Here is a quick self-test: Name three things in your life for which you are grateful. Finished? If you were able to name three things easily, your spirituality is probably in a good place. If you had difficulty, your spirituality may be in need of some work. Spiritual writers have long noted that living day by day with a sense of gratitude is one of the signs of holiness. Yet, a number of attitudes can get in the way of our being thankful. One is anger; it unsettles and focuses our attention on one issue, keeping us from seeing a bigger picture filled with blessings. Another is living with continual wanting: incessant desires for more prevent us from recognizing the beauty and goodness of what already is. Fear too keeps us from being grateful; it obliterates all the goodness that is present and focuses on an unknown and uncertain future that may never be.

Therapists have advised that, at the end of each day, people should take time to name three things that happened that day for which they are grateful, as doing so will often ease depression. Our religious tradition has been encouraging this for 2,000 years. Not all depression is due to life circumstances; some is the result of chemical or hormonal imbalances. But, if our sadness is the consequence of life events, naming three positive occurrences from each day not only brings a balance to our attitudes but also brings us to deeper faith, recognizing a power greater than ourselves at work in our lives. That power is God.

A Note From Our Parish Office

FAMILY INFORMATION UPDATES REQUESTED

It is important that the parish office have up-to-date records for each parish family. We need to have current phone numbers as well as mailing addresses. If a family requests offertory envelopes, those envelopes are mailed to the address on file. If that family moves, it is imperative that the family notify the church. There have been numerous times that offertory envelopes are returned to the parish office as "undeliverable" or "address unknown". This requires the parish to pay a 78-cent fee each time envelopes are returned to the post office. In addition, current phone numbers are essential. Often times when attempting to contact a parishioner, a landline 384 number is still on file which has been disconnected. If you have disconnected your landline or moved, please update your information by contacting the parish office. Or visit the parish website st-johnog.org. Under the about tab, click on the new parishioner registration and complete the form.

Another situation that we encounter in the parish office is many family units include adult children who are married and have their own families. It is important that each family unit be registered separately. If your adult children have never registered as members, please have them register so that we can include their spouse and children. Or have them submit a new parishioner registration form online at st-johnog.org.

Your cooperation in keeping your family's registration information up to date is necessary and helpful to the day to day activities of the parish office.

DID YOU KNOW....?

We are frequently contacted regarding sacraments. If you are an adult and would like to receive Baptism, Communion, and/ Confirmation, please contact the parish office. The Diocese of Corpus Christi requires an OCIA curriculum be followed over a two-year period. Father Patrick can guide individuals through the requirements. In addition, if you have not been receiving the sacrament of communion because of a marital issue, like cohabitation, civil marriage, divorce, or even marriage through a different faith, etc., there are numerous pathways to help individuals be able to receive Communion. For example, just because you are divorced does not prevent you from receiving the sacrament of Communion. Contact the parish office as each individual's case is unique and has different requirements.

OUR LIVING CHURCH BUILDING FUND

Finally, we have begun Our Living Church Building Fund Capital Campaign to renovate our parish buildings and grounds, but we must also continue to care for our parish in the meantime. Parishioners need to know what an expense this maintenance is. For example, in the last 12 weeks, we have spent \$1100 on plumber services. And, we've had to replace three A/C units in our religious education building at a cost of over \$8,000. The Capital Campaign is designated to renovate specific projects at our parish; therefore, regular weekly contributions are necessary to maintain our parish.

Your contributions to the maintenance and planned renovations of our parish are greatly appreciated as well as greatly needed.

