The adoring crowds, chanting “Hosanna to the Son of David” (Matthew 21:9), capture our attention on this Palm Sunday. We hear the crowds, and we rejoice with them. Sometimes, we forget that not everyone in the crowd is joyful. Some are challenged; some are threatened. For them, Jesus is not Good News; he is not the long-awaited one—he is something entirely different, and he must be silenced.

Our Sunday celebration begins with jubilant crowds and ends with a most cruel death. Those who were once joyful are now silent and dispersed. It appears that the authorities have once again triumphed. Hope is dashed. The promise remains unfulfilled.

Spiritually sit with desolation in the week that comes. Do not jump ahead to the triumphant end of the story. It is true that we are an Easter people, but we must also pay attention to the details of how evil often attempts to silence the good. It is important, as people of faith, to remind ourselves that even when all things seem to be lost, the Father has the last word. His will is accomplished. He is the Creator and the author of the story. We should always prepare ourselves to be surprised. To embrace light instead of darkness. And, even when there is death all around us, to know that there will be life—life in abundance for all. •

## A Note From Our Pastor

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ Jesus,

As we come to the end of Lent, we enter into Holy Week and the Paschal Triduum. It is important to remember the early Church traditions and so appreciate the significance and specialness that is the Paschal triduum. Here is a brief understanding of it that I hope will inspire you to attend and participate in the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Thursday, the Good Friday Liturgy on Friday, and the Solemn Easter Vigil on Saturday night.



The followers of Jesus met in secret to pray and celebrate the Eucharist. If you wanted to become a Christian, your journey began on Ash Wednesday when you would formally proclaim yourself a sinner with the imposition of ashes on your head and declare that you would spend the next forty days in prayer and study requesting entry into the church. You were assigned a Sponsor who took on the duty of instructing you in all of the aspects of the Faith, and this was not just for the forty days of Lent, but for the rest of that person's life. This process of entering the Church occurred only once a year starting on Ash Wednesday and ending at the Easter Vigil. If you missed a day of instruction or the Easter Vigil you had to wait another entire year. During this Lenten time, the candidates would only attend the "first part" of the Mass – the Liturgy of the Word, the time of instruction of the Faith, and be dismissed before the people recited the Sacred Creed. Each week of Lent they would be tested (scrutinized) to make sure that they understood the faith and prepare them for the final and sacred instructions of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil. The three days – Triduum means Three Days – were so sacred that only fully committed persons were ever allowed to attend them! And these three days were actually the telling of the last three days of Jesus' life and teachings and the center of the story of salvation through Jesus. As the Paschal Triduum is actually one Liturgy that is told over three days starting on Thursday evening and ending on Sunday morning, it is best to attend all three parts and so to better understand the specialness that is Easter.

Holy Thursday is the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper, remembering the last gathering of Jesus and the Apostles at that final Passover Meal that He shared with his disciples where he washed their feet and instituted the Eucharist. It is the moment on which Jesus bestowed the Priesthood upon the Apostles (and through them down to this century upon all Bishops and Priests). After this Last Supper Jesus goes to the Garden of Gethsemani where he will be arrested and the Apostles and Disciples abandon him.

Good Friday is the liturgy where we remember the Trial, Scourging with the Whips, Crowning of Thorns, the Way of the Cross, and the Crucifixion and Death of Jesus. We spend the time in prayer and remember the vicious treatment of Jesus who had done no wrong but was persecuted none the less. In this liturgy we are asked to learn the lesson, that if we follow Christ, we may also be betrayed and suffer torture and martyrdom for Jesus. And the question is asked, "Would you be able and ready to follow Christ in that same way?"

Holy Saturday we sit in sorrow and in darkness stunned by the Death of Jesus, and at the end of that day we gather around the fire (first century living rooms) and retell the whole story of Salvation from the creation of the World, the Prophets of the Old Testament, the writers of the New Testament and the teachings of who and what the Messiah is. In the darkness of that night, we would remember that Jesus is "The Light" who will dispel the darkness, and we profess our Faith in Him as our Redeemer and through the Solemn Liturgy we would be Baptized (sins washed away), Anointed with Oil (Confirmation), dressed in new long White Garments (our white robes of Heaven) and participate in Holy Communion (uniting ourselves with Jesus at the Last Supper and with the Eternal Baquet in Heaven). And then with the Easter Sunday morning sunrise, we would leave the darkness of our old lives and enter into the Light of a New Day in Christ!

To truly appreciate the glory and blessedness of Easter Sunday, we need to experience Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday, and the Easter Vigil, so I encourage you to make the time to attend these Three Most Sacred Days of the Paschale Triduum.

