**The Baptism of the Lord (A)**

Isaiah 42:1-4, 6-7 / Acts 10:34-38 / Matthew 3:13-17

John, miracle son of Zechariah and Elizabeth, cousin of Jesus and known as “the Baptist,” offers a “baptism of repentance.” Then Jesus shows up. The eternal Son of God a penitent? John is shocked and resists, saying it is Jesus who should baptize him. But Jesus insists, “to fulfill all righteousness” (Matthew 3:15).

At the very beginning of his ministry, Jesus is humbling himself, much as he did toward the end, when he washed the feet of his disciples. Then it was Peter who would resist what seemed inappropriate by the standards of this world. Jesus is giving us an example, the way of the servant leader, as described in today’s beautiful passage from Isaiah. Jesus is the servant leader, the Father’s Son, over whom the Holy Spirit danced like a dove, and the Father, with his booming voice from the heavens, said of him, “This is my beloved Son!” (Matthew 3:17).

Jesus allowing himself to be baptized may seem like a contradiction, but given all that follows, we know he is offering his followers a consistent model of what he expects from those who choose to be his disciples. As St. Paul would later write to the Church in Philippi, “Have among yourselves the same attitude that is also yours in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God something to be grasped” (Philippians 2:5-6). ●

## A Note From Our Pastor

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ Jesus,



The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord ends the Church's Christmas Season, and I will be returning to wearing the green vestments. Sunday afternoon all of the Christmas decorations will be taken down and stored for next December 25<sup>th</sup>. I hope that many will be there to help, especially with the large or heavy boxes. Setting up the decorations takes far more work than taking them down! Thank you for your help.

The great majority of people will view the Baptism of their child, or an adult, as the end of a process of instructions for the parents and the godparents, or for those children and adults and their godparents. They have finally gotten their Baptism and they are finished. Now they just have to go to Mass on Sundays and celebrate Confession and the other Sacraments as those might be needed in their lives. But if we take a good look at today's Gospel reading, the Baptism of the Lord is not the end but the beginning of his public ministry. It is our Catholic traditional understanding that for the first thirty years of His life, Jesus quietly grew up in Nazareth in the home of Mary and Joseph. He had, like all humans, to learn to walk and to talk and to eat just like any baby and child. Jesus had to go to school to learn to read and write so that he could participate in the synagogue services each Sabbath. Jesus learned the carpentry trade from his father Joseph and learned to help Mary with the household tasks. It was during this "silent" time in the Scriptures from the age of twelve to age thirty that Joseph died. At the age of twelve, He went up with them to Jerusalem to celebrate Passover. Jesus remained in Jerusalem, while Joseph and Mary were returning to Nazareth. *They "lost" the Son of God?* They found Him in the temple conversing with the priests. Jesus "then went down to Nazareth with them and was obedient to them. But his mother treasured all these things in her heart."<sup>52</sup> And Jesus grew in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and man" (LK 2:51-52) And a few verses later in Luke's Gospel that after His baptism by John the Baptist we read, "Now Jesus himself was about thirty years old when he began his ministry" (LK 3:23).

For Jesus, His baptism by St. John the Baptist was the beginning of His preaching and teaching. Jesus performs His first miracle of the Water turned into Wine at the wedding in Cana very soon thereafter. Jesus then begins His Galilean ministry when he would go to the synagogue and read from the scroll, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord." And then He said to them, "Today this scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing". After the thirty years in Nazareth, Jesus begins the work that God had sent him to do.

That is the same for us when we receive any of the seven Sacraments! It is not the final culmination of a process, but the very beginning of a new work and ability before God. At the end of the Mass and at the end of most of the sacraments, the phrase "Go and proclaim the Word of the Lord" is proclaimed. It is part of the Great Commissioning in the Gospels. The last words of the Gospel of Matthew are: "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you." This three-fold instruction was given to the Apostles and to all of us! In that ONE sentence Jesus tells us, "to teach, to baptize, and to make disciples". It is not just to baptize, but to make disciples by teaching them the faith. When we are Baptized or Confirmed or Married, we are again "commissioned" to go forth and show others our faith in Jesus and in Salvation by living a life of goodness and holiness. So, on this Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, take a minute and recommit yourselves to those promises you made to God on those days you received your Sacraments.

