As he stood in line in front of me, the back of his T-shirt read, "Pain is weakness leaving the body." Though unsaid, it implied that the parting pain would be replaced by newfound strength. Yet, the more I thought about it, I wondered if that is always the case. Some pain simply leaves one empty, like the grief that comes with the death of one's child. That emptiness never leaves, it is never replaced. So too, the pain of living with mental illness, as it seems to isolate one from many of life's joys and satisfactions. Or, eventually, the aging process in all of us, as it slips in and steals the treasures of life, one by one. Pain is not always weakness leaving the body. Sometimes, it is the pain of an alien spirit settling in for the long haul.

If St. Paul's assertion that Jesus came and "emptied himself...coming in human likeness... even [to] death on a cross," then those times that seem to empty us of all we would hold dear are the times when we slowly take on the image of Jesus in our own lives. It is at such times when we are most powerless but also when God's spirit shines through our broken and wounded lives, if only because we become totally dependent upon God. It is Saint Teresa of Kolkata who is said to have once remarked that even God cannot fill what is already full.

A Note from our Pastor

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Has this story, or something like it, ever happened to you? The auto repair shop, or the dealership, does the inspection on your car or truck and reports that the threads on the tires are getting too thin for safe driving and you will need to buy new tires. And the price for a set of four new tires is often very expensive. You can continue to drive on them for a while, but you have to adjust your spending habits to save up for that necessary

car repair. There are people who have anticipated such expenses and have their emergency funds for such a purchase. But most of us, including myself, are often surprised by such a large expense and have to sit down and do some serious budget adjustments to pay for the new tires so that my vehicle is safe to drive for myself and for my family. It is this same sort of story when you detect a water spot on the ceiling and you are faced with a replacement of your roof. Or is it that spot on the wall (or floor) that you inspect and find there is termite damage and the wall (or floor) needs to be replaced. Then there is the spot on the exterior of the house that has over the years been good enough, but the cracked and peeling paint in that small area prompts you to inspect it more closely. And then it grows into a total repaint of the house's exterior.

Over the last couple of months, I have been sharing with you the work of our church's Master Plan Committee. This Committee was given the job to create a list of the major repair and renovation projects for the parish's buildings and grounds. As they continued their work over the last few years, the list got longer and larger. The members took the time and effort, not only to make a list of these major projects, but sought out estimates and bids to get them done. A short review of the list is to remove the deteriorating 75-year-old outside walls of the church and apply new stucco to the entire exterior of the church, to repair the rusting framework of the stained-glass windows of the church, to install a new roof for the parish hall, to replace the aging parking lot, and several other items. The committee's work is still ongoing as we actually start to make these projects a reality. The current list and estimates were turned over to the Parish Financial Council to include these absolutely necessary projects in the budget for the coming years.

Our parish's Finance Council determined that to continue the regular work of the parish and to include these projects for the overall long term needs of the buildings that a Capital Campaign Appeal to the parish should be presented to the parish. Taking a few people from the Master Plan Committee, a couple of people from the Finance Council, and adding a few others, the "Our Living Church Capital Building Fund Campaign" Committee was created to prepare for this special appeal. The "Living Church" was adopted as the title of the campaign as it reflects that these buildings and repairs are merely the physical stones and materials of the buildings we call our church, in which we the "living stones" of the spiritual church gather to celebrate the Eucharist, to pray, to socialize, and to educate and to grow in our Catholic Faith. The "Our" of the title is the strongest truth of the title as it is the commitment of all of "us" as parishioners to the call that "our" church's needed repairs and projects are for the good of all the parish. This appeal is not only for ourselves in the current time, but is "our" vision for the future generations of our parish and its continued existence for years to come. We cannot gather as "Our Spiritual Living Church" if our church buildings don't exist. One hundred years ago, a small group of Catholic faithful gathered and envisioned a building that could be used as their "church". We are the result of those one hundred years of great efforts and sacrifices in the current parish community and church building that we have. The "Our Living Church" Building Campaign is to honor the one hundred years of living stones that came before us and to ensure a suitable space for ourselves today and for the living stones of our church in the years to come. Over the next few weeks, you will hear more on the ongoing work of the "Our Living Church" campaign committee and how all of us are being called to be "living" stones for "OUR Living Church" – the parish community of St. John of the Cross Church in Orange Grove, Texas. Please be open to their words and please pray for the success of our Building Fund's Capital Campaign.

Dear Padre,

A Protestant friend tells me that Jesus died to take the punishment for our sins. That doesn't seem accurate to me. What does the Church teach about the meaning of Jesus' death on the cross?

Jesus understood his mission to be sacrificing his own life "as a ransom for many" (Matthew 20:28). His fidelity to that mission was even at the cost of death. However, saying Jesus' death was payment for our sins doesn't mean that a vengeful God was appeared by the slaughter of his own innocent son. Rather, we are redeemed because of the mutual love between Father and Son, as well as the love Christ had for us all when he offered his life. "It is love 'to the end' (see John



13:1) that confers on Christ's sacrifice its value as redemption and reparation, as atonement and satisfaction" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 616). It is in this sense that Jesus' death was a payment-not one to be exacted—but a unique sacrifice "that completes and surpasses all other sacrifices," when "the Father handed his Son over to sinners in order to reconcile us with himself," and the Son of God freely and lovingly offered his human life to his Father "in reparation for our disobedience" (CCC 614). Christ "bore our sins in his body upon the cross.... By his wounds you have been healed" (1 Peter 2:24). Viewed in light of the resurrection, Christ's death has meaning in eternal life's triumph over sin.
