November 16, 2025 - 33rd Sunday of Ordinary Time (C) <u>You Will Secure Your Lives with Perseverance!</u>

Mal. 3:19-20a; Psalm 98:5-6,7-8,9; 2 Thess. 3:7-12; Luke 21:5-19

In this Sunday's gospel, our Lord Jesus provides words of warning and reassurance to all who believe in Him: "You will be hated by all because of My name, but not a hair on your head will be destroyed. By your perseverance, you will secure your lives" (Luke 21:17-19).

Toward the end of the liturgical year, before entering the Advent season, the Church guides our minds and hearts to reflect on the end times and to look forward with hope to our Final Judgment. It is an opportunity the Church provides for us to consider this: What is the destiny of human life? What is the end, the goal, and how do we attain it? What can we do to achieve the outcome that God desires for us? What do we hope for?

The images of the destruction of the physical world and the conflict of powers and principalities in our liturgical readings are meant to awaken our faith. In particular, the images of the end times, such as wars, earthquakes, plagues, famines, and insurrections (cf. Lk. 21:5-19), are apocalyptic images intended to reveal something beautiful and important, rather than frighten us. They are meant to help us realize that the powers governing our world—such as dishonesty, deception, corruption, and the destructive force of sin—will eventually come to an end.

Prophet Malachi reflects on this by saying, "For the day is coming, blazing like an oven when all the proud and all the evildoers will be stubble" (Mal 3:19). When judgment arrives, those ungodly people—those who live in lies, deception, greed, and corruption—will face their end. However, those who live righteously and rely on God will experience healing and redemption (cf. Mal 3:20). His message is a call to look forward to God's healing and redeeming acts, to stay alert against the corruption of worldly powers, and not to be deceived by the influences of dishonesty and fleeting comfort, nor to be discouraged by life's trials.

The warning from St. Paul to the early followers of Jesus in the second reading echoes the words of the Prophet Malachi. St. Paul rebukes the Christians of Thessalonica for their complacency, living disorderly, meddling in others' affairs, and being very nosy about others' business. He encourages them to work and never grow tired of doing good for the Lord (2 Thess. 3:7-9). This advice is also for us! We are called to focus on doing good for the Lord instead of wandering aimlessly.

Remember, Jesus has already triumphed over sin through His Passion, death, and resurrection. This victory is available to all His followers; indeed, we all have access to this incredible grace. All the Sacraments we celebrate in the Church are our encounters with the Risen Lord. They are visible signs of God's invisible grace that confer sanctifying grace upon us. Our Lord Jesus never ceases to exist as Emmanuel among us. He, the Word made flesh and who dwelt among us, continues to stay with us through the Holy Eucharist. It is the tangible presence of His promise, "I will be with you until the end of time" (Matt. 28:20). It is the source of our ongoing renewal when accepted in faith.



Yes, through our Lord Jesus, we begin with victory. Let us trust Him and hold on to what He said: "You will be hated by all because of my name, but not a hair on your head will be destroyed. By your perseverance, you will secure your lives" (Luke 21:17-19).

With this confidence, let us nurture it by praying with the Word of God through Lectio Divina. Listening to God's words, especially when facing today's challenges, is essential. "When you say, impossible,' God says, "All things are possible" (Lk. 18:27)." When you say, 'I am tired,' God says, 'I will give you rest" (Mt. 11:28)." When you say, 'Nobody loves me,' God says, "I love you" (John 3:16)." When you say, 'I can't do it,' God says, "I can do all things" (Phil. 4:13)." When you say, 'I feel all alone,' God says, 'I will never leave you nor forsake you' (Heb. 13:5)." When you say, 'I'm afraid,' God says, "I have not given you a spirit of fear" (2 Tim. 1:7)." Fr. PILGRIMS OF HOPE: THE END **TIMES**

The end of the world has been a popular topic throughout history. Many

people dedicate their energy to determining when the end times will occur. Some modern authors have made millions from books predicting the approach of the end. Often, these works convey the message that "You have to be good because the end is near."

It is essential to remember that the timing of the end of the world is a mystery known only to God the Father, not even to the angels in heaven or the Son (cf. Matt. 24:36). Therefore, any claims about knowing the exact date of the end times are simply self-deception.

However, the Catechism of our Catholic Church teaches that the end time is definite, and we are currently in the midst of it. It begins with the resurrection of Jesus and continues until His second coming. But before our Lord's return, the Church will face a final trial, and the faith of many believers will be tested. The persecution during her earthly journey will reveal the "mystery of iniquity" in the form of a religious deception that offers people an apparent solution to their problems but at the expense of abandoning the truth (cf. CCC 675).

As we journey through the end times, we are moving toward the final judgment—the Second Coming of the Lord. This is not a time for fear, but for anticipation, prayer, and hope. We can have faith in this event because we walk in the victory of our Lord —His triumph over sin and death. We are called to remain steadfast in our faith, stay faithful until death, and persevere—knowing that God will reward us with the crown of life at the end. Fr. MAH


