Singing together during the distribution of holy Communion is one way of expressing the reality that we are one in the Eucharist, the Body of Christ. I once was taught to pray quietly during this time. If I'm honest, however, what I find myself doing after I return to my pew is watching others process past as they return from receiving Communion. They are a parade of holiness on the way. They are the longtime parishioners who have been making their way back to their pews in this way for decades—some now using walkers or canes, others with a bit of a slow hobble. There are teenagers, too. Some, from the expressions on their faces, look like their parents made them come, while others look impressively prayerful. Young parents, too, caring for a new baby in their arms, and another couple holding a two-year-old's hand as he tugs to escape and be free. And middle-aged single people, now halfway through this life's journey. Young couples, as well, those just married or engaged and so obviously in love, but also widows and widowers longing for the love they once knew. All of these are the body of Christ, the very temple of God built upon the foundation that is Christ Jesus, as Paul notes so well. This is why I watch them processing back to their pews. This, too, is prayer. •

A Note From Our Pastor

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ Jesus,

As announced last weekend, I had a medical outpatient procedure done on Friday, October 31st. Since I did not know how I would be feeling, I asked Fr. Richard Gutierrez to cover the weekend Masses. The procedure went well, and today (Thursday) I had my first post operative follow-up exam. Everything is healing nicely, and I have another follow-up exam in two weeks.

Doing the regular guy thing ("macho man who can push his way through things") I was walking around with small baby steps for the first couple of days. I even celebrated Mass on Monday and Tuesday staying next to the altar and using a high backed (bar) stool as I "sat" and celebrated Mass. Monday evening, I pushed myself too much and even went to the monthly Parish Council meeting. It was just a one-hour meeting, but at the end, I slowly baby-stepped myself back to the rectory and immediately went to bed. It has been a few days of pushing myself a bit too hard, and I very quickly realized that I am not bouncing back from a surgery or illness as I did when I was younger. So, the rest of this week and next week, I will be reducing my presence in the office and resting and healing a bit more. It is sad to realize that you are getting old! Just pray that the healing goes well and I am able to return to full steam!

In September of 2016, I was at my highest weight of 270 pounds. When I got to St. John of the Cross, I had lost about 50 lbs. but was still very overweight. In May of 2023, my Primary Doctor, put me on Mounjaro for my diabetes and to help with weight loss. So, over the last two years, I lost a consistent one or two pounds a week, until I hit my maintenance weight of 155 pounds. Based on my height, bone structure, and age (hate that word) I am right where my weight should be. With the total weight loss of 110 pounds, there was a lot of excess skin on my stomach. So, based on my doctor's recommendation, I had abdominoplasty. (As was translated on Monday by one of the parish council members – "I had a tummy tuck!") It has been a lot harder than I thought it would be to recover from. And today, I was told that it is a six-to-eight-week time period for full healing or recuperation, The good news is that I am now in a much more healthy body shape. Bad news is that I will be having to get a whole new wardrobe of clothes as my current pants and shorts no longer fit me. I have gone from an XXL to size a small.

This coming week we celebrate as a nation Veteran's Day on November 11th. Please say, "Thank You," to any of our current military personnel, and in a special way to any of our Veterans. As the son of a career military officer, I have always held our military in the highest regard. And as we have been doing through our All Souls Novena of Masses, pray for our deceased veterans and their families for the great sacrifices that they have made for our nation.

Deacon's Corner

Deacon's Corner

Today is the celebration of the Lateran Cathedral in Rome, as a symbol of the universal church. The title of the Sunday is "Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica." It is the site of councils of the Church that took place in Rome at various times over the span of close to a thousand years! It was a Papal Cathedral until St. Peter's was constructed. The Lateran was the site of at least 5 ecumenical councils: (1) The First Council of the Lateran (1123); (2) Second Council (1139); (3) The Third Lateran Counsel (1179); (4) the Fourth Lateran Council 1215, and (5) the Fifth Lateran Counsel 1512-1517. A number of non-ecumenical councils included those dealing with heresy, mainly occurred throughout the centuries. One such council was the Lateran Council against Monothelitism, the Lateran Council of 769 against iconoclasm, and the Lateran Council of 964 for the purpose of deposing Pope Benedict V. The first ecumenical council was about the Concordat (Treaty) of Worms, which was an agreement between the Catholic Church and the Holy Roman Empire regulating the procedure for the appointment of bishops and abbots. That function no longer belonged to the emperors. This council also forbade the marriage of priests, deacons, sub-deacons, monks and abbots. The second council was to quell or put down a schism (division in the church) caused by an anti-pope, Anacletus II. The Third Council dealt with church discipline, the start of the Canon Law, limitation of papal elections to the college of cardinals and the condemnation of simony (selling blessed articles because of their blessing). The Fourth Council "addressed a number of issues, including the sacraments, the role of the laity, the treatment of Jews and heretics (those persons who misstate the truths of the Catholic faith), and

the organization of the church." Source Wikipedia, and the Catholicpedia (online Catholic Encyclopedia). Why do I state these boring facts in this meditation? The only reading I want to quote for this column is the following from Ezekiel: "Wherever the river flows, every sort of living creature that can multiply shall live, and there shall be abundant fish, for wherever this water comes the sea shall be made fresh. Along both banks of the river, fruit trees of every kind shall grow; their leaves shall not fade, nor fruit fail. Every month they shall bear fresh fruit, for they shall be watered by the flow from the sanctuary. Their fruit shall serve for food, and their leaves for medicine." The reading comes from Ezekiel 47:1-2, 8-9, 12. The quote is from verses 9 and 12. It is beautiful, if you think about it! It means that the Church is like a river of living water. Wherever the water flows, everything thrives and grows and produces. The water is the Holy Spirit which inspires the Church to constantly produce good fruits, in spite of all the hurdles. When mistakes are made, they are corrected, and the Church enforces the precepts (laws) that govern our spiritual lives. For example, the Church is responsible for dispensing the sacraments, making rules about marriage, codes of conduct, enforcing discipline, excommunicating heretics, leading the world in spiritual matters, right reason, truth, charity and justice. Everywhere that the "river" flows is teeming with life, which is translated "Resurrection." The Lord came to establish his Church in the World for a purpose—that all might come to know, love and serve him. Without the Church we would be lost. When we have ignored the Church, we have been lost! If you have lost your way, find your way back.





Dear Padre,

Should the pope get involved in American politics?

No, the pope should not get involved in the politics of any country. However, politics often intersects with religious concerns and particularly gospel values. When this occurs, the Holy Father has a responsibility to preach the gospel and defend the values the gospel teaches, even when it might sound political. He pronounces and teaches the values of the gospel, regardless of what nation or politician might feel confronted or challenged by what he teaches.

What often happens is, when politicians find themselves in conflict with the gospel values the pope is teaching, they choose to say, "The pope has no business in our politics," instead of listening. Completely understandable, at least from one perspective, but probably also



disingenuous from another perspective. Politicians are fully aware of what is being proclaimed and why it is being proclaimed but choose not to listen. That, too, is completely understandable, if regrettable. One has to think only of the scribes and the Pharisees, and more particularly the high priest, who said, "Consider that it is better for you that one man should die instead of the people, so that the whole nation may not perish" (John 11:50).
