District Governor Message by Lion Dr. Gregory N. Seltzer



Greetings Fellow Lions of District 35 L:

Lion Year 2024-2025 is winding down and I am happy to welcome our newest Lions Club in District L- The Gulf Breeze Lions Club. They are up and running and have elected officers and are meeting twice a month. Currently they are conducting a Needs Assessment in the community to determine which areas of service they plan to focus on. Interestingly, the oldest member of this club is 38 which is rather young by most club standards. They are planning on a Charter Presentation Night soon. We are looking forward to chartering 2 more clubs or Club Branches in District L before the end of June in Ponte Vedra Beach and Green Cove Springs. That will make a total of 5 new clubs this Lion Year in keeping with our Lions Mission 1.5 goals. Thank you all for your work in achieving International Lions President Olivera's motto of: "Make Your Mark".

As you all know, Lions International has focuses on eight global causes: Vision(and Hearing), Hunger, Childhood Cancer, Diabetes, Environment, Youth, Disaster Relief, and Humanitarian Efforts. These causes are the foundation of the Lions Clubs International service programs. One that is of special interest to me is Childhood Cancer having served for many years as Childhood Cancer Chair in 2 Districts. More than 300,000 children are diagnosed with cancer each year with the average age of a child who is diagnosed just six years old. Your Lions club can help children with cancer and their families by hosting a project to support them in your community.

Here are 15 great ways to help those impacted survive and thrive:

- 1. Raise club awareness about childhood cancer by holding an educational talk with a healthcare professional or public health official at your club or district meeting or related events.
- 2. Prepare healthy meals for families with children undergoing treatment. This can be done in collaboration with other community members to ensure the family receives food on a regular basis.
- 3. Collect recyclable materials and donate the profits to a childhood cancer organization. (SEE ALUMINUM CAN POP TABS IDEA BELOW).
- 4. Write cards with well-wishes and share them with a local cancer center. 5. Donate financial support or gift cards to families in need or a nearby childhood cancer center. This could cover expenses like gasoline, parking, food, medical expenses, etc.
- 6. Make or buy new hats, caps, head scarves or blankets to donate to childhood cancer centers.
- 7. Organize a community drive to assemble a toy library for patients to enjoy.
- 8. Participate in a blood donation or bone marrow registry event to benefit cancer treatment.
- 9. Provide tutoring services to children with cancer or their siblings, or adult learning opportunities for parents.
- 10. Organize an event with a cancer support center to have family photographs taken.
- 11. Visit a local hospital or treatment center for children with cancer and read stories to them, play games or spend time with the siblings of patients.
- 12. Provide funding support for essential medicines and supportive services. Crucial medical needs could include chemotherapy supplies, nutritional supplements, medical equipment, essential staff, etc.
- 13. Organize a community childhood cancer awareness event like a walk/run event or pamphlet distribution.
- 14. Acquire and equip vehicles for the transportation of patients and family members commuting to and from the hospital.
- 15. Make or knit yarn character wigs (example: Superhero, princess) for children with cancer.

In addition, our club sells entertainment books as a fundraiser each year. We donate 20 of these to the RMD House for use by parents to give them a break from hospital cafeteria food at a local restaurant, movie or entertainment venue.

Speaking of restaurants or food; our club also uses the kitchen at the RMH to prepare dinner regularly for parents who could be living at the house for up to 3 months while their child is receiving treatment. Even if you do not have a Ronald McDonald House in your area near your club, I am sure that you have a local hospital with an Oncology Unit that treats children with cancer. You could contact them and offer to help in a service area they may desire. The Service Project Ideas Lists on the LCI Cancer page gives you a complete list of ways that your club can make a difference in the lives of children with cancer and their families.

Finally, don't forget the upcoming 107 th International Lions Clubs Convention that will be held in Orlando which is in our own backyard from July 13-17th. I am the International Hospitality Chair and looking for volunteers who wish to serve either one day or the entire Convention.

OUR MISSION

The Conklin Davis Center for the Visually Impaired's long term commitment to our mission has been in place since 1988. Our mission is to provide a lifetime of comprehensive services that create unlimited hope, opportunity, and independence for blind and visually impaired people.

VISION STATEMENT

Conklin Davis Center for the visually impaired is a regional and national leader in transforming communities and lives so that blind and visually impaired individuals achieve personal success.

HISTORY

The Conklin Davis Center for the Visually Impaired is a hidden jewel in the heart of Daytona Beach. It is the only comprehensive Blind Services complex in the United States. The 42-acre campus is home to the Florida Division of Blind Services District Office, the State Rehabilitation Center for the Blind, the largest Braille & Talking Book Library in the world, and the Conklin Davis Center for the Visually Impaired. Our, 27,000 square-foot facility on an 8-acre campus includes 16 dorm rooms, 3 apartments, a commercial kitchen, workshops, classrooms, offices, a nature trail, greenhouses, gardens and much more.

