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October 19, 2025 - Twenty-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time (C) Pray Always Without Becoming Weary

Exodus 17:8-13; Psalm 121:1-2, 3-4, 5-6, 7-8; 2 Timothy 3:14-4:2; Luke 18:1-8

Why is it essential for the disciples of Jesus to pray always without becoming weary? (cf. Lk. 18:1). Prayer is the language of our relationship with God. A soul without prayer is comparable to a body without eyes, hands, and feet. Without prayer, the soul becomes weakened and is unable to rise to the heights of heaven. Just as a body without senses is impaired, a soul without prayer is spiritually handicapped, unable to fully experience the divine grace and blessings that God offers.

The importance of praying persistently without becoming weary is hinted at in the responsorial psalm: "Our help is from the Lord, who made heaven and earth" (cf. Psalm 121:2). It is a reminder that our lives depend on the strength of God, who is both the source and purpose of all life. There are particular challenges in life that we cannot overcome on our own; often, we need strength from above to face these battles. This is illustrated by Moses during the conflict with Israel's enemies: as long as Moses kept his hands raised in prayer, Israel advanced better in the fight (cf. Ex. 17:11).

Praying persistently without becoming weary is a transformative way of living in loving attention to God's presence. It's similar to the persistent widow who never gave up before an unjust judge—calling out to God day and night, praying without ceasing before a God who listens and responds to our supplications (cf. Lk. 18:4-7). This persistent prayer has the power to transform our lives and draw us closer to God, inspiring hope and a sense of purpose.

To call on God day and night means to truly desire Him, to yearn for Him with all our heart and soul. God wishes to fulfill the deepest longings of our hearts, such as love, peace, contentment, joy, and other holy gifts, and the greatest gift of all is Jesus: "He that spared not His own Son, but delivered Him up for us all, how shall He not also give us everything else along with Him?" (Rom. 8:32). This is God's self-giving, which is the fulfillment of all fulfillments of our desire.

How can we succeed in praying continually without becoming weary? We can find the answer in the example set by our Lord Jesus. He prayed throughout the day, in the evening, early in the morning, and even in deserted places. At times, he spent the entire night in prayer in specific locations (cf. Mt. 14:21; Mk. 6:46; Lk. 6:12). Prayer was the constant thread of his life; it sustained him, strengthened him, and nourished his union with the will of the Father.

Throughout the life of our Lord Jesus, it is clear that setting aside specific times and places for prayer is essential. We deceive ourselves if we think we can consistently make prayer a natural part of our daily lives without dedicating special time and a particular place for it. The Catechism of the Catholic Church articulates this beautifully, stating that prayer awakens the memory of the heart and is the essence of a renewed spirit. It should inspire and guide us in every moment. However, we often forget God, who is our life and everything to us. We need to remember Him more frequently than we take our next breath. We cannot truly pray "at all times" unless we also pray at specific moments, consciously choosing to do so (cf. CCC #2697).

To pray continually without becoming weary, as our Lord Jesus did, we must set aside

specific times and places for prayer. Prayer is not just a routine; it is essential for nurturing our relationship with God, who sustains every aspect of our lives. A soul without prayer is like a body without eyes, hands, or feet; it cannot reach the heights of heaven. Just as a body lacking the five senses is limited, a soul devoid of prayer is spiritually handicapped and unable to fully experience the divine grace and blessings that God offers.

Lord, we, your faithful, desire to pray always without becoming weary. We stand united in this commitment, seeking your strength and guidance. Holy Mary, Help of Christians, we, your children, entrust our needs to your maternal intercession for the fulfillment of our desire. Amen.

PILGRIMS OF HOPE: LORD, TEACH US TO PRAY!

While our Lord Jesus was praying in a particular place, and when he had finished one of his disciples said to him, "Lord, teach us to pray just as John taught his disciples" (cf. Lk. 11:1).

We may all know how to pray, what to pray for, and when to pray, but when someone asks, "What's the point of asking, 'Lord, teach us to pray?" Consider telling the person that the reason is profoundly deep. It is the reason of the heart! When we say, "Lord, teach us to pray," we beg the grace to speak with God heart to heart, not just with words. It's such a short request—but it opens the deepest desire of our human heart. Because deep inside, every one of us longs to speak with God, not just with words, but with love.


Prayer begins with love, not fear. Our Lord Jesus teaches the disciples the Lord's Prayer, also known as the Our Father. And He starts with one simple word: "Father"—in Hebrew, Abba, which can be translated as "Dad." By calling God our Father, everything changes. We use the familial word to address God affectionately, believing God is not distant but within our reach. He is a loving Father who listens, a Father who cares for his children, a Father who understands our confusions and worries, even our silence. Sometimes, we pray with too many words. But the best prayer is not in the mouth—it's in the heart. It is not when our words are well organized, but when we are humbled. When you whisper "Father" from your heart, you are already praying well

Praying is trusting. Our Lord Jesus says, "Give us this day our daily bread" (Matt. 6:11, Lk. 11:3). Not tomorrow's bread, not next week's, but today's need. Trusting in prayer is not about getting everything we want. It is trusting God for what we need. When we pray, we surrender to God's will. We don't know what tomorrow brings, but we know God's Providence is real. Our Lord Jesus reminds us not to worry about our life, what to eat, drink, and wear, but to trust our Heavenly Father who cares for the birds that don't plant, flowers that don't clothe themselves, and who made the grass green that grows today and gone tomorrow (cf. Matt. 6:25-35).

Often, our prayer of complete trust in God brings us healing; it softens anger, melts pride and heals wounds we thought would never heal. God heals when we fully cooperate with what we are praying for— "Forgive us our sins, as we forgive those who sin against us" (Lk. 11:4, Matt. 6:12). Heartfelt prayer touches the heart and changes us when we learned to let go of grudges and embrace God's forgiving love, for it would be a contradiction to pray "Our Father" sincerely while harboring hatred towards others.

Let us remember that the prayer Our Father is a way of life for God's children. It is humbling to beg with all our hearts: "Lord, teach us to pray."


