In A Christmas Carol, Ebenezer Scrooge found himself confronted by the person he had become: someone forced to accept the reality painted by the Ghosts of Christmas Past, Present, and Yet to Come. Scrooge hadn't realized how he had slowly drifted into becoming an uncaring and greedy person, unable to show compassion because he never really saw someone else's pain. The story of Ebenezer Scrooge is the story of the rich man in this Sunday's gospel who was unmoved by poor Lazarus, sitting at the gate of the rich man's sumptuous life. They are both stories of human beings drifting into emptiness.

St. Thomas Aquinas suggested that our motivations in life can ultimately be reduced to eight different categories. If we're interested in understanding what sort of people we are becoming, we might ask ourselves which of these questions best describes our motivation: Am I making my decisions and choices about life based on wealth? Or am I looking to be admired by others and be praised? Is it lasting glory that I seek? Or power so that I can be noted for "making a difference?" Is what I seek a life of ultimate pleasure and comfort? Is it health that I look for? Or perhaps something related to my inner life-some intangible good, like virtue or knowledge? Or is it to see God already in this life what I truly want? It is always a challenge to know our true selves because all too often we may be adrift, unaware of who we are becoming. •

A Note From Our Pastor

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ Jesus,

Last weekend our parish formally began "Our Living Church Building Fund Capital Campaign" for the long-term good of our parish. It is my hope and prayer that every family open their hearts to support this building fund campaign as best they can.

When someone asks you what church you go to, I hope that you say, "I belong to St. John of the Cross Church. That is my parish church." And then comes, a very touchy and sensitive question from me as your pastor. "When the offertory basket is passed in the pews, what do you put in the collection to support the care and upkeep of 'your' church"? With cash, offertory envelopes, or even on-line giving, your contribution, large or small, says, "This is MY church. And I want to support it to keep its walls up, windows clean, keep the lights on, and in the South Texas heat to keep the air-conditioning working." Whether it is a weekly offering or follows a bi-weekly or monthly payroll period, my contribution says, "This is my Church, and I want to keep it in good condition for me and for the future."

You might ask, "With rising inflation and higher prices for most everything how can I make a pledge towards the building fund?" You must prioritize to meet your essential necessities for your home life – food, light, gas, rent or mortgage etc. But then there are those wonderful things that we do for ourselves that really are not essential necessities: movies, a daily Starbucks coffee, the daily run to the taqueria, new pairs of shoes or some new fashion clothes. All of these are nice, but you could do without them and still have a cheerful home life. Everyone is being asked to make a small sacrifice of some non-essential item or activity, and to donate that money toward the building fund. Your family of four might go out every week for dinner at a restaurant spending \$120.00 each time. Sacrifice one of the dinners in a month and make a pledge toward the Living Church Campaign. Or at that weekly dinner, giving up the cocktails or the desserts would also be a good sacrifice of non-essentials. Or not going to the movies once a month – tickets, drinks, and popcorn for four runs about \$50.00 - \$75.00 – and making that your pledge. New clothes and new shoes always bring smiles to one's face, but only two new clothing items in a month rather than the usual four or five. That savings would make a nice regular monthly donation to Our Living Church Building Fund. Everyone has to make their financial budget meet your essential basic living needs, but there are some nice but non-essential things in each budget. Take some time to reflect "Do I really need this or that item? And could I do without it and make a pledge to support my church's building fund?"

Please be aware that your current regular ongoing donations to the church need to be maintained to keep the regular work of our church going. And if you have been giving regularly to the Building Fund over the years, just complete your "Living Church Pledge Card" with that same amount and turn it in so your former Building Fund pledge will become your "Our Living Church Building Fund" pledge. If you have not made your pledge yet, please be sure to take a pledge card and support your parish church. And like the Jesus' parable of the widow with her two small coins, trust that the Lord will watch over you for your generosity to your church. Whether your pledge is small or large, make it from your heart and God will bless "Our Living Church." Thank you for your regular weekly support of our church and for considering this special "Our Living Church Building Fund Capital Campaign" building fund appeal.