## Deacon's Corner

Today is Palm Sunday and falls on March 29<sup>th</sup> this year. The readings are from Matthew 21:1-11 (the Gospel reading at the beginning of Mass recalls the entrance into Jerusalem); the First Reading at the Mass, [Isaiah 50:4-7](#); the Responsorial Psalm, [Psalm 22:8-9, 17-18, 19-20, 23-24](#); the Second Reading, [Philippians 2:6-11](#); and the Passion of Christ according to Matthew, [Matthew 26:14—27:66](#). I think the importance of this Sunday lies in the fact that Jesus, the God-man, dies on the cross, a terrible death after a terrible beating, and after all the disciples, except John (in the end) abandon him as soon as Jesus gets arrested. This is the “weakness” of Christianity, the non-Christian world thinks. Jesus cannot be God AND man because you can't kill God. And if we say he's dying, that's a contradiction. That's precisely the nature of the Mystery of Salvation, and the reason for the necessity of the Incarnation. St. Paul's letter to the Philippians demonstrates what is known by biblical scholars as a “Christological hymn,” little poetic or even musical refrains that express a truth from our Catholic Tradition. These “hymns” were incorporated by New Testament writers into the letters or narratives. The first 18 verses of chapter 1 of John's Gospel is such a hymn, called the “Logos Hymn.” Colossians 1:15-20, known as the “Cosmic” hymn, describes Jesus as supreme over all creation and as “head of the body, the church.” Christological hymns were sayings or songs or poems that stated truths about the faith that the people used sort of as a teaching tool, a basic form of catechesis. These hymns

proclaimed the basic truths of the Incarnation and the Paschal Mystery. Eventually, out of these basic truths came the Passion narratives that we have in the four Gospels, with their emphasis on Jesus' death as necessary **before** Resurrection. That is the theology of the Sacraments, one cannot come to life without dying to self first. We cannot enjoy sacramental grace (the life of God in us) without submission which requires repentance, which is dying to self and living for significant persons in our lives, and, of course, living for the supremely significant person in our lives—Jesus. This was the prayer of Jesus at Gethsemane: "My Father, if it is not possible that this cup pass without my drinking it, your will be done!" He said it three times and finally accepted the Will of God. St. Luke writes that Jesus' distress was so severe that he sweated drops of blood. Luke 22:44 (“He was in such agony and he prayed so fervently that his sweat became like drops of blood falling on the ground.”) But see commentary on Luke's Gospel about verses 43 and 44 not being in the original manuscripts of Luke, New American Bible footnotes. But the point is that extreme suffering is a contradiction, and God should not want it for us. And he doesn't, but it is necessary for Resurrection. I hope you're having a great Lenten experience and that your Easter season for the next 50 days after that be full of hope and resolve to live a good Christian life. God bless you. Deacon Cavada

Items most needed are canned meat (tuna, chicken, Vienna sausages, SPAM), canned chili, canned vegetables and fruit, boxed cereal, and snack bars.

All nonperishable items may be placed in the wicker baskets in the church foyer or brought to the parish office beginning through Easter Sunday, April 5, 2026.

# Liturgy & Sacraments

**Anointing of the Sick:** Upon request – please call the office. Any person who is sick (either homebound or in the hospital) or about to have surgery, is encouraged to receive Anointing of the Sick. As current Federal Law prohibits hospitals from the release of any patient's name. Father will not know you are in the hospital unless you call the office.

**Baptisms of Infants: (0 to 5 yrs.):** Please bring the child's civil birth certificate to the parish office to register the child, their parents & the Godparents for the one-hour Pre-Baptismal Preparation Class. Godparents must be able to provide Certificates for Catholic Baptism, Communion, and Confirmation, & if married, Marriage Certificate in the Catholic Church. Donation for the class and Baptism is \$30.00, for the class only is \$15.00. Date & time for the Baptism is scheduled after attending the Baptismal Class.

**Confessions:** The Sacrament of Reconciliation (or Confessions) is available on Thursday from 5:30 PM—6:00 PM and on Saturdays from 5:00 PM—5:30 PM and at any time by appointment with the Priest.

**Quinceañeras:** The honoree and their family must be registered and participating in the parish for two years prior to the year of the Quinceañera (or Quinceañero). The young person must have Baptism & Communion in the Catholic Church, & be attending the parish Religious Education Program. The family is strongly encouraged to contact the Church for **2 years** before the intended date.

**Marriage:** Arrangements must be made with the priest or deacon, preferably one year before the intended date, (minimum of six months in advance) to complete the necessary requirements. At least one person must be an active and registered member of this parish. No wedding date is guaranteed until ALL diocesan requirements have been fulfilled.

**Blessing of Civil Marriages** – If you were married before a judge, or a non-Catholic minister, and wish to be readmitted to Holy Communion, there needs to be a Blessing of your Civil Marriage. Please call the parish office and set up an appointment with Father Patrick so he can hear your particular situation and can guide you through the process. Father Patrick is always saying "Don't wait! Start the process NOW!"

# Dear Padre,

**How do the three sacred oils differ, and how do I dispose of them properly as a sacristan?**

Jesus Christ was anointed priest, prophet, and king. *Christ* means “Anointed One.” The sacred oils assist the members of the Church, who share in Christ’s priestly, prophetic, and royal mission. Catechumens are anointed with the oil of catechumens for God’s help to resist evil, reject sin, and adhere to a lifelong profession of faith as they prepare for baptism. The infirm and elderly are anointed with the oil of the sick to fight against the physical and spiritual debilitating effects of illness through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit. Chrism, the most important of the three, can only be consecrated by a bishop. It is used for baptism (along with the oil of catechumens), confirmation, the ordination of a priest or bishop, and the dedication of a church and altar.

A repository for the oils—often marked *Olea Sanctae* (“Holy Oils”)—is called an *ambry*. It is usually in a prominent church location near the baptismal font. Each year, when the oils are replaced, a priest, sacristan, or other person may absorb the old oil with cotton and burn it in a thurible or as part of the fire that begins the Easter Vigil. With special care, old oil can also be added to a large burning candle, like the sanctuary lamp. Reverence and safety are proper for whatever method of disposal is used. ●
