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December 21, 2025 - Fourth Sunday of Advent (A) St. Joseph, Teach Us How to Prepare for Christmas

Isaiah 7:10-14; Psalm 24:1-2,3-4,5-6; Romans 1:1-7; Matthew 1:18-24

We now enter the fourth Sunday of Advent! As this final week of Christmas preparation begins, let us look beyond the busyness of Christmas traditions and reflect on the genuine longing of our hearts: finding hope, love, and renewed faith. Let's focus on St. Joseph, whose quiet strength embodies the spirit of Advent.

Although the gospels do not record his words, his role in the great mystery of our Savior's birth remains essential. Besides being a perfect example of fatherhood, he stands as a remarkable symbol of greatness in anonymity. In today's world, where the culture of recognition often outweighs true virtue, Joseph's quiet dedication can inspire us to embrace our own subtle acts of courage and faithfulness.

In the Gospel, we learn how Joseph prepares for the mystery of our Savior's birth. He did not yet know that Mary conceived the Son of God by the Holy Spirit after the angel Gabriel's announcement. Still, he could not believe Mary had done anything wrong. We can assume he struggled to understand Mary's mysterious pregnancy. His response to this unexpected event is worth our reflection. Being upright, he only thought of what was best for Mary. He decided to divorce her quietly, knowing the scandal would fall on him for abandoning Mary during the betrothal period (cf. Mat 1:19). While this may have seemed like the most reasonable and loving choice, he changed his mind after a dream. He could have dismissed it, but instead, he listened to God's voice through an angel in a dream. His response shows his attention to spiritual matters and his discernment of God's will.

Often, it is the gift of faith in God that motivates a person to wake up and do what is right. St. Joseph showed us the way. He woke up and followed the angel of the Lord's guidance.

Waking up means being attentive to divine guidance, whether by listening to our conscience or seeking advice from others. It also involves recognizing that many opportunities exist instead of dwelling on failures, and that when we encounter a dead end, there are other paths to explore, and you will find them! Waking up means acknowledging that there are good people who can help lift the burdens that weigh us down—be humble and ask for help! Waking up is to prevent darkness from spoiling your dreams, and failures from robbing your future—have faith! Waking up means avoiding others' criticisms and discouragement from the joy of giving and serving — to wake up is to focus on Jesus! Isn't this what Christmas is really about? Jesus is central, our hope, joy, and salvation.

On the other hand, we often wonder: "What will we receive this Christmas, and who will give us the best Christmas present? Where will we celebrate? What will we eat?" Instead, consider asking: "What do I need to wake up from? Where do I need direction?"

During this final week of Christmas preparations, as we make this celebration memorable for our families by preparing gifts, food, decorations, and sending greeting cards—let us also keep in mind the spiritual side. Advent is meant to awaken us and call us to change our hearts. If we get our houses ready but neglect our

hearts, if we decorate but do not turn back to God, we may celebrate Christmas but miss Jesus Christ. Our Lord Jesus came to save us from sin and open the way to new life. We are already living that new life. But, we also live in a world full of sin; some may have entered our lives unnoticed. An important part of our Christmas preparations should

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include the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Christ came to bring healing and salvation, and we experience both through this Sacrament.

Let's turn to St. Joseph and ask for his intercession to prepare our hearts with faith, so we are worthy to receive Jesus. Let us make this Christmas a holy celebration and experience the gifts of healing and salvation that only Christ can give, making it a grace-filled moment of peace, reconciliation, and love.

May our hearts awaken with hope and our spirits rise in joy. Let every step we take reflect the light of faith as we embrace this sacred season with love and grace. St. Joseph, pray for us! Amen. Fr. Manny Hewe, Pastor



PILGRIMS OF HOPE:

On Keeping the Christmas Blessing Alive: Being a Blessing and Blessing Others

The word benediction comes from 'bene' for good and 'dictio' for words. When we speak good words, we become vessels of blessing, echoing the generosity God shows us. We bless others because we share in the cup of blessing and the bread of life, reflecting the heart of our Lord. Kind words flow from hearts nourished by the Word and the Sacraments. I

hold to the truth that our mouths reveal what fills our hearts. So, what dwells within us? To make blessing a habit, begin each day with a quiet moment of gratitude and offer a simple blessing for those around you. Before you speak, pause for a brief prayer, inviting love and compassion to shape your words.

Looking back, I remember comforting a grieving friend with heartfelt words and a scripture that gave him peace. That moment showed the quiet strength our words can have. I also recall a time when frustration caused me to speak harshly, leaving me with regret. These experiences motivate me to tend my heart, filling it with love and understanding.

Gossip and rumors are shadows that dim our ability to bless. When we spread them, we wound others and ourselves. Cursing, the opposite of blessing, harms both our community and our relationship with God. Sometimes, evil slips quietly into our words. We must look inward. To resist gossip, steer conversations toward hope, or seek wisdom in prayer. By choosing uplifting words and asking God for guidance, we become beacons of blessing instead of harm.





EXPLANATION OF THE CO-CATHEDRAL OF ST. THERESA'S 95TH PARISH ANNIVERSARY LOGO

The Co-Cathedral of St. Theresa Church (CCST) was founded on July 19, 1931, and was later elevated to the status of a Co-Cathedral on July 28, 1985. This elevation was a significant recognition of our church's pivotal role in the diocese, allowing us to share in the spiritual leadership of the larger community.

This year, 2025, marks the 94th anniversary of our beloved Co-Cathedral of St. Theresa Church since her foundation, a testament to the dedication and faith of our community. In 2026, it will be her 95th, as highlighted in the anniversary logo, a milestone of our shared journey and a celebration of our unity as culturally diverse people of God. Our shared history and faith bind us together, making us part of something bigger than ourselves.



THE BREAKDOWN



The logo's expanding circular orange image, transitioning to yellow, symbolizes our parish's remarkable growth in liturgical, sacramental, and social ministries. This growth is a tangible sign of the fruits of the nourishment we receive through the Most. Holy Eucharist and the enduring presence of the Holy Spirit. It is also a testament to our unwavering commitment and dedication to our faith.



The church figure within the circle symbolizes our humble dependence on God. It represents the church as a body, with Christ as its head, in whom we live, move, and have our being (cf. Acts 17:28). This figure serves as a visual reminder of our collective reliance on God's grace and guidance in all aspects of our church life and mission.

The shade of blue lines of the church building emphasizes trust in divine providence and the love for Jesus exemplified by St. Therese of Lisieux. Her life and teachings, particularly her 'Little Way' — a path of spiritual growth that emphasizes doing the small things with great love, even in the face of difficulties and challenges — serve as a model for living our faith and our love for Jesus. This 'Little Way' is our way in responding to the church's perpetual invitation to come and adore the Lord, 'venite adoremus,' which finds its completion in our active participation in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. It is a spiritual heritage of the Co-Cathedral of St. Theresa, which we are grateful to be part of, and one that will continue to shape our growth as children of God, Pilgrims of Hope, yearning for the treasures of heaven.