Deacon's Corner

Today, we celebrate the 28th Sunday in Ordinary Time. We continue with Luke's Gospel until the first Sunday of Advent, when we will switch to the Gospel of Matthew. The topic for Advent will be the Alpha and the Omega. I hope I remember this when the time comes. For today, I want to discuss the topic of Faith. We see in the Gospel today the words: "Stand up and go your faith has saved you." Other evangelists use similar phrases: Luke 7:50, when Jesus forgives the sins of a woman of ill repute (verse 39), he says: "Your faith has saved you; go in peace." Luke 18:42, when he restores sight to a blind man: "Have sight your faith has saved you." In Mark we have the blind Bartimaeus: Mark 10:52, "Go your way; your faith has saved you.' Immediately he received his sight and followed him on the way." Matthew 9:29: "Let it be done for you according to your faith." Matthew 20:34, "Lord, let our eyes be opened." This statement by the two blind men was made after Jesus asked them what they wanted him to do for them. Take a look at the readings today and see if you can spot the way to get or achieve faith. The first reading is from 2 Kings 5:14-17, the story of Naaman the King's conversion after the healing by the prophet Elisha; Psalm 98:1, 2-3, 3-4 (the Lord has revealed to the nations his saving power); 2 Timothy 2:8-13 (a statement to Timothy of the Paschal Mystery, the cornerstone of our faith); and the Gospel of Luke Chapter 17:11-19 (the cleansing of the 10 lepers, and only one returned, a Samaritan). Every one of these healings involves an encounter with the Lord Jesus. Those healed have sought out the Lord because they know he can heal them. There has to be a searching for the Lord. He calls us all by virtue of our Baptism, and when we don't answer, we suffer. When we answer he has work for us. So you will see in these healing stories where "their faith" has healed them, the persons that have been healed want to follow him and do his will and his work. This is what an encounter looks like: we seek Jesus because we need something, he answers and asks us what we want him to do for us, we answer, and if we "hear" him we have faith. Faith is not

just a belief in something, it is answer to a call that was initiated by us because we needed HIM. Faith is a way of life that brings peace and joy. Faith removes anger, dissatisfaction, jealousy, heals the uneasiness of the inner self. Faith sets us free from doubt. It does all that and leads us to a deeper relationship with the Lord and with each other. Now, let's look at the healing of the lepers in today's Gospel. Notice that the one who appreciates the healing is a Samaritan. A Samaritan is an enemy of the main community of the Hebrew people, the Israelites. The Israelites are from the Southern kingdom, and the Samaritans are from the Northern kingdom, and they are basically enemies. The Evangelists use the Samaritans in various places to make the Pharisees and the Scribes understand that Jesus wants us to learn the law of love. No one is excluded. Jesus resurfaces the story of Naaman in Luke 4:27, to let them see that God plays no favorites. In fact, Jesus reveals that the Father is sort of predisposed to help the poorest of the poor in the community of Israel, and even the enemies of Israel. When he heals Lepers and the crippled, the blind, and the possessed, they do not like it! Do we have that same kind of intolerance today? You say. Do you cling to intolerance of those who are afflicted with poverty or lack of education or those who the society considers not worthy of inclusion? We have to search our hearts to see if our Faith makes us worthy to love God and neighbor. Faith cannot be a personal thing, it has to include community, different environments and appreciation of differences, cultures, practices or traditions. Faith has to give us satisfaction, remove fears and give us security. The Lord heals without regard to whether we appreciate it or not. He healed 10 lepers but only 1 returned. Faith in the Lord frees us, but we can go our separate ways and ignore the goodness of the Lord. That does not mean, however, that we'll be saved in the next life. That can only happen if we appreciate what Jesus does for us, and we "get up, your faith has healed you." Deacon Cavada

PARENTAL CHOICE IS NOW LAW IN TEXAS ~ Education Savings Accounts (ESAs) will provide participating families with state funds to help pay for private school tuition and related educational expenses, including textbooks, uniforms, and school meals. The ESA application portal will open in January 2026. Families who apply and are approved will begin receiving ESA funds in July 2026, allowing them to prepare for expenses in the 2026–2027 school year.

Dear Padre,

Are people born with the Holy Spirit, or do they have to be baptized in order to receive the Holy Spirit? If we are not born with the Holy Spirit, is it just our conscience that is bothered when we are doing wrong?

Your question is suggesting that the Holy Spirit is "in" or "out." St. Paul teaches us, "In him we live and move and have our being" (Acts 17:28). In other words, the Spirit of God is always with us, and we are dependent on that Spirit for life. There is no beginning and there is no end; the Spirit always was, and is, and will be.



The Catechism of the Catholic Church explains that "Conscience is a judgment of reason whereby the human person recognizes the moral quality of a concrete act that he is going to perform, is in the process of performing, or has already completed. In all he says and does, man is obliged to follow faithfully what he knows to be just and right" (1778). We have an obligation to form our consciences to know what is right and to help our children form theirs. It is with the cooperation of the Spirit that a "good conscience" is formed.

When we celebrate the sacraments, including the sacrament of baptism, we are confirming the life of the Spirit that is within is. We are acknowledging and proclaiming the abiding presence of the Spirit of God. .


