Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica in Rome November 9, 2025 The Church, Source of Life and Healing

Ezekiel 47:1-2,8-9,12; Psalm 46:2-3,5-6,8-9; 1 Corinthians 3:9c 11,16-17; John 2:13-22

Today, we celebrate the anniversary of the dedication of the Basilica of St. John Lateran, a truly magnificent and historic church. The name St. John Lateran, a combination of names, honors a basilica dedicated to St. John the Baptist and St. John the Evangelist that is located on land generously donated by the Laterani family in the 4th century.

Why is the Basilica of St. John Lateran so important?

It is one of the four major basilicas in Rome, along with St. Peter's, St. Paul Outside the Walls, and St. Mary Major. It has also hosted many important Catholic Church councils. For a thousand years, it served as the residence of the Popes before St. Peter's Basilica was built in Rome. It functioned as the Cathedral Church of the Bishop of Rome and was even the Papal Residence before the expansion of the Vatican. It is rightly called the Mother of all Churches, a title that fills us with pride and a sense of belonging.

We celebrate its dedication to honoring our connection with the Pope. It reminds us of our identity as both a local and universal Church. It reminds us of who we are as a church. What is the Church? Who is the "Church"? It is BOTH buildings AND believers.

The liturgical readings depict the nature and essence of our identity as a Church.

The first readings from the Prophet Ezekiel and the psalm depict an image of flowing water. When Prophet Ezekiel prophesied about Israel's return from Babylonian captivity, he described a scene with flowing water. It begins at a temple, where water trickles down from the temple into the Dead Sea, a desolate place. This Dead Sea comes alive — new life appears — with fresh fish and fruit-bearing trees providing food, and the leaves of the trees offering medicine for healing (cf. Ezek. 47:12). Food and healing are connected to the water flowing from the temple. It is the source of life and joy, as highlighted in the responsorial psalm, "The waters of the river gladden the city of God, the holy dwelling of the Most High!" (Ps. 46:5).

This prophetic vision depicts a Church that provides care and renewal to people through her ministry and Holy Sacraments, especially the Holy Eucharist. This nourishment and healing are meant to extend outward, positively influencing the larger community and the world.

On the other hand, we, as a community of believers, are also called the Church. Each of us is a Temple of the Holy Spirit. St. Paul speaks to this reality. Jesus is the foundation of this Temple. The Gospel tells us that His passion, or fervor, for the House of God consumed our Lord Jesus. "Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up" (Jn. 2:19). He was talking about the Temple of His Body.

Through the Holy Spirit, God chooses to dwell within us. Holiness resides in us because we are the temples of the Holy Spirit. We carry and share what is holy inside us. Or better yet, we are carried by God's holiness to others, like waters flowing from the temple.

The holiness of the Church and its members is not just a passive state but a call to action. It is a mission, a divine purpose. Our holiness is a mission to bring the water of life

and healing to the dead seas of the world — the dead seas of corruption, materialism, abortion, addiction, selfishness, brokenness, and all kinds of human iniquities.

We, the Church, exist to evangelize. We cease to be the Church of our Lord Jesus if we fail to evangelize and to care for the poor and marginalized. This is not just what we do; it is who we are, and it defines what the Church is — a beacon of hope and a source of life and healing in a world that desperately needs it.

PILGRIMS OF HOPE:



HOLINESS: PRAYER AND CHARITY

The holiness of the Church is demonstrated by its members. Do you?

In the second century, Aristides, a Greek pagan philosopher, described Christians to Emperor Hadrian. It is worth listening to what this pagan philosopher wrote about Christians. I quote what he said: "Christians love one another. They never fail to help widows. They save orphans from those who would hurt them. If a man has something, he gives freely to the man who has nothing. If they see a stranger, Christians take him home as though he were a real brother. If they hear that one of them is in jail or persecuted for professing the name of their redeemer, they all give him what he needs. This is really a new kind of person. There is something divine in them."

A new kind of person, embodying a divine character—what a beautiful way to describe early Christians coming from a pagan background! This clearly illustrates what St. Paul said: a life lived in the Spirit, not of the flesh, that embodies and reflects Jesus' love for others (cf. Rom. 8:1-17). It serves as a powerful reminder of our dignity as baptized Christians.

The late Pope Francis described what everyone of us should be as a Church — a field hospital — emphasizing our mission of healing and mercy, which involves caring for the wounded and suffering rather than focusing on judgment or strict rules. He said, "If we truly wish to encounter Christ, we have to touch his body in the suffering bodies of the poor, as a response to the sacramental communion bestowed in the Eucharist." Pope Leo XIII strongly affirms this in his first encyclical, titled Dilexi Ti, that charitable works for the poor are "the burning heart of the Church's mission (#15)."

Being prayerful alone is not enough, because prayer without charity is empty, and charity without prayer loses its strength. Our acts of charity reflect the presence of the divine within us through the Holy Spirit. Charity naturally flows from our prayer. The time we dedicate to prayer should never be used as an excuse to neglect our neighbors in need. In fact, the opposite is true. We humbly serve others because we pray. Do you?



Sunday November 16 is the World Day of the Poor, whose theme this year is "You are my hope (Ps 71:5)." In his message for this day, Pope Leo XIV says his hope is that this Jubilee Year "will encourage the development of policies aimed at combatting forms of poverty both old and new, as well as implementing new initiatives to support and assist the poorest of the poor." On this day our diocese will participate in the U.S. Bishops' annual national collection for the Catholic Campaign for Human Development-CCHD. Through this second collection, support for CCHD enables the active participation of those experiencing poverty to address this complex challenge and forge a just hopeful future for all.

Please remember that 25% of the CCHD collection in our diocese stays in Hawaii to respond to challenges of poverty in communities here. CCHD funds donated from our parishes have contributed to a variety of effective community efforts, including helping houseless survivors of natural disasters rebuild their lives; assisting formerly incarcerated or homeless women with transitional housing and job training; and supporting non-profit organizations helping lowincome families build and own affordable housing.

I strongly encourage all to give generously to the CCHD collection as pilgrims of hope witnessing to Jesus, on our journey together toward the Kingdom of God where indeed the Lord will rule the world with justice and the peoples with equity." Driven by a strong desire to provide a space for people of color, free from external prejudice, and to actively work for a more just society, our Catholic organization actively fights for a fair and just society for all.