## Deacon's Corner

Today, the Baptism of the Lord, ends the Christmas season. It is the last day that we wear white vestments. We begin the First Week in Ordinary Time and wear green. We'll have Lent and Easter, then we'll go back to Ordinary Time until next Advent. The readings for today are from [Isaiah 42:1-4, 6-7](#); [Psalm 29:1-2, 3-4, 3, 9-10](#); [Acts 10:34-38](#); and Matthew 3:13-17. Welcome to the 2026 liturgical. We will be reading the Gospel of Matthew this year, Year A of the Liturgical rotation. Today, we'll read from chapter 3 of Matthew about the Baptism of the Lord. The *event* is important but not for obvious reasons. Obviously, Jesus does not need to be baptized with the baptism of repentance, which is John's program, sort of. For me, this scripture has always been puzzling, and over the years I have come to understand that the theme of the reading, and one of the major themes of the New Testament is repentance. What other themes of the New Testament are important? Forgiveness? Love of neighbor? Unity? Universality? The Real Presence of Jesus in Word and Sacrament? Submission? The Cross? Reconciliation? As we go through Matthew this year, try to find these themes and others. I think this Gospel is the most comprehensive of the first three. The main feature is Matthew's structure or scheme to verify that Jesus is the Messiah, and he constantly uses Old Testament scriptures to verify that Jesus is the Son of God; that he became a human being; that he came to die for us; and that he rose from the dead to give us a chance at eternal life. He is very hard on the Scribes and Pharisees, and the Sadducees. He seems to de-emphasize the importance of the Sabbath by having Jesus constantly heal people on the Sabbath, leaving us with the impression that he wants the Jewish authority to understand that Jesus is more important than observance of the law; that the love of

the law can be extreme when it is used to judge people; and, that the Lord is the only just judge of our violations of the law, especially the law of love. See Matthew 25: 31-46, the judgment of the nations, which will be the last reading of the year, on Christ the King Sunday, November 22, 2026. I got a little off-track here, so let's go back to the meditation on the Baptism of the Lord. Baptism as we know it, a submission to the Blessed Trinity, (Father, Son and Holy Spirit), was *not* the baptism of John. And the "washing" in the river was symbolic of a new beginning. Jesus' answer to John's protestations about who should be baptizing whom was: "Allow it now, for thus it is fitting for us to fulfill all righteousness." That leads me to believe that Jesus submitted to John's baptism as a sign of solidarity with the idea of repentance, which would become Jesus' main message. The extreme of repentance is acceptance of the Cross for us made possible by submission to the Cross by Jesus. I think that's about the closest I can come to understanding the phrase that Matthew uses to justify Jesus' baptism. I think it is also a literary device to reveal the Blessed Trinity. Thus, "the Spirit of God descending like a dove and coming upon him. And a voice came from the heavens, saying, 'This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased.'" I want to recommend that you read the entire Gospel of Matthew. It should take about three hours. It can be done in 15 or 30 minute segments over several days. Keep in mind these themes, and see how the Gospel of Matthew affects you. God bless you, and welcome to the new year. May your resolutions be Christ-centered, and your growth in the Holy Spirit lead you to a renewed appreciation for the Church and increase your love for the Lord and for all humanity.

# Dear Padre,

***Why do our bishops not marry? Scripture plainly says that they must be the husband of one wife and have faithful children.***

This is an excellent question and brings us face to face with an important truth: for Catholics, the sacred Scripture is not the singular source of our practice and discipline. We also look, with equal authority, to the living Tradition of the Church. The magisterium is entrusted with the authentic interpretation of both Scripture and Tradition.

With this theological and historical context as a necessary background to your question, the answer to your query is this: the lived Tradition of the Church does not support a married clergy, including bishops. Although the Scripture allows for it, and provides some general guidelines, the lived Tradition of the Church does not. The Roman Catholic Church has a celibate clergy and will continue to have a celibate clergy unless and until the magisterium, in union with the pope, determines otherwise. There have been some discussions about changing this discipline, but now there is not much momentum that would suggest any imminent change.

In the wider Orthodox Catholic Church, in union with Rome, there is a provision for a married clergy, but, even in these traditions, there is no exception made for married bishops. Bishops are and will continue to be celibate regardless of what Scripture may allow. ●
