The account of the temptations could be presented as a comical play. Pope Francis insisted, “Don’t talk to the devil!” Indeed, Jesus does not engage in dialogue with Satan, much less any negotiation or any business. Stones become bread? Jesus may have fasted for forty days, but he’s had plenty to eat—“every word that comes forth from the mouth of God” (Matthew 4:4). Nor will Jesus “test” his Father by jumping off the “parapet of the temple” (like the bell tower of a gothic church). (See Matthew 5-7.) You don’t play God, and you don’t play with God. Satan really beclowns himself with the last temptation—promising the whole world if Jesus would just take a knee? No one would fall for that, would they?

Except—most of us. We’d do the bread; we’d do the jump; we’d definitely do the world! Look at the first reading, from Genesis. Adam and Eve give up paradise for a piece of fruit! It’s a sad story because Eve does chat with the serpent, answering questions, allowing for a different point of view. But, as they say on Facebook, Satan “destroys” her! And Adam, too. If they didn’t sew fig leaves for each other, the whole story would be unbearable. Even as they realize their sin, there is a little tenderness.

Saint Paul explains it clearly. Sin entered the world, but with Jesus Christ, there is an “overflow” of grace for the many. (See Romans 5:15.) And that’s what Lent is about—a flood of grace. ●

A Note From Our Pastor



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ Jesus,

On the first Sunday of Lent, we hear the Temptations of Christ in the desert. They can be reduced to three main false identities of self – Physical (Bread/Food), Mental (Knowledge/Beauty), and Spiritual (Presumption/Power). These all can be reduced even further into the self-centered sin of Pride. It is Pride that tempted Eve and Adam in the Garden, while human then wanted themselves to not be servants of God but to be like God. Pride is that outward looking of self and comparing myself to everyone else “to be like them” or for them to look “at me”. You could say it like this: “I am the greatest and best in all things and as such I need no one else”. Combating this self-centeredness of “it is all about me” and realizing that I am in an eternal relationship to God as the Father’s created beloved child (son/daughter) is the center of the Lent. These are the three questions of Lent. “What am I?” “Who am I?”. “Where am I going?”. And these reflect directly back to the three temptations.

“What am I?” – A human person whose body needs to be fed and nourished. A human person who comes into life as a baby and needs to be cared for food, clothed, and protected. A human person who has to be taught how to walk, how to talk, and to be educated in so many other ways. A human person who grows up in both physical ways, emotional ways, and intellectual ways. And though we don’t like to discuss it, a human person who ages physically and loses mental capabilities. And we are a human person who has a finite time of life on earth. The temptation for bread manifests those three false identities. On the physical side – the need for nourishment, often food from others. On the mental – without food I will eventually get sick and die. On the spiritual – I have the power to turn stone to bread; I have the power to do it myself and need no one. The more proper response against these temptations of Pride is: As a human person my life has a beginning and an end, my body constantly needs nourishment to live and grow, and as much as I might not think about it, I have no power within myself to overcome these realities of human life. My birth and my life are a gift from God that I need always to be thankful for. God is always watching over my life as it is constantly growing and changing and He provides the nourishment and protection. From my birth and my Baptism, I am on a journey of life toward God (and hopefully Heaven).

“Who am I?” – A human person with finite capabilities and capacities. We are born with a brain and a mind that is eager to learn and comprehend the world around us. A baby that learns it has its own hands and feet, and begins to recognize voices and words. That early learning simply reminds us that on the physical level I must be trained and develop into all of the bodily abilities, and that I must always keep active or I might lose the physical abilities. Mentally, I learn to speak and to think and to remember. While as teenagers we “know everything”, but we realize that even after schooling we are constantly growing in knowledge and abilities for the entirety of our lives. We begin to understand that I can be pretty good in assorted ways, but there is always someone who is better, or later will surpass me. Spiritually, I am not alone, but born into a family, a community, and a world that is outside of myself and with which I live. More properly, I understand that I am not “all knowing”, “all powerful”, nor “eternally infinite”. God is and all that I am, all that I do, and all that I will ever become is given to me and is perfected in my relationship with God – His beloved child.

“Where am I going?” – One of the most constant thoughts in a person’s life is: “Where did I come from and to where am I going?” Maybe you remember a phrase from your mother when you asked as a child where you came from - “From my belly!”. And as we live, there are the millions of times when we are asked, “Where were you born? Where did you go to school? Where are you going to college? Where did you go on vacation? Where are you moving to? Where were you this morning? My favorite question is “Where are you going to eat?”! And so many other “where from” and “where to” in your life. In Lent we reflect that there is a time before I ever was and that I began a journey from the moment of my birth. And as we experience life and death of friends and family, we will eventually begin to ask, “Where am I going after this life?”. Physically we are finite. Mentally we are finite. Spiritually we are finite. (Our soul is infinite; our spirit is not.) As St. Thomas Aquinas states for the existence of God, “If there is a finite, then there must be the opposite an “infinite”. I am finite. Only God is infinite. But we pray, “Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit, who was, is now, and will be forever world without end”. I came from God, and I pray that I am on the path to go to God.

