2026 at 9AM or PREMIUM POINTS will be forfeited.**
8. The Fair Manager and Staff will use every precaution for the safe preservation of exhibits, but will not assume liability for loss or damage.

GENERAL VETERINARY INFORMATION AND HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR ANIMAL ENTRIES

1. The health status of all entries will be ascertained by the Official Fair Veterinarian at the time of entry and will continue while on the Fairgrounds.
2. Individual Health Certificates on Washington Animals are not required for entry into the Fair.
3. Out of state animals MUST comply with Washington State import regulations. **NO EXCEPTIONS.**
4. Fair Veterinarian will inspect all classes of livestock and poultry, including horse, pet animals, rabbits, pigeons, ducks, geese, turkeys, etc., before they are allowed entry into Fair buildings or exhibit areas to determine that there are no clinical indications of contagious infectious disease or parasites.
5. Fair Veterinarian must reject any animal that

is determined to have infectious or contagious diseases or ectoparasites. Exhibitors should be aware that ringworm, pinkeye, warts, strangles, scabies, contagious ecthyma, lice, mites, ticks and fleas fall into this category.

6. Animals exhibiting disease symptoms during the Fair will be rejected by the Veterinarian and removed from the Fairgrounds.
7. It is recommended, but not required, that cattle be vaccinated in the current year against respiratory diseases.
8. The Fair Veterinarian's professional decision as to the health status of an animal will be final and will be upheld by Fair Management.
9. The Official Fair Veterinarian will check in all animal entries at the beginning of the Fair at the Fair's expense. Any need for professional veterinary services during the course of the Fair after initial check-in will be at the expense of the animal exhibitor requesting veterinary service.
10. Exhibitors should note and respect the potential for exposure to health threatening conditions while at the Fair. Crowding of animals and birds, long distance hauling and changing environmental conditions are major stress factors to which exhibits are subjected.

SHEEP AND GOAT SCRAPIE DISEASE CONTROL

1. Washington State Department of Agriculture requires that black-faced breeding sheep be identified with a flock ID number assigned by the State Department of Agriculture before movement of such sheep from the premises of origin for show, sale, purchase or other movements.
2. Tattoos, electronic implants or tamperproof tags from an approved supplier may be used.
3. Black-faced sheep are defined as Suffolk or Hampshire breeds or any breed crossed with Suffolk or Hampshire.
4. Goats must also be identified, except castrated males, and those moving directly to slaughter channels must have official USDA National Scrapie Eradication assigned flock identification.

FFA LIVESTOCK

1. Cattle will not be admitted for exhibition unless they pass vet check and adhere to the general rules.
2. The Official Fair Veterinarian will be on the Fairgrounds, in the unloading area and livestock barns. It is the duty of the Official Fair Veterinarian to refuse admission to any animal showing evidence of communicable disease. The Fair's minimum health requirements are the same as the recommended minimum health requirements of the State Veterinarian. The Official Fair Veterinarian will have the final say on the animal's health, ability to be shown and Fairgrounds Livestock Health Requirements.
3. Brucellosis - all female cattle will be blood tested, certificate in hand, or calfhood vaccinated. All males over six months blood tested, certificate in hand.
4. Animal health treatment required while at the Fairgrounds shall be the sole obligation of the exhibitor. Any veterinarian of exhibitor's choice may be called.

5. Any animal showing evidence of communicable disease after having been admitted to the barns shall be removed at any time at the request of the Official Fair Veterinarian.
6. It shall be understood by the exhibitor that if at any time during the Fair their animal seriously detracts from the overall aesthetic value of the department, the Fair Manager shall request the Official Fair Veterinarian to dismiss the animal belonging to the exhibitor.
7. An exhibitor requesting the removal of an animal at any time during the Fair for health reasons must have animal examined by the Official Fair Veterinarian and abide by the decision. Failure to do so will result in forfeiture of premium and exhibiting privileges in the future.
8. Housing of animals will be under the direction of the FFA Advisor.
9. Livestock barns are officially open to the public from 10AM to when Fair closes each day 9PM. The Fair Management will furnish bedding. All cattle are to be double tied.
10. Livestock entries are limited to two per class, with exception of market classes, which adhere to Market Livestock Sale rules. Champion ribbons will be awarded if judge deems worthy (no additional premiums for champions).
11. Fitting and Showing contest will be held before Type, Novice and Senior. Jackets and hard shoes are required. Anyone showing before 1/1 of current year in 4-H or FFA the same species loses Novice standing.
12. All FFA members exhibiting in Open Class competition must conform strictly to rules and regulations applicable to Open Class exhibitors.
13. FFA Advisor may refuse exhibits of inferior quality.
14. All classes of pens will be judged in pens and cannot be used in other classes, for example, Market and Chapter herds.
15. **No dogs allowed in barns.**
16. No sleeping in the barn, unless approved by Barn Superintendent.
17. Cattle need to be double tied.
