Isaiah 11:1-10 / Romans 15:4-9 / Matthew 3:1-12

Today's first reading from the prophet Isaiah offers a familiar Advent image: the shoot sprouting from the stump of Jesse. The verses immediately preceding speak of God walking through the forest with an ax: "The tall of stature shall be felled, and the lofty ones shall be brought low" (Isaiah 10:33). But now, amidst all the destruction, a tiny sign of new life emerges, and the Spirit of God descends upon it, bearing many gifts—wisdom, understanding, counsel, strength, knowledge, awe, delight.

So often, when we scroll through the news, our attention is captured by violence and war and the "mighty" who make great noise when they fall. "Even now the ax lies at the root of the trees," echoes John the Baptist in today's gospel. If we are looking for where God's Spirit can be found, however, Isaiah reminds us we will need to look elsewhere. We will need to attend to the quiet, fragile resurrections taking place below the surface when it appears as if all has been lost. If we seek wisdom, understanding, counsel, strength, knowledge, awe, and delight, we will need to look where the little ones of the earth are found. We must have our eyes open for the shoots.

The gospels emphasize that Jesus was one such little one. Although the glory days of his people seemed to have come to a crashing close, they have not. In him, we glimpse the truth that life is stronger than death. We see that the future has not been erased, no matter how terrible the past. In him, we find our hope.

A Note From Our Pastor

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ Jesus,

Last Monday at 5:15 AM my phone began ringing. Thinking it was one of my siblings calling early to wish me a Happy Birthday, I answered the phone in a somewhat sleepy and groggy voice – "Hello". The voice said, "Happy Birthday, I got you a bishop for your birthday!" From a slow and sleepy morning wake-up, I went to full attention saying, "what the (expletive deleted) are you talking about!". It was Fr. Richard Gutierrez calling me with the news of the naming of our new bishop, The Most Reverend Mario A. Alivés, from Brownsville, Texas. It wasn't what I was expecting as a birthday present, but it was a great and pleasant surprise to receive on my birthday. It has been since August 2024 (sixteen months) since Bishop Mulvey had submitted his letter of retirement to the Holy Father. So, we as a diocese have been waiting for the announcement since then. (The Most Reverend Mario A. Alivés's biography is available on the diocesan website.) The installation of our new bishop as the Ordinary of the Diocese

of Corpus Christi is scheduled for Wednesday, January 28, 2026. The location and the time are still

not finalized but I will share them as soon as that information is confirmed.

My actual birthday is December 1st, and the parish celebration for my birthday is this Sunday, December 7th, following the 11:00 AM Mass. I will be celebrating my 70th birthday! Wow! I never really think about my age, but that December 1st morning it struck me with a bit more emotion than I was anticipating. At seventy years old, a priest of this diocese can petition for retirement from active ministry in a parish as a pastor/administrator and can "retire" to the St. John Vianney Residence for Priests in Corpus Christi. It is from that residence that most of the "retired" priests become even more active in priestly ministry as they are constantly being called on to help out in parishes when the pastor goes on vacation or is ill. Msgr. White, Fr. Matthew, and Fr. Jose are some of those retired priests who constantly have helped me here in this parish when I have been away. So, priestly retirement is from administration and not from priestly ministry. Once a priest, you are always a priest! So, whenever I get there, I will continue to celebrate the Mass and the Sacraments.

Those statements may cause the parish some concern – Fr. Patrick is retiring! I am not at this time retiring. There are several factors in motion that are crucial to this parish – namely the "Our Living Church Capital Campaign Building Fund" that we just launched in September, and the naming of the new bishop, and those Master Plan projects that the Capital Campaign is to bring to reality. The first phase is our parish church! The stucco renovation on the exterior of the church building and the stained-glass repairs to the church windows are the largest and most critical projects. We have just started the bidding and contracting process with the Diocesan Building Commission. That process requires the "Ordinary's (Bishop's)" approval and signature to go forward, and since we currently do not have a Bishop, all of that is on hold until the beginning of February. And there is no idea on how the new bishop will be dealing with major construction and renovation projects. These projects of the Capital Campaign have been a long journey to bring to this stage, and it is my intention to see them through to their completion.

So, while I have turned 70, and can petition for retirement, I am not at this time intending to be going anywhere. If that is okay with the parishioners? As always there are so many other details and items in flux, we can never know exactly what will happen, but I am currently looking to staying till these projects are complete.

Dear Padre,

Do non-Catholics go to heaven?

Yes, they do, because of the grace of God at work in his people. To suggest otherwise would seem to imply that Catholics somehow have a "golden ticket," or some kind of right that simply does not exist.

The Incarnation of Jesus healed the division between heaven and earth, a division established by the "sin of Adam" and confirmed by our own lives of sin. Through his passion, death, and resurrection, all has been restored to the manner that the Father first envisioned through his Creation. The division was between humanity and divinity, not between religious practices and divinity. Catholics

believe and celebrate that God accepts all people of a good heart and a good spirit. God is not blinded by the labels that sometimes blind his people to the bigger reality.

When Catholics, or people of any religion, proclaim exclusivity and specialness, particularly when it concerns eternal life, all people should be very cautious about what they assume. To assume a certain type of arrogance to yourself and to your belief and life of faith—that excludes others or separates another as "not one of us" simply has no place in the kingdom of God. .
