If you could change one aspect of your life, what would that be? Financial instability? Arthritis? Addiction? A disruptive family member? Work's daily grind? Finding love? No doubt the answers are as varied as the people who answer the question.

Though the old poster advises us to "bloom where you are planted," sometimes we can feel as if we've been planted among weeds-the people we've been given, the problems that continually pop up, the conflicts that all too often shut out the peace we seek. Just as Jesus sends disciples into every place he intends to visit, the reality for us may very well be that he sends us into the very lives we live even though we wish we could change them. Where we are is where we've been sent. It is in the lives we have that we work out our salvation, for Jesus said, "The kingdom of God is at hand for you" (Luke 10:9).

St. Paul emphasized how important it is for disciples of Jesus to live out their identity as a new creation. British artist and sculptor Henry Moore made the observation that, in life, it is most important that we give ourselves over to a goal or dream, something so all-consuming that we live it morning, noon, and night. And the most important aspect of it, he said, is that it must be something we cannot possibly accomplish. For the followers of Jesus, it is the lifelong task to bloom where we've been planted.

A Note from our Pastor

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ Jesus,

This week I start with a story that can be retold about everyone in the parish. It could be a homeowner or the housekeeper or even another person living in the home.

Each time you drive up to the house or survey the interior of the house or that dreaded child's bedroom, we might say, "It is still in good condition, enough for now anyway." There are only a few places where the paint is chipped on the exterior of the house, or "we can still see outside through the




smudges on the windows", or "there still is a walkway into the child's room", and "yes" it needs to be taken care of, but it is "okay" for now. And it may go that way for weeks, or for the house, even for years - but eventually comes the day when "the okay for now no longer works." And then comes the major exterior house painting job. Or it is that extra deep "spring" house cleaning for every inch of the house's interior. And it may be calling in the biohazard team to take care of the piles of items in the child's room. The putting off of the job until it is "absolutely necessary" is common for most houses and even for companies. But when that decision comes that we can no longer put it off, we have to set up the plan and the budget to get these major renovations done. Well, that day has come for our parish, and we are embarking on planning and budgeting.

Over the next few weeks, I will be presenting these "cannot put off anymore" projects in an individual manner so everyone can understand the task, the reason it needs to be done now, and the crucial importance it means for our parish.



The stucco on the exterior of the Church is original to the church built in 1951 and has lasted for over 75 years. After that long you can see in these pieces of stucco that have fallen off that the interior fasteners to the wall and the metal stucco mesh have rusted through and are no longer attached to the concrete and cinder block structure of the church. That is also seen in the hole in the stucco next to the handrail at the entrance on the front of the church.

On the north side of the church's portico you can see another total collapse of the stucco. Then above the church portico is the exterior ledge for the choir loft windows, another example of the extensive repair work to be done. These are only the places where you can see the extent of the damage to the stucco over these 75 years. But these places indicate the entire stucco on the exterior of the church is also in the same condition.



There is no way to "patch" stucco when the extent of the interior parts of the stucco cannot been seen. All the stucco has to be removed and replaced with new stucco.

The preliminary estimate from two years ago for the stucco job for the entire church exterior was around \$300,000.00. This is a repair to the church that will have to be done for the integrity of the entire church structure. It cannot be ignored but must be done in the near future. That our stucco has lasted for over seventy five years is itself quite a blessing for the church.


This is the first and most important project of six infrastructure repairs for our church. In order to make these repairs, the parish is establishing a Parish's Capital Campaign. The first meeting of this Campaign Committee was held last Thursday. This is a project/campaign that will involve the whole parish. The committee will be seeking more people to help get this done. Over the next few weeks I will be describing the other major projects that are part of this campaign. In total we will need to raise between \$600,000.00 and \$675,000.00. The committee is looking into applications for grants from foundations. To apply for a loan from the diocese, we must have one-half of the money needed for any of the projects in our parish account before we can even sign contracts.

This is not an impossible task as this parish has already held successful Capital Campaigns for the construction of the Office/Rectory Building and the new Religious Education Building. The 2010 Church renovations done to the interior of the church was also successful. This is the first of several bulletin letters to share the basic information. We hope to have everything ready for a September appeal for the campaign. Please begin to consider what you might be able to support this campaign. I am very aware of the hard economic times we are suffering under, but this a sacrifice of your heart for our parish. Please pray for the success of the campaign. There is more to come!

Liturgy & Sacraments

Anointing of the Sick: Upon request – please call the office. Any person who is sick (either homebound or in the hospital) or about to have surgery, is encouraged to receive Anointing of the Sick. As current Federal Law prohibits hospitals from the release of any patient's name. Father will not know you are in the hospital unless you call the office.

Baptisms of Infants: (0 to 5 yrs.): Please bring the child's civil birth certificate to the parish office to register the child, their parents & the Godparents for the one-hour Pre-Baptismal Preparation Class. Godparents must be able to provide Certificates for Catholic Baptism, Communion, and Confirmation, & if married, Marriage Certificate in the Catholic Church. Donation for the class and Baptism is \$30.00, for the class only is \$15.00. Date & time for the Baptism is scheduled after attending the Baptismal Class.

Confessions: The Sacrament of Reconciliation (or Confessions) is available on Thursday from 5:30 PM—6:00 PM and on Saturdays from 5:00 PM—5:30 PM and at any time by appointment with the Priest.

Quinceañeras: The honoree and their family must be registered and participating in the parish for two years prior to the year of the Quinceañera (or Quinceañero). The young person must have Baptism & Communion in the Catholic Church, & be attending the parish Religious Education Program. The family is strongly encouraged to contact the Church for 2 years before the intended date.

Marriage: Arrangements must be made with the priest or deacon, preferably one year before the intended date, (minimum of six months in advance) to complete the necessary requirements. At least one person must be an active and registered member of this parish. No wedding date is guaranteed until ALL diocesan requirements have been fulfilled.

Blessing of Civil Marriages – If you were married before a judge, or a non-Catholic minister, and wish to be readmitted to Holy Communion, there needs to be a Blessing of your Civil Marriage. Please call the parish office and set up an appointment with Father Patrick so he can hear your particular situation and can guide you through the process. Father Patrick is always saying "Don't wait! Start the process NOW!"

Dear Padre,

At Mass during the Our Father, should we hold hands, lift our hands up, or keep our hands to ourselves?

Among many ancient religions, it was common to extend one's hands toward heaven while praying. This practice has continued in the Mass, where the rubrics indicate that the priest should extend his hands at certain points, including during the Our Father. The celebrant represents all the people with this gesture. The deacon is expressly forbidden to hold his hands up in prayer. There is no particular gesture assigned to the rest of the congregation. Some may be holding hands, some lifting their hands, some standing with arms crossed.



The variety of postures is not a problem in itself. The problem is when people become distracted or judgmental of others. As a rule of thumb, I suggest doing what the rest of the congregation does. As stated in the "Order of the Mass," written by the Bishops' Committee on the Liturgy in 2003, "The people are called as members of an organic whole, not as disparate individuals. A Christian assembly that worships with one heart and mind' (Acts 4:32) naturally moves toward and consciously chooses a common posture as a sign of its unity. Such common posture both expresses and fosters the intention and spiritual attitude of the participants'" (28). The gestures at Mass are not as important as the essence of the Mass, and part of that essence is our unity in the body of Christ.