Deacon's Corner

The meditation is for the 26th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C. The readings are from Amos 6:1a, 4-7; Psalm 146:7, 8-9, 9-10; 1 Timothy 6:11-16; and, Luke 16: 19-31. The emphasis of Luke's Gospel on the plight of the poor, and the distinctions between the rich and the poor continue this Sunday. The readings seem to be getting harsher in terms of tending to the needs of the poor. The first reading from Amos lists a "woe" to the people of Israel, that they not be complacent in their wealth and leisure: "...they shall be the first to go into exile, and their wanton revelry shall be done away with." The Psalm continues this emphasis on the needs of the poor in the entire reading. Here is the first stanza, verse 4: "Blessed is he who keeps faith forever, secures justice for the oppressed, gives food to the hungry. The LORD sets captives free." The other stanzas are the same. The point of serving the poor is that faith comes from our detachment from the lures of the world, and that service to those most in need of mercy leads to salvation. I think that is what the letter to Timothy in today's readings is trying to teach us. Faith comes from service to (or prayer for) those most in need of God's mercy! The Gospel is about the poor man Lazarus and the rich man. The rich man ignored Lazarus' poverty and his basic needs. Lazarus is placed by Luke outside the rich man's door, to give us the impression that the rich man encountered Lazarus on a daily basis and simply ignored him. St. Theresa of Calcutta described that scene before she began her ministry to the sick and dying in India. When she decided to leave her teaching job and tend to the needs of the dying in the streets of India,

that changed her life completely. There is a story about a rich donor who was watching her clean toilets where the poor would relieve themselves, and he said to her, "I wouldn't do that for a million dollars!" She said, "I wouldn't either," meaning that she would only do it for the love of God. Faith like that is demanding, but ultimately rewarding. That is the meaning of the Resurrection. The rest of the parable is about those attitudes that lead us away from the important aspects of everlasting life. People who lose themselves in slavery to sin, addiction, pride, anger, hatred can never live in the Resurrection. Resurrection begins in this life. I think that is what Luke is saying about the law and the prophets.

"...(B)etween us and you a great chasm is established to prevent anyone from crossing who might wish to go from our side to yours or from your side to ours." The rich man then asks the Lord (through the voice of Abraham) to send someone "from the dead" to his brothers and warn them, but the evangelist says: "'If they will not listen to Moses and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded if someone should rise from the dead." In other words, the Resurrection means nothing unless we recognize the Will of God for us as the Letter to Timothy tells us: "pursue righteousness, devotion, faith, love, patience, and gentleness. Compete well for the faith. Lay hold of eternal life, to which you were called when you made the noble confession in the presence of many witnesses." This noble confession is to love God and neighbor.

Dear Padre,

Why does my parish priest preach about love practically every Sunday?

"Through the course of the liturgical year, the homily sets forth the mysteries of faith and the standards of the Christian life on the basis of the sacred text" (*Lectionary*, 24). A translation of the English word "love" appears in the Bible more than 500 times; by comparison, "sin" appears approximately 400 times. Thus, insofar as the homily "should be an explanation of some aspect of the readings from sacred Scripture" (*General Instruction of the Roman Missal*, 65), God's word on "love" is far too prevalent to overlook.

Pope Francis called God's word "a love letter, written to us by the One who knows us best." In the Bible, this God who desires to bestow his love on us (See 1 John 3:1), is essentially telling us, "How do I love thee? Let me count the ways." How we love God in return may be likened to two partners in a committed relationship.

Over time, they become so intertwined that they can even assume each other's speech patterns, mannerisms, and views. Likewise, for those who love God, over the years we can begin to internalize the words from God's "love letter" and reflect them in our Christian speech, actions, and outlook! "Whoever loves me will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we will come to him and make our dwelling with him" (John 14:23).
