As Our Freedoms Disappear, How Do We Live And Conduct Our Lives?

Daniel 6:1-28 ESV

- 1 It pleased Darius to set over the kingdom 120 satraps, to be throughout the whole kingdom;
- 2 and over them three high officials, of whom Daniel was one, to whom these satraps should give account, so that the king might suffer no loss.
- 3 Then <u>this Daniel</u> became <u>distinguished above all the other high officials</u> and <u>satraps</u>, because <u>an excellent spirit</u> <u>was in him</u>. And <u>the king planned</u> to <u>set him over the whole kingdom</u>.
- 4 Then the high officials and the satraps <u>sought to find a ground for complaint against Daniel</u> with regard to the kingdom, but they <u>could find no ground for complaint</u> or <u>any fault</u>, because <u>he was faithful</u>, and <u>no error or fault</u> was <u>found in him</u>.
- 5 Then these men said, "We <u>shall not find any ground for complaint</u> against this Daniel <u>unless we find it in connection</u> with <u>the law of his God</u>."
- 6 Then these high officials and satraps came by agreement to the king and said to him, "O King Darius, live forever!
- 7 <u>All the high officials</u> of the kingdom, the <u>prefects</u> and the <u>satraps</u>, the <u>counselors</u> and the <u>governors are agreed</u> that <u>the king should establish an ordinance</u> and <u>enforce an injunction</u>, that <u>whoever makes petition to any god</u> or <u>man for thirty days</u>, <u>except to you</u>, O king, shall be <u>cast into the den of lions</u>.
- 8 Now, O king, <u>establish the injunction</u> and <u>sign the document</u>, <u>so that it cannot be changed</u>, according to the law of the Medes and the Persians, which <u>cannot be revoked</u>."
- 9 Therefore King Darius signed the document and injunction.
- 10 When Daniel knew that the document had been signed, he went to his house where he had windows in his upper chamber open toward Jerusalem. He got down on his knees three times a day and prayed and gave thanks before his God, as he had done previously.
- 11 Then these men came by agreement and found Daniel making petition and plea before his God.
- 12 Then they came near and said before the king, concerning the injunction, "O king! Did you not sign an injunction, that anyone who makes petition to any god or man within thirty days except to you, O king, shall be cast into the den of lions?" The king answered and said, "The thing stands fast, according to the law of the Medes and Persians, which cannot be revoked."
- 13 Then they answered and said before the king, "<u>Daniel</u>, who is one of the exiles from Judah, <u>pays no attention</u> to you, O king, or the injunction you have signed, but <u>makes his petition three times a day</u>."
- 14 Then the king, when he heard these words, was much distressed and set his mind to deliver Daniel. And he labored till the sun went down to rescue him.
- 15 Then these men came by agreement to the king and said to the king, "Know, O king, that it is a law of the Medes and Persians that no injunction or ordinance that the king establishes can be changed."
- 16 Then the king commanded, and Daniel was brought and cast into the den of lions. The king declared to Daniel, "May your God, whom you serve continually, deliver you!"
- 17 And a stone was brought and laid on the mouth of the den, and the king sealed it with his own signet and with the signet of his lords, that nothing might be changed concerning Daniel.

- 18 Then the king went to his palace and spent the night fasting; no diversions were brought to him, and sleep fled from him.
- 19 Then, at break of day, the king arose and went in haste to the den of lions.
- 20 As he came near to the den where Daniel was, he cried out in a tone of anguish. The king declared to Daniel,
- "O Daniel, servant of the living God, <u>has your God</u>, <u>whom you serve continually</u>, <u>been able to deliver you from</u> the lions?"
- 21 Then Daniel said to the king, "O king, live forever!
- 22 My God sent his angel and shut the lions' mouths, and they have not harmed me, because I was found blameless before him; and also before you, O king, I have done no harm."
- 23 Then the king was exceedingly glad, and commanded that Daniel be taken up out of the den. So <u>Daniel was</u> taken up out of the den, and no kind of harm was found on him, because he had trusted in his God.
- 24 And the king commanded, and those men who <u>had maliciously accused Daniel</u> were brought and <u>cast into the den of lions</u>—they, their children, and their wives. And <u>before they reached the bottom of the den</u>, the lions overpowered them and broke all their bones in pieces.
- 25 Then King Darius wrote to all the peoples, nations, and languages that dwell in all the earth: "Peace be multiplied to you.
- 26 I make a decree, that <u>in all my royal dominion</u> people <u>are to tremble</u> and <u>fear before the God of Daniel</u>, for <u>he is the living God</u>, <u>enduring forever</u>; his kingdom <u>shall never be destroyed</u>, and his dominion <u>shall be to the end</u>.
- 27 He <u>delivers</u> and <u>rescues</u>; he <u>works signs</u> and <u>wonders</u> in heaven and on earth, he <u>who has saved Daniel from the power of the lions</u>."
- 28 So this Daniel prospered during the reign of Darius and the reign of Cyrus the Persian.

Daniel had the position, the authority, the leverage, the influence, to do something about this injunction, and yet, when he knew the document had been signed, did nothing to try and stop the decree.

Instead he went home, opened his window (he could have prayed with his window closed) and prayed as always, but now in direct and open civil disobedience.

Daniel trusted in God instead of trusting in his position, the government or world system.

