

There are two things we should give our children: one is roots and the other is wings." So goes the adage. It is in knowing our roots that we know who we are. It is with wings that we then shape the future—a future sprouting from those roots but also blossoming into something new. If there were only the roots, we would never know life's richness. Without wings, never would we come to beauty.

The solemnity of Sts. Peter and Paul honors both of these dynamics in the Church. It was Peter who was the Rock, who was able to recognize God's presence made flesh among us, who would say to Jesus, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God" (Matthew 16:16).

It was Paul who pushed the envelope, who proclaimed that God's saving love was for Jews and Gentiles—both members of the household of God—without distinction. It was Paul who argued that circumcision was not necessary for a believer. It was Paul who recognized that the Law was indeed a blessing, yet also that obeying the Law does not save us-it is the love of Christ Jesus that saves us.

Many are rooted through faith in Christ Jesus. Some live out that faith as Catholics, others as Lutherans or Methodists, still others as Orthodox or Anglicans. All of us rooted in Christ, all of us living out faith, each blossoming in our own fruitfulness as guided by the Spirit, for the purpose of tradition is to pass on the flame and not to preserve the ashes. •

A Note from our Pastor

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ Jesus,

Happy Fourth of July! At the end of this week, we celebrate our Independence Day. Most Americans can recite only a couple of lines from the Declaration of Independence, namely the first two lines - "When in the Course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another...", and "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all [men] are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness, ...". And of course, the last line of the Declaration – "And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes and our sacred Honor."

Statements such as these are often called "true life statements" - when an individual reflects on their current life situation and makes a life altering decision to take a totally new and courageous direction where they assume that personal control of their future. All of us have those true-life moments in our lives if we take a moment to ponder our personal reality.

Each July 4th, we as a country celebrate a national holiday of hotdogs, hamburgers, and fireworks, in remembrance of the day when the then British Colonies declared one of the greatest "True Life Moments" in the founding of our United States of America. But we need to look beyond the fireworks and backyard BBQs to see what we are really celebrating in our country's history – the right of personal self-determination. The signers of the Declaration of Independence pledged their "lives, fortunes, and sacred honor" in support of this document, unsure if the world and their own fellow colonists would accept these ideas. They found within themselves the need and right to make a foundational shift in their lives for the betterment of themselves and their own future. With, or without, support from others, we often declare a new direction in our lives. Let me share some possible moments in your own lives, when you also made a "true life statement" for yourself. Then, this 4th of July, might take on a deeper personal understanding of your "declarations of independence" in your lives.

One of the most frequent of these moments occurs when one decides to declare their love for another and to propose marriage. It is not the moment of the proposal, but the moment that you decide "to propose" marriage. What a foundational shift in my life as I am pledging "my life, my fortunes, and my sacred honor" for the betterment of myself and my future, unsure if that person might say 'yes' or 'no'. You are taking a totally new and courageous direction in your life where you assume a new possible and personal control of your future. Another moment can occur in our lives when we make radical changes in our careers or work from what our family sees as our future. From a generational family of farmers to become a scientist, a lawyer, or even a professional skateboarder. Or it could be from the family living in the same county (for a century or two) and moving to a new country and a new culture. From the outside, "we" all think that person is "crazy", but from the inside we can often see the "self-realization of being my true self" and taking control of my happiness and my life. For most of us Americans, we can find in our genealogy that person who immigrated from another country to the United States for a better life. For my family it was in 1853, when another Patrick Donohoe left Ireland to immigrate to the United States. Who was that in your family history?

Also on every 4th of July, I often reflect on that true-life moment when I declared to myself my personal belief in God and my Catholic Faith, and following the teachings of Jesus, and His call to be His priest, when many around me were saying I was "crazy" and I should just be "going with the flow of the society's vision and morals". And I am so very happy that I, over fifty years ago, made that declaration for myself. For others that might have occurred on a retreat, when you saw and accepted the Catholic Faith as "My Faith" and made those foundational changes to follow Jesus rather than the world for the betterment of yourself and your ultimate future with God in heaven.

So, on this 4th of July, as we celebrate the bravery of those signers of that Declaration of Independence, take a moment and reflect on the many "declarations of independence" where you made a choice to be a better you! And make a prayer to continue growing into that better "you" that God is calling you to be.

Dear Padre,

What does the Church say about free will and predestination? I am confused and wonder if there is any fundamental difference?

The Church can be viewed as the champion of free will, for it is descriptive of God's grace at work in his creation. On the other hand, the Church does not champion predestination. The Church understands



that this concept is in direct opposition and contradicts the creative act of God. It is understandable how someone might confuse these two different perspectives. In fact, some Christian belief systems have historically confused them; for example, those who follow the thought of John Calvin (1509–1564), including various Congregational, Reformed, and Presbyterian churches. But, regardless of the confusion, the two positions are not complementary, and someone cannot hold both positions because they are incompatible with each other. Catholics believe that we have been created by God with free will. In response to this wonderful gift, we are invited to form our consciences and live our lives lovingly and deliberately as people who choose to respond, in total freedom, to the Way, the Truth, and the Life that is found in Jesus.



Anointing of the Sick: Upon request – please call the office. Any person who is sick (either homebound or in the hospital) or about to have surgery, is encouraged to receive Anointing of the Sick. As current Federal Law prohibits hospitals from the release of any patient's name. Father will not know you are in the hospital unless you call the office.

Baptisms of Infants: (0 to 5 yrs.): Please bring the child's civil birth certificate to the parish office to register the child, their parents & the Godparents for the one-hour Pre-Baptismal Preparation Class. Godparents must be able to provide Certificates for Catholic Baptism, Communion, and Confirmation, & if married, Marriage Certificate in the Catholic Church. Donation for the class and Baptism is \$30.00, for the class only is \$15.00. Date & time for the Baptism is scheduled after attending the Baptismal Class.

Confessions: The Sacrament of Reconciliation (or Confessions) is available on Thursday from 5:30 PM—6:00 PM and on Saturdays from 5:00 PM—5:30 PM and at any time by appointment with the Priest.

Quinceañeras: The honoree and their family must be registered and participating in the parish for two years prior to the year of the Quinceañera (or Quinceañero). The young person must have Baptism & Communion in the Catholic Church, & be attending the parish Religious Education Program. The family is strongly encouraged to contact the Church for 2 years before the intended

Marriage: Arrangements must be made with the priest or deacon, preferably one year before the intended date, (minimum of six months in advance) to complete the necessary requirements. At least one person must be an active and registered member of this parish. No wedding date is guaranteed until ALL diocesan requirements have been fulfilled.

<u>Blessing of Civil Marriages</u> – If you were married before a judge, or a non-Catholic minister, and wish to be readmitted to Holy Communion, there needs to be a Blessing of your Civil Marriage. Please call the parish office and set up an appointment with Father Patrick so he can hear your particular situation and can guide you through the process. Father Patrick is always saying "Don't wait! Start the process NOW!"
