Put it into practice

Twentieth-century writer Aldous Huxley said of love: "There isn't any secret formula or method. You learn love by loving." At every crossroad, at every bump in the road in your relationships with others, this is a simple truth to put into practice: Learn to love by loving; learn to forgive by forgiving. It isn't any more complicated than that. The choice is yours.

Monday, Feb 09, 2026

Reach out and touch

Who gets healed in the gospels? Mostly it's those who make some small act of faith in Jesus. Today's gospel tells of all the people healed in body and spirit just by touching Jesus' cloak. The gospel points to two elements of spiritual healing: willingness and connection. Before God can do anything for us, we must break out of the paralysis of despair and be willing to reach out. If we make just the slightest move toward God, amazing changes are possible. As Pope Francis explained: "What type of faith is great? Great faith is that which brings its own story, marked even by wounds, and brings it to the Lord's feet asking Him to heal them, to give them meaning." We don't have to do it all, simply reach out and touch Jesus in some way—through prayer, the Eucharist, or service to those in need.

MEMORIAL OF SCHOLASTICA, RELIGIOUS FOUNDER

Sibling solidarity

Saint Scholastica (c. 480-c. 543), together with her brother Benedict, founded the Western monastic tradition. Benedict's rule of life emphasized gentleness and respect, qualities that were evident in the close relationship between Scholastica and Benedict. After adopting monastic life, the two allowed themselves one day a year to visit each other. They would meet at a small cottage halfway between Scholastica's convent and Benedict's abbey. Their great contribution to Catholicism is evidence of the good that can come from a loving relationship between siblings. Consider your own relationship with siblings or other close kin. What can you do today to strengthen those relationships? You never know what great contribution to humanity might result from your efforts!

Wednesday, Feb 11, 2026

Rules to live by

With the season of Lent and its practice of fasting arriving next week, it's a little puzzling to remember that Jesus was a great breaker of fasts and violator of religious food rules—that was one thing that got him into trouble with the authorities. His followers gathered grain on the Sabbath because they were starving. He ate with sinners and outcasts. He simply did not follow the rules, but for a purpose: to show how the rules should not control but rather serve to bring a person into a more loving relationship with God and neighbor. "In Jesus," the Catechism of the Catholic Church says, "the law no longer appears engraved on tables of stone, but upon the heart of the Servant who becomes a covenant to the people, because he will faithfully bring forth justice" (CCC

580). What makes a person holy is not external observance but internal faith and love, which leads to right behavior.
1 Kings 10:1-10; Mark 7:14-23 (331). "[What] goes into a person from outside cannot defile. . . . (Thus he declared all foods clean.)"

Thursday, Feb 12, 2026

How can you say no to a sick child?

Did Jesus think of his own mother as the Gentile woman with the sick daughter argued with him for a healing? Mothers (and fathers) don't want to talk politics and policy when their children are in need. They just want help and they want it now. Such confrontations take place every day in schools, emergency rooms, and social service offices, as parents argue for the well-being of their little ones. "Yes," they say, "I know your mission statement [or charter, or law] doesn't cover this, but my kid is hurting!" Jesus found this a compelling argument. Do you?
1 Kings 11:4-13; Mark 7:24-30 (332). "She replied and said to him, 'Lord, even the dogs under the table eat the children's scraps.'"

Friday, Feb 13, 2026

You've got to want it

Jesus performed many miracles but never did so by force. Neither would he coerce anyone to listen to him, much less to speak up on his behalf. If we choose to ignore the Good News in our own lives, we have the free will to do so. "He who created us without our help will not save us without our consent," says Saint Augustine. It's up to us to say yes to faith, to say yes to the truth of God's love. God would never force you to do so. Faith is freely given and freely exercised. Exercise yours today.
1 Kings 11:29-32; 12:19; Mark 7:31-37 (333). "People brought to him a deaf man . . . and begged him to lay his hand on him."

MEMORIAL OF CYRIL, MONK, AND METHODIUS, BISHOP

Speak the language of love

This is real love: two brothers dedicate their lives to serving a people not their own. Born in ninth-century Greece, Methodius was older and eventually attained the office of archbishop. Cyril, more philosophical, was a linguist and theologian. Both took on the evangelizing of Moravia. There, Cyril devised the Slavic alphabet developed by later disciples and called Cyrillic in his honor. Both brothers fought for Bibles and liturgy in the language of the people. Pope John Paul II declared Cyril and Methodius patron saints of Europe. Follow the example of their love and bring good news to strangers.

As I'm sure most of you know, if you want to make God smile, tell Him your plans!

I know I said last week that we would be back in the sanctuary for Masses this weekend. Well, as you can see, that is not the case. It's a physics problem. No matter what you say, you can't rush the final process of staining and applying three coats of polyurethane. Time will always prevail. So, next weekend we hope to be back, but as you can see, it will be worth the wait to do it correctly.

Our readings this week are a primer on how to move our faith from being strictly an intellectual assent to one of dynamic action. In the first reading, the Prophet Isaiah encourages us to use God's blessings to provide for those in need, to shine the light of truth on oppression, and to be a source of light for those living in darkness.

St. Paul, in his letter to the people of Corinth, presents his case with great humility, letting them know that his words are not his own but the power of God working within and through him. In the continuation of the Sermon on the Mount in Matthew's Gospel today, Jesus lets His disciples (and us) know that they have within them what they need to spread the Good News, using the examples of salt and light to encourage them in sharing this great gift of faith in Jesus with others.

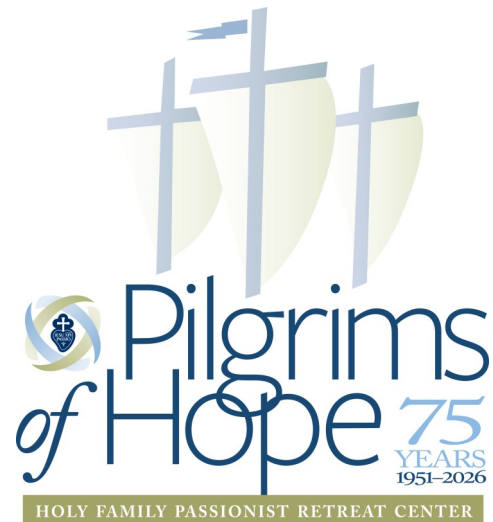


Virtues, Explained!
Goodness

In the beginning, goodness was all there was. And in the end, only goodness will remain.

The word "good" is repeated so often in the first verses of Genesis that it has become almost cliché. God sees what He has made, and He calls all of it "good" (Genesis 1:31). Likewise, on the very first page of the Catechism of the Catholic Church, we read that God created man "in a plan of sheer goodness ... to make him share in his own blessed life." (CCC 1). When we see goodness, we cannot help but think of God (Wisdom 13:1).

In baptism, the Holy Spirit gives us the sanctifying grace of justification, which is, among other things, the ability to grow in goodness through an increase in moral virtue (CCC 1266). Baptism, therefore, disposes us toward goodness, and the more we ask the Holy Spirit for goodness, the more it will be possible for us. ©LPI