The Conklin Davis Center for the Visually Impaired is a non-profit agency dedicated to serving blind and visually impaired individuals. Our goal is to enhance the lives and opportunities of our clients through job training, and employment, Independent Living, Technology training and children's services as well as a multitude of community services. To ensure that blind and visually impaired individuals lead successful lives in their workplace, at home, and in their community, the Conklin Davis Center's for the Visually Impaired's long term commitment to our mission has been in place since 1979.

Each year the Conklin Davis Center serves over 500 individuals giving them the self-confidence to overcome the obstacles vision loss presents.





Programs

Blind Babies Program

 The goal of our program is to provide parents and caregivers the tools and resources they need to help their child with vision impairment reach their full potential.

• Teen Transition

- For Youth and Young Adults 14-22 Years of Age
- Blindness can be a challenging condition, especially for teenagers who are going through significant changes in their lives. They may have to deal with the pressures of school, social relationships, and their future careers. Our teen transition program can help them navigate these challenges and prepare for a successful transition to adulthood.

Vocational Rehabilitation

 Vocational rehabilitation services for the blind include training and education to help individuals gain the skills they need to be successful in the workplace may include training on assistive technology, such as screen readers and magnification software, as well as training on job-specific skills.

• Senior Independent Living

 Visually impaired seniors face a range of challenges that can impact their quality of life, including social isolation, depression, and difficulty accessing information and services. The Senior Training Program addresses these challenges by providing seniors with the tools and resources to live independently, stay connected to their communities and advocate for their rights.

• Step Children's Program

- o For school age children app. 6-13 years of age
- Children who are blind face unique challenges in their lives, and it's important to provide them with the necessary resources and support to help them thrive. The STEPS Program makes a significant difference in the lives of these children by providing them with education, socialization, adaptive technology, vocational training, and emotional support. By prioritizing these important resources, the STEPS program helps children who are blind to reach their full potential.



Programs Continued

Supported Living

 Conklin Davis Center's Supported Living Program offers a broad range of services to support adults who are blind with additional disabilities to live in their own homes in the community, rather than in an institutional setting such as an assisted living home or a nursing home

Supported Employment

 Supported Employment training focuses on instruction for blind individuals who have an additional significant disability. Our program helps blind individuals compete in the workplace on terms of equality by providing them with the skills and confidence necessary to achieve employment outcomes that are commensurate with their talents and abilities.

• Residential Life

Our residential program for individuals who are multi-handicapped and blind provides
a specialized environment that caters to their unique needs. Training involves
intensive daily instruction in a variety of areas such as Daily Living, Assistive
Technology, Orientation & Mobility, Adult Basic Education (budgeting & money
management), Job Readiness and Job Placement as well as socialization skills.

• Residential Vocational Program

• The vocational curriculum for residential clients is based on the premise that for each person, the best way of working is to be determined individually. The program provides a framework for integrating personal, social and educational needs into every aspect of daily life. This not only helps learn how to work with others but also build a sense of independence and a strong sense of self-esteem. The curriculum focuses on individual needs, with an emphasis on self-advocacy and career exploration. It's all about developing competency and confidence that sets our graduates up for success at each stage of their lives.

• Experimental Mixed Media Artist (EMMA's Corner)

 Our talented artists have been hard at work creating stunning artwork not only to be seen but also to be touched.



Lions Club Brand Formation

The original agency, the Conklin Center for the Blind, was developed in 1979 as a Florida Lions project, and the Daytona Beach Lions Club served the Conklin Center for many years, but at one point, the Daytona Beach Lions Club ceased to exist.

After the 2021 merger with the Center for the Visually Impaired, the Conklin Davis Center for the Visually Impaired was formed, and it became apparent that a new Lions club should be developed. Lions Clubs International allows for a club branch to be formed with fewer than the twenty members required to start an independent club.

So, to facilitate the birth of the new club, the Ponce Inlet Lions Club agreed to serve as the parent club of a branch club, and the Daytona Beach - Conklin Davis Lions Club Branch was formed in January 2024.

Our Members

There are ten members, all of whom are either current or past employees or board members of the Center. The club is actively holding meetings and planning projects, and the members have agreed that the club's mission is to support and advocate for the Conklin Davis Center.

Provide guide and service dogs for people, veterans, and children with vision loss and those battling depression throughout the United States—at no cost to the recipients.

<u>Lions World Vision Institute</u> (formerly Lions Institute Eye Transplant & Description Research)

Recover, process and distributes organ, eye, and tissue from donors to hospitals, do Ocular Research to improve cornea transplant surgical procedures.

Lions Club International Foundation (LCIF)

Provides grants to Lions clubs to improve health and well-being, strengthen communities, and support those in need through humanitarian services that impact lives locally and globally.
