The invention of the yoke 6,000 years ago marked one of the great advances in human history. The yoke—a wooden beam fitted across the neck—harnessed the energy of two cattle pulling in the same direction, hastening the tilling of soil and transport of goods.

It is easy to see why, among many ancient peoples, the yoke became a symbol of subjugation. When the Roman army won a battle, they forced defeated soldiers to walk beneath a “yoke” of spears to indicate they were now in a state of servitude. The prophet Jeremiah once walked through Jerusalem wearing a yoke to warn the people they were about to be conquered by Babylon.

In Judaism, however, the Torah was also sometimes referred to as a yoke. It was a law to be submitted to, but it also was a way of life that offered an alternative to the cruel “yokes” imposed by kings. The Book of Sirach encourages youth to “Take [Torah’s] yoke upon your neck; that your mind may receive her teaching.... See for yourselves! I have labored only a little but have found much” (Sirach 51:26-27).

It is unclear exactly what Jesus meant when he invited us to accept *his* yoke, but it is likely that he was echoing the invitation of Sirach. He wanted us to know that following God’s law makes it possible for us to work together, accomplishing much that we could not do on our own. And that God’s law is a gentle law—one that enables rather than oppresses. Are you willing to receive Christ’s gentle teaching and make it your own? •

A Note From Our Pastor

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ Jesus,
HAPPY FOURTH OF JULY!



As I was reflecting on this last letter as your pastor and this weekend's holiday, what came to mind was the original intentions of the first colonists from England and the later Declaration of Independence. The earliest populations of immigrants that came to North America from Europe were escaping religious persecution and were searching for a new place to begin a new adventure. There were the Puritan Pilgrims first in 1620 to land in Salem, Massachusetts, then Lord Baltimore and the Catholics in Maryland in 1623, and then in 1681 it was the Quakers in Philadelphia. This is true of most of the original thirteen colonies. But what is more significant about these new foundations was that they all saw themselves as being on a "New Adventure". They did not have any idea as to the new land they were entering into but saw it as a new hope and a new life. These original colonists in America brought little in the way of possessions, but they brought determination and vision. Then after a century and a half under the realm of the King of England, these same colonies united in a new vision to begin a "New Adventure" by declaring themselves independent from the English Crown. And therefore, we are celebrating the 250th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence with parades, firecrackers, concerts, and backyard BBQ's and hot dogs. It is that "new vision" and "new adventure" that inspired the original colonists to come to North America. And this vision and adventure later inspired their descendants to send delegates to the Continental Congress in the new adventure – the United States of America. The visions of a new life, new hope, and a new beginning have remained constant from the first pilgrims to the most recent immigrant to the United States. So, on this holiday, whether our forefathers came in 1620 or 2026, I would hope that we can continue to reflect on the Declaration of Independence that proclaimed "life, liberty, and justice for all" and strive to make it truly an American Experience.

Each time my father came home from work to tell us of his new duty station with the Coast Guard and that we would be moving again (as a child it happened 7 times in 16 years), we usually looked to the ending of school friendships, sorting and packing our belongings, and several weeks of moving from and moving into a new house. And that would bring us some sadness and grief. But then my mother would step in with her maternal instinct to have us begin to see the upside of this change. First, we were to reflect on the great experiences and friendships that we had in our current location (and past locations) and to say thanks to God. Second, we were to remember that we were a family and that we always moved together and supported each other no matter where we were stationed. Third, we would be in a new church building, but we were still Catholics and could worship and pray no matter where we went in the world. And finally, we were to be brave explorers on a new adventure in a new world! Yes, we would look back a little as to our losses and the changes, but we were constantly reorientated to the future and the new adventure. As a seminarian, I had a new adventure every academic year for seven years! As a priest, I have been transferred ten times in the forty-three years. And with each transfer, there has been sadness, but also adventure. I have learned to appreciate each assignment and put everything into my parish duties at that church community. When asked where I was from, I usually answered "Wherever my suitcase is now is my home!" Where I was living was my home! If we are always looking backwards to the previous locations, we miss the excitement of the present assignment. If we are always looking forward to the next location, we often miss the people and friendships that are present in front of ourselves. And that is where I am!

We celebrate the 250th anniversary of that "new adventure" the Declaration of Independence and the kernel of the United States of America this weekend. I am reflecting and thanking God for my eight years as Pastor of St. John of the Cross Church with all the love, support, and happiness that I have received from you - my parish family. I am filled with so many memories that bring big smiles to my face! Please be aware that I keep all of parishioners from all my parish assignments from over the years in my daily prayers and Masses! And while there is a sadness with leaving, I am remembering what my mother said every time we moved – "It is a new vision, a new beginning, a new adventure"! And I do not say – "Goodbye", I say "Adios" – "Go with God until I see you one day with God in heaven".

