Message from 1VDG Bev Flynn

An Unforgettable Lions Experience

In this month's message, I want to share with you one of the experiences that every First Vice District Governor has the opportunity to partake in: a trip to the Leader Dog for the Blind School in Rochester Hills, Michigan.

I could not have been prouder to be a Lion while visiting this incredible facility. Everywhere we turned, the presence of Lions was felt—on the walls, where the Lions logo proudly hung, in the dedicated faculty and staff who were Lions themselves, and in the three graduates of the school who, with their guide dog partners at their side, were also Lions.

Our group was given a full tour of the facility, including engaging and informative sessions about the school's 86-year history—beginning with just three Detroit-area Lions club members who had a vision. We heard heartfelt testimonials from three Lions graduates, had ample time to ask questions, and enjoyed a delicious lunch (with donuts that lived up to their legendary reputation among past visitors!).

One of the most powerful parts of the visit was experiencing, in a small way, what students go through when they first arrive. Every new student begins with orientation and mobility training, learning to walk with a white cane. With blindfolds on, we practiced walking down a hallway, using the cane to sense walls and feel tactile changes in the floor that signal obstacles or turns ahead. We also experienced what it felt like to walk blindfolded with a guide dog—learning to place full trust in a partner who would faithfully lead the way. Students at Leader Dog spend three weeks living and working with their new guide dog, building that trust and learning how to operate as a team.

As the day came to a close, we were invited to join "Dining in the Dark," an unforgettable dinner where blindfolds were once again put in place. Eating salad and a full meal without sight gave us a glimpse into the daily challenges faced by those who are visually impaired, and a renewed respect for their strength and resilience.

Since 1939, Leader Dog has served 633 clients in Florida alone. According to the Foundation, those services equate to more than \$59 million in life-changing support. What's even more meaningful for us as Lions is knowing that Leader Dogs for the Blind is a Multiple District supported entity—something every club in our district can be proud to help sustain.

This experience reminded me, once again, of the impact we as Lions can make when we come together in service. Leader Dog isn't just about training dogs—it's about restoring independence, dignity, and confidence to people who need it most.

Truly, it was an **unforgettable Lions experience**.



NOTES

Income is predicted on a 1,000 members. As we fall below a \$100 members this may be less.

The designated funds are the money passed from the previous governor that are designated either for Disaster Relief or other projects of the District. They will be distributed at the direction of the Cabinet when a need arises.

These are planned expenditures. In addition, Projects may raise additional money that we will track. This is this money is the net amount that comes out of District funds.

The DG or a delegate will authorize the individual expenses for accuracy and applicability to the Lions District.

Lions in leadership roles can at their discretion submit mileage and general expense requests for reimbursement.

A FOUNDATION FOR YOUR LIONS CLUB

Lions Clubs can benefit greatly from having their own Club level tax-exempt 501c3 Foundation. It makes them eligible for grants, donations and local government support limited to those with ax exempt status. Donations to <u>Lions Clubs</u> are <u>not</u> tax deductible since they are 501c4.

My revised Foundation Cookbook now meets new IRS requirements for Lions Clubs who want to form their own 501c3 Foundation. It covers details on filing IRS forms 1023-EZ and IRS Instructions 1023-EZ. The Cookbook is available via e-mail without any fee as a pdf document only. It can be used by all Lions Clubs who are under Florida jurisdiction or modified for any other USA based Lions Clubs.





LCIF & Pediatric Cancer

Nearly 80% of children with cancer live in low or middle-income countries, where only 10% of children survive cancer. In developed countries like Canada, Japan, and the United States, more than 80% of children with cancer survive. The good news is that the world can be more successful at curing cancer in children. However, much work needs to be done to improve access to drugs and treatment, train healthcare providers, improve facilities and technology, and address socio-cultural barriers to improve global childhood cancer survival rates.

Funds Grants:

Grants and community projects aim to provide a sense of hope and offer tangible support for families facing childhood cancer.

LCIF provides grants for projects that focus on infrastructure and support for childhood cancer, not medical care directly. Childhood Cancer Grants are awarded from US\$10,000 to US\$150,000. These grants support projects that are implemented in coordination or collaboration with existing government or charitable childhood cancer medical facilities. Two US Districts received Childhood Cancer grants of at least \$10,000.

In May 2019, LCIF entered into a formal partnership with Global HOPE (Hematology-Oncology Pediatric Excellence), a program of Texas Children's Hospital and Baylor College of Medicine. This program is focused on improving the standard of care for children with cancer in sub-Saharan Africa by using the respected approaches developed in treating Pediatric AIDS in the same region. 23

Lions History & Traditions:

Lions Become International

In 1920, the Border Cities Lions Club was established in Ontario, Canada. The Association of Lions Clubs had now become an international organization. The club's name later was changed to the Windsor Lions Club. Lions Clubs in Toronto and Hamilton, Ontario, were charted immediately after.

On October 01, 1926, China became the third nation to join the Association of Lions Clubs, International. The Tientsin Lions Club in China initially included 55 members – they consisted of: Chinese, British, German, Italian, French, Japanese, Austrian, Hungarian and American citizens. This was also the year that the Association of Lions Clubs passed the 1,000 Club mark.

Mexico came next as an international member nation when the Nuevo Laredo Lions Club was formed in 1927. Shortly after, the Havana, Cuba Lions held their first meeting. The Havana Lions Club remained strong for more than 30 years following their charter date, but they were forced into inactivity following the Cuban revolution in 1959.

CA, MD35, DG/PIS, CC

DG stands for **D**istrict **G**overnor

PDG stands for Past District Governor

CIS is a Companion In Service, (formerly PIS or Partner In Service)

CC is the Council Chair

MD 35 I stands for Multiple District 35 I

The clubs that are members of the Lions International organization is divided into Constitutional Areas (CA) and then subdivided into Multiple Districts (MD). Your club is in MD35 which encompasses the clubs in the geographic areas of Florida, Bahamas, Aruba, Bonaire, and Curacao.

There are four **Districts in MD35**:

Districts L, I, O, N.

Your club is in District I which is lead by a District Governor. The four District Governors form a governing council for the Multiple District which is coordinated by a Council Chair chosen by those DG's.

Each year, there will be two opportunities for Lions from all four districts to share ideas, attend sessions, participate in training, celebrate our achievements and have Fun at the MD35 Fall Conference and the
