Deuteronomy 30:10-14 / Colossians 1:15-20 / Luke 10:25-37

We tend to hear the parable of the Good Samaritan and place ourselves in the role of the Samaritan, thereby expected to be compassionate, as was the Samaritan. Those who heard Jesus tell the parable, however, would never have identified with the Samaritan. To them, the Samaritans were religious heretics who worshipped not in Jerusalem but at their own temple. Thus, the people of Jesus' day would have seen themselves as the victim, the one on the side of the road. Who, then, would be the Samaritan, the surprising caregiver, the compassionate one? Because parables are about God and how God works, it would be God who is and has always been the one who heals and feeds and nurtures us back to life. The parable then surprises the hearer of Jesus' day— God as a compassionate Samaritan!

It is God's compassion that we bring to those seeking forgiveness as well as to those who, for whatever reason, have not yet reached the point of asking for forgiveness. It is God's compassion that we bring to the unborn, the immigrant, the homeless, the sick in need of healing, the jobless who have lost hope. It is God's compassion that a nation brings to anyone who has lost his or her way, as it has been noted that the greatness of a nation is in how that nation deals with and cares for the weakest among them.

A Note From Our Pastor

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

From last week's bulletin I quote, "The putting off of the job until it is "absolutely necessary" is common for most houses and even for companies. But when that decision comes that we can no longer put it off, we have to set up the plan and the budget to get these major renovations done. Well, that day has come for our parish and we are embarking on planning and budgeting."

The next project from the Master Plan Committee is the Church's-Stained Glass Windows – and we are so lucky to have two totally different types of stained glass: the traditional stained glass with pictures and backgrounds made of pieces of colored glass held in a "lead came" interlocking system of support as well as the large colored chunk pieces of glass held in concrete type frame windows on each side of the nave of the church. It is my understanding that the nave windows were installed in 1965 after Hurricane Betsy. Each type of window has their own problems and need of repair.



We have the traditional stained-glass windows from the 1950 construction of the church. These windows can be seen in the Sanctuary area, in the choir loft, and the small niches next to Mary and Sacred Heart. There are more of these traditional windows all around the church – even in the bathroom! These original windows from the 1951 construction of the church have two major problems. First is the rusting and deterioration of the lead cameing that holds the individual glass pieces together. This can be seen in an exterior shot of these windows and an interior picture of the lead came of the windows



The Second, is the extreme weight of the glass pieces in the upper part of each window that has caused the aged cameing at the bottom of the windows to "bow" outward from the original flat plane of the window frame. These two repairs to save the windows of our church require the complete removal of the metal frame of the window, disassembly of the window into individual pieces of glass, re-"cameing" (re-leading), then reassembly of all the pieces back into a new metal frame, and finally reinstallation back into the church wall. These two pictures show the deteriorated state of the lead came.







The multi-colored chunk glass windows on the nave of the church have two concerns. First is the totally wrong use of the plexiglass "protective covers" on the outside wall of the windows. These covers have trapped moisture and rain between the plexiglass and the window which caused the buildup of mold on the windows. This mold and the extreme South Texas heat have caused the plexiglass to "bow" outward and no longer give any protection to the glass window. The mold, moisture and rainwater have accelerated the deterioration of the window sills below each window. Since this is on the outside of the windows, there may be some additional repair work needed on these chunk glass windows which can only be evaluated once the plexiglass is removed

SPECIAL NOTE: There is a very special requirement with these renovations to the stained-glass windows! Remember that the exterior stucco work, mentioned in last week's bulletin, must be done at <u>the same time</u> that the windows are reinstalled! The exterior stucco work butts up and meets the window frame to create an air-tight seal between the window and the wall for the air conditioning and heating of the church. These two projects must be coordinated to occur and to be completed at the very same time. This requires some special coordination between the two projects both for the work and for the budgeting of the funds.



Dear Padre,

I have a question about the prayer the priest says after the Our Father. Someone told me it's called an "embolism." Why don't we just end with "Amen" like when we say it at home?

You have correctly identified the "embolism" or "interpretation" that has been added to the Lord's Prayer during the sacred liturgy. It reads, "Deliver us, Lord, we pray, from every evil, graciously grant peace in our days, that, by the help of your mercy, we may be always free from sin and safe from all



distress, as we await the blessed hope and the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ." This addition, ancient in its use during the eucharistic liturgy, is a further explanation of the content and the intercessory nature of the prayer. It develops the last petition of the Lord's Prayer and asks for deliverance from the power of evil for the whole community of the faithful. It is an appropriate insertion, reflecting the purpose of the eucharistic gathering as spiritual but also as a celebration of the Lord's words and directions to us. In private prayer, the embolism would be out of place.

The sacred liturgy is filled with intercessory prayers, acclamations, and bits and pieces of ancient eucharistic prayers and blessings. Everything has been carefully chosen and placed within the celebration of the sacred liturgy to assist the faithful who gather to lift their minds and hearts to the Heavenly Father, through his Son Jesus, by the power of the Holy Spirit.