Deacon's Corner

I want to see if I can cover briefly two feasts today—the 14th Sunday of Ordinary Time and the Solemnity of Peter and Paul, which we celebrated on Monday, June 29, 2026. I won't include the readings for the Solemnity, just the citations. For the Vigil Mass, the First reading was from the Acts of the Apostles, 3:1-10; Psalm 9:2-3, 45; Second reading Galatians 1:11-20, and the Gospel of John 21:15-19, for the day Mass, the readings were from Acts 12:1-11; Psalm 34: 2-3, 4-5, 6-7, 8-9; Second Timothy 4:6-8, 17-18; Matthew 16:13-10. I want to recommend that you read both for a view of the Apostolic Tradition of the Church, the submissiveness of Paul to Peter, and the call of both Apostles, in spite of their weaknesses and faults. The basic message that Paul communicates in Galatians is that God had chosen him and Peter *before* they knew it. Paul says in Galatians in the readings of the vigil: "But when God, who from my mother's womb had set me apart and called me through his grace, was pleased to reveal his Son to me, so that I might proclaim him to the Gentiles, I did not immediately consult flesh and blood, nor did I go up to Jerusalem to those who were Apostles before me; rather, I went into Arabia and then returned to Damascus. Then after three years I went up to Jerusalem to confer with Cephas (Peter) and remained with him for fifteen days." Here is what I take away from the call of Peter and Paul: *The Lord Jesus calls us all by virtue of our Baptism!* We can choose to

answer the call or not. If we do our lives change. If we do not, then we go our way without recognizing him, and we lose because even though he never leaves us, he always gives us a chance to respond while we live. If we die without recognizing him, it's our loss not his judgment that causes this loss. For the 14th Sunday, we get a message about the coming of the Lord of Peace. Zechariah 9:9-10; Psalm 145:1-2, 8-9, 10-11, 13-14; Romans 8:9, 11-13; Matthew 11:25-30. I know this is a lot of reading, but attempt it if you can, and just mediate on the Word at your leisure. Here is what the Prophet Zechariah says: "He shall banish the chariot from Ephraim, and the horse from Jerusalem; the warrior's bow shall be banished, and he shall proclaim peace to the nations." Do you think the world has learned about peace? Peace is the absence of killing in all its forms—the tribal killings of Africa, the cartel killings of Latin America, and the oppressive killings of Asia and the Pacific Rim. Romans talk about abandoning the things of the flesh and seeking the things of the Spirit, and the Gospel talks about the reward of making a commitment to the Lord. "Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am meek and humble of heart; and you will find rest for yourselves. For my yoke is easy, and my burden light." Living the Resurrection brings inner peace that no one can take away. God love you.

Liturgy & Sacraments

Anointing of the Sick: Upon request – please call the office. Any person who is sick (either homebound or in the hospital) or about to have surgery, is encouraged to receive Anointing of the Sick. As current Federal Law prohibits hospitals from the release of any patient's name. Father will not know you are in the hospital unless you call the office.

Baptisms of Infants: (0 to 5 yrs.): Please bring the child's civil birth certificate to the parish office to register the child, their parents & the Godparents for the one-hour Pre-Baptismal Preparation Class. Godparents must be able to provide Certificates for Catholic Baptism, Communion, and Confirmation, & if married, Marriage Certificate in the Catholic Church. Donation for the class and Baptism is \$30.00, for the class only is \$15.00. Date & time for the Baptism is scheduled after attending the Baptismal Class.

Confessions: The Sacrament of Reconciliation (or Confessions) is available on Thursday from 5:30 PM—6:00 PM and on Saturdays from 5:00 PM—5:30 PM and at any time by appointment with the Priest.

Quinceañeras: The honoree and their family must be registered and participating in the parish for two years prior to the year of the Quinceañera (or Quinceañero). The young person must have Baptism & Communion in the Catholic Church, & be attending the parish Religious Education Program. The family is strongly encouraged to contact the Church for 2 years before the intended date.

Marriage: Arrangements must be made with the priest or deacon, preferably one year before the intended date, (minimum of six months in advance) to complete the necessary requirements. At least one person must be an active and registered member of this parish. No wedding date is guaranteed until ALL diocesan requirements have been fulfilled.

Blessing of Civil Marriages – If you were married before a judge, or a non-Catholic minister, and wish to be readmitted to Holy Communion, there needs to be a Blessing of your Civil Marriage. Please call the parish office and set up an appointment with Father Patrick so he can hear your particular situation and can guide you through the process. Father Patrick is always saying “Don’t wait! Start the process NOW!”

Dear Padre,

Is it appropriate to display the American flag in our church?

A diocesan bishop—who often delegates this matter to the discretion of the pastor—determines regulations on whether and how to display the American flag in a Catholic church. Displaying the flag, and a book of remembrance for those serving in the armed forces, seems to have originated in many US parishes during World War II. The practice has continued through subsequent wars and national tragedies.

While the Bishops' Committee on the Liturgy advised that national symbols should not be *permanent* fixtures of a worship space, they may be appropriate at worship services on a civil holiday, etc. This same committee discouraged pastors from displaying the American flag within the sanctuary itself—a space reserved for the altar, ambo, presidential chair, and tabernacle—but instead to place the flag in the vestibule of the church together with a book of petitions for the living and deceased.

Fundamentally, a church building is where the liturgical assembly gathers as one body in Christ—the same Christ of the Eucharist who is beyond time and place, who came to unite our divisions. “The church building is a sign and reminder of the immanence and transcendence of God—who chose to dwell among us and whose presence cannot be contained or limited to any single place” (US Conference of Catholic Bishops, *Built of Living Stones*, 2000). ●
