PARTNERS IN THE GOSPEL

This year, the Archdiocese of Seattle celebrated the 175th anniversary of its foundation, and an epochal moment in the life of the local Church as Partners in the Gospel started taking shape. Part of the challenge we face is the shrinking number of archdiocesan priests. We are aided by priests from elsewhere, but it is problematic for them to serve as pastors given their short-term visas. Most parishes if not all also struggle with finding sufficient volunteers, and possessing the necessary financial resources for staff, programs and to care for their aging buildings. While there



is much good happening, we can't allow our limitations to continue defining ministry, hence the need for this pastoral and strategic planning effort.

On July 1st, the local parishes of Mary, Queen of Peace (MQP) in Sammamish, St. Joseph (SJ) in Issaquah and Our Lady of Sorrows (OLOS) in Snoqualmie began to share a single pastor, Fr. Matthew Oakland, who was assisted by Fr. Kyle Poje. It is the beginning of a multi-year journey of discernment which will conclude with the three parishes merging into one parish.

During this time, our community will discern together where God is calling us, how we can more fully live out the life of the Church, how best to utilize all of our resources (people, churches, school and other buildings, finances) to carry out the full range of ministry and the work of evangelization.

With a reduction from three to two priests, Sunday Mass times had to change immediately, a challenge for SJ in particular who lost a Sunday Mass and OLOS which had their Sunday morning Mass shift to the afternoon. Thankfully a number of the Saturday night Mass goers from SJ found a new home at OLOS or MQP's vigil Masses. In our first year, while many ministries continued separately, some joined together, in particular for sacramental preparation for those becoming Catholic, marriage preparation and adult Confirmation. SJ and MQP also started collaborating for youth ministry. Many of these changes happened out of necessity due to staffing and volunteer needs, but it's a blessing to be able to share resources between parishes in service to the People of God and the work of Christ.

In July of 2024, the Sunday Mass time changes at OLOS were not easy, losing a Sunday morning Mass time as it shifted to early afternoon to accommodate a two-priest schedule. And while this new time didn't work for others, and some went to MQP or SJ as a result, others adjusted their regular plans for the Lord's Day to make it work. In the end, there are more people coming to OLOS now than before, including some from St. Joseph, which lost their Saturday night vigil Mass, as they make a new home in the midst of this community. In general, we are starting to see more people moving between the parishes for formation or sacraments as well, as they look to what will work best for them and their family, or take advantage of the varied confession opportunities available. Below is the data for all three parishes in the family, as we start to think about our wider East County Catholic community becoming one.



FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP

It is only because of the generosity of our parishioners in sharing their time, talents and treasure that the work and ministry of Jesus Christ continues.

Income Shifts

Total collections, the primary source of income for the parish, were down 1.5% this fiscal year (\$5.6k). Visitor donations were up 210% as we welcome parishioners from St. Joseph and Mary, Queen of Peace. The parish no longer received support from St. Anthony Mission to support operations as that community is now attached to Holy Innocents and St. Jude, a drop of \$30k. The net result was a decline of 9% of total regular operational income.

This year the parish sold its rectory property across the street from the church as it wasn't big enough for the two priests to live together plus guests. It sold for \$755,000, of which our net after expenses was \$704,950. The original purchase price was realized on the Balance Sheet to offset the capital asset, and the capital gain on the Income Statement. This also meant a significant 4th quarter increase in our savings interest.

Expense Adjustments

OLOS' cost share of clergy expenses decreased \$35k vs the prior single pastor under the proportional shared model. Additionally shifting away from the prior PAA working remotely to utilizing the shared ministry of the PAA at St. Joseph reduced administrative overhead. Several other changes were made to reduce expenses due to the deficit, including adjusting one staff member's hours, and eliminating the contracted lawnkeeping service. We also discontinued former rectory housekeeping, and in FY25-26 will save on insurance and utility costs for the former rectory. Along with a number of smaller changes and savings opportunities, expenses decreased by 20%, to finish with an operational surplus even without the property sale income.

Explanatory Notes

- 1. Starting in FY24-25, Our Lady of Sorrows shares two priests with Mary, Queen of Peace and St. Joseph as one parish family. Instead of paying the full salary and benefits of a single pastor along with other clergy assistance under the usual salary and benefits line items as before, Our Lady of Sorrows paid a 15% proportional share of the shared family expenses for the priests salaries and benefits, living arrangements, etc, now in a separate section, as agreed upon by the Family 28 Finance Councils. Lawnkeeping services, tracked in salaries, were discontinued partway through the year to save funds as we shifted to some part time staff and volunteers. Bookkeeping shifted from a salaried staff member to to a contracted service in FY23-24. The cleaning contractor expenses were moved for FY25-26 to the Contracted Services section.
- 2. In FY 24-25, Our Lady of Sorrows sold its former rectory. The capital gain above the original purchase price is realized on the P&L, while the remainder is realized on the Balance Sheet with the Capital Asset change.
- 3. Capital Projects, those over \$10,000, are tracked on the Balance Sheet and not in the regular operational/income statement. In FY24/25, there were no capital projects.


OUTREACH