Have a great Lent! Remember your Lenten Promises!


Deacon's Corner

Last Wednesday, on Ash Wednesday, the 18th of February 2026, the Lenten season for 2026 began. The Lenten season has been practiced since the early centuries. The Christian faithful recognized the importance of the death and resurrection of Jesus, and they utilized a suitable period (about four weeks) to reflect on the essential nature of suffering and self-denial for the development of clarity before their baptism at Easter. Lent became a period of fasting, prayer and almsgiving. Fasting really was a submission to the plight of the poor, and it gave us understanding about poverty and the Lord's commands for us to tend to the needs of the poor. The readings for Ash Wednesday are Joel 2:2-18; Psalm 51:3-4, 5-6ab, 12-13, and 14 and 17; 2 Corinthians 5:20-6:3; and Matthew 6:1-6, 16-18. In the second reading read also verse 4 of chapter 6; and, in the Gospel read verses 7 and 8 and 14 and 15 of Chapter 6. The readings for the First Sunday of Lent are from Genesis 2:7-9; 3:1-7; Psalm 5:3-4, 5-6, 12-15, 17; Romans 5:12-19, and Matthew 4:1-11. The Gospel reading is about the temptations of Jesus. Notice how the devil wants Jesus to act only as God and not as a human being because he knows that by suffering and dying, Jesus will defeat him. I do not believe that any other medium has ever expressed that theme more eloquently than the film "The Passion of the Christ" by Mel Gibson. We see the devil meandering in the crowd as Jesus hung from the cross, and the moment that Jesus forgives those who had him killed, the devil goes crazy. That scene was worth the entire movie for me! What should

prayer, fasting and almsgiving lead us to conclude about ourselves? That others are more important than we, and when we discover that truth and take on that attitude, we are truly loving God and neighbor. The main theme of the New Testament is salvation, and that process should lead us to live a life for the Lord and for our neighbors. I think here is what our prayer ought to be for Lent: "Lord, help me to keep in mind all those who are starving in the world, who have nothing to eat, no place to live and no water to drink. Help me to appreciate all the benefits I enjoy, and to give you thanks for all the blessings. Heal me from an unforgiving spirit, a non-charitable attitude, and a reluctance to share my material goods with those who have little or nothing. During this Lenten season, help me to reflect on my shortcomings, my faults and weaknesses, and my sins, especially those sins that affect those around me. Help me to be faithful to the truth of Jesus and the Church and never let me be separated from you. Help me to hold my tongue and not criticize, even secretly, those with whom I do not agree. Help me to decide what is important for my spiritual well-being." We will be having a special event for the sacrament of reconciliation. Be on the lookout for it, and start now to make a list of things that you can discuss with the priest that tend to make you lose your peace. It can be anything: an action, an attitude, a habit, resentment, or a thought that lingers and destroys your peace.

Dear Padre,

I was taught that it is a requirement to fast at least one hour before receiving Communion. However, I've seen donuts out before Mass begins and hear candy wrappers being crumpled around me. This seems disrespectful to me.

It is important to use the correct words when describing a particular action. In this case, "requirement" does not really capture the full meaning and understanding of what the Church teaches. A better understanding is that it is a discipline and a practice of the Church to ordinarily observe the eucharistic fast for one hour before receiving holy Communion. If you are of a certain age, you may remember that there have been changes regarding the eucharistic fast. A "requirement" might suggest that the fast is integral to the sacrament itself. It is not.

The second part of your question seems to be a matter of perception. Based on your perception, you judge something to be not quite right. But, consider that there are many reasons why hospitality may be set up before Mass. The crumpling of wrappers could be something other than what you identify. Regardless, you are not required to assume the burden of policing what is taking place at Mass. It is much better to participate, celebrate, and be grateful for the sacrament that we gather to experience as a community of faith. ●

A WORD FROM POPE LEO XIV

Today, signs of hope are increasingly found in care homes, communities for minors, centers for listening and acceptance, soup kitchens, homeless shelters, and low-income schools. How many of these quiet signs of hope often go unnoticed and yet are so important for setting aside our indifference and inspiring others to become involved in various forms of volunteer work!