- Unholy alliances are treacherous and never last.
- Without genuine regeneration, the surrounding culture cannot be reformed to tolerate or condone Christianity.
- We cannot resort to the same methods as the world to try and protect ourselves and our liberties.
- If Self has not been dethroned by the Lordship of Jesus, pride and selfishness will rule the heart and God's Truth will be hated.
- Trying to make the world a better place without the Lordship of Jesus is like asking the Antichrist to be nicer.

Daniel 6:10 ESV

10 When Daniel knew that the document had been signed, he went to his house where he had windows in his upper chamber open toward Jerusalem. He got down on his knees three times a day and prayed and gave thanks before his God, as he had done previously.

Galatians 2:4-5 ESV

- 4 Yet because of false brothers secretly brought in--who slipped in to spy out our freedom that we have in Christ Jesus, so that they might bring us into slavery--
- 5 <u>to them</u> we <u>did not yield in submission</u> <u>even for a moment</u>, so that <u>the truth of the gospel</u> might <u>be preserved for you</u>.

Daniel 6:13-14 ESV

- 13 Then they answered and said before the king, "<u>Daniel</u>, who is one of the exiles from Judah, <u>pays no attention</u> to you, O king, or the injunction you have signed, but <u>makes his petition three times a day</u>."
- 14 Then the king, when he heard these words, was much distressed and set his mind to deliver Daniel. And he labored till the sun went down to rescue him.

Daniel 6:23 ESV

23 So <u>Daniel was taken up out of the den</u>, and <u>no kind of harm was found on him</u>, because <u>he had trusted in his</u> God.

2 Corinthians 6:14 ESV

14 <u>Do not be unequally yoked with unbelievers</u>. For <u>what partnership</u> has <u>righteousness with lawlessness</u>? Or <u>what fellowship</u> has <u>light with darkness</u>?

John 2:23-25 ESV

- 23 Now when he was in Jerusalem at the Passover Feast, <u>many believed in his name</u> when <u>they saw the signs</u> that he was doing.
- 24 But <u>Jesus on his part</u> did <u>not entrust himself to them</u>, because <u>he knew all people</u>
- 25 and needed no one to bear witness about man, for he himself knew what was in man.

Proverbs 23:6-8 NASB20

- 6 Do not eat the bread of <u>a selfish person</u>; Or desire his delicacies;
- 7 For <u>as he thinks within himself</u>, <u>so he is</u>. He says to you, "Eat and drink!" But <u>his heart is not with you</u>. 8 You will vomit up the morsel you have eaten And waste your compliments.

Matthew 27:3-5 ESV

- 3 Then when Judas, his betrayer, <u>saw that Jesus was condemned</u>, he <u>changed his mind</u> and <u>brought back</u> <u>the thirty pieces of silver</u> to the chief priests and the elders,
- 4 saying, "I have sinned by betraying innocent blood." They said, "What is that to us? See to it yourself."
- 5 And throwing down the pieces of silver into the temple, he departed, and he went and hanged himself.

Jeremiah 17:5-8 ESV

- 5 Thus says the LORD: "<u>Cursed is the man</u> who <u>trusts in man</u> and <u>makes flesh his strength</u>, whose <u>heart</u> <u>turns away from the LORD</u>.
- 6 He is <u>like a shrub</u> in the desert, and <u>shall not see any good come</u>. He shall <u>dwell in the parched places</u> of the wilderness, in an <u>uninhabited salt land</u>.
- 7 "Blessed is the man who trusts in the LORD, whose trust is the LORD.

8 He is like <u>a tree planted by water</u>, that <u>sends out its roots</u> by the stream, and <u>does not fear when heat comes</u>, for <u>its leaves remain green</u>, and <u>is not anxious</u> in the year of drought, for it <u>does not cease to bear fruit."</u>

Luke 16:1-9 ESV

- 1 He also said to the disciples, "There was a rich man who had a manager, and charges were brought to him that this man was wasting his possessions.
- 2 And he called him and said to him, 'What is this that I hear about you? Turn in the account of your management, for you can no longer be manager.'
- 3 And the manager said to himself, 'What shall I do, since my master is taking the management away from me? I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg.
- 4 I have decided what to do, so that when I am removed from management, people may receive me into their houses.'
- 5 So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he said to the first, 'How much do you owe my master?'
- 6 He said, 'A hundred measures of oil.' He said to him, 'Take your bill, and sit down quickly and write fifty.'
 7 Then he said to another, 'And how much do you owe?' He said, 'A hundred measures of wheat.' He said to him, 'Take your bill, and write eighty.'
- 8 The master commended the dishonest manager for his shrewdness. For <u>the sons of this world</u> are <u>more shrewd in dealing with their own generation</u> than the sons of light.
- 9 And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of unrighteous wealth, so that when it fails they may receive you into the eternal dwellings.

Luke 12:57-59 ESV

- 57 And why do you not judge for yourselves what is right?
- 58 <u>As you go with your accuser</u> <u>before the magistrate</u>, <u>make an effort</u> to <u>settle with him</u> <u>on the way</u>, <u>lest</u> <u>he drag you to the judge</u>, and the judge <u>hand you over to the officer</u>, and the officer <u>put you in prison</u>.
 59 I tell you, <u>you will never get out</u> until you <u>have paid the very last penny</u>.
