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December 7, 2025 Second Sunday of Advent (A) Renewing Hope in God's Redeeming Works

Isaiah 11:1-10; Psalm 72:1-2,7-8,12-13,17; Romans 15:4-9; Matthew 3:1-12

We all have stories of how our Lord has saved us. Can you remember a time when God saved you? Maybe you were protected from an accident, faced overwhelming debt, or struggled with addiction. Many people say, "I can't believe I survived that painful moment! I don't know how I got through such a tough time. Our flight was turbulent, but we landed safely. I thought I would fail the exam, yet I passed. If I hadn't listened to my parents, I wouldn't be where I am today." If we succeed in life, reach our goals, and find peace, it's often because of God's grace, for He is Immanuel—always with us. He has the power to turn the impossible into the possible and to bring peace into our lives.

The stories we heard on this Second Sunday of Advent depict challenging circumstances, but something hopeful, beautiful, and unbelievable happened. They reveal God's mysterious ways, encouraging us to remember, reflect, and pray!

In our first reading, the Prophet Isaiah speaks during a time of turmoil in the Davidic dynasty, when the kings had become corrupt and notoriously weak-willed. He prophesies, "A shoot shall sprout from the stump of Jesse, and his roots, a bud shall blossom" (Isaiah 11:1). This is a powerful image! Against the backdrop of the northern kingdom's decadence, where only two kings—Hezekiah and Josiah—emerged as nobles since the time of David, and both died young, Isaiah foretells that new life will arise from the dead stump, bringing salvation to all.

He tells the people that the Spirit of the Lord is upon him and that he will be filled with the spirit of wisdom, understanding, counsel, strength, knowledge, and the fear of the Lord—qualities that the previous kings lacked (cf. Isaiah 11:2-3). The hope for peace was born amid this turmoil, driven by this promise. Who would not dream of what Isaiah proclaims?

It would have been unimaginable for Jews and Gentiles to be reconciled, as one group considered themselves favored by God while the other was viewed as outsiders. St. Paul believed that both groups needed God's mercy (cf. Rom 15:7-9). He argued that all people are saved through faith in Jesus, not merely because they are Jews by birth or due to their good works and obedience to the Torah. Unfortunately, this belief led to him being ostracized by his Jewish friends, who saw him as a traitor.

One of the great ironies of faith is that the Gentiles welcomed the Gospel message with joy and accepted it, while the Jews, who should have been the first to believe, rejected Jesus. This irony is shown in our Lord's words: "The first shall be last, and the last shall be first." These profound truths about God's saving work remind us that God can and will save us in His timing. He bestows upon us the gifts of reconciliation and unity through our Lord Jesus.

St. John the Baptist, in our Gospel reading, challenges us to remember, reflect on, and pray for God's saving actions. His message is clear: "Repent, for the Kingdom of God is at hand" (Matthew 3:2). He criticizes the Pharisees and Sadducees, stating, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath? Produce good fruits as evidence of your repentance" (Matthew 3:7-8). While this is not the message typically seen on holiday cards or in TV commercials this season, this is not the message typically seen on the second of th


that merely belonging to the right group does not ensure salvation. Without repentance and the fruits of righteousness, a person may face serious consequences. John the Baptist expected the Messiah to judge sinners with fire. Instead, Jesus overcame sin and saved sinners through His death. What Isaiah prophesied is now true—Jesus is our peace!

During the "Fraction Rite," the brief yet meaningful act of breaking the Holy Eucharist while singing the Agnus Dei serves as a reminder that Christ's body was broken for us. When the priest elevates His Body and Blood and says, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world," it emphasizes that Jesus, who died for us, has risen to grant us new life. These words and actions highlight God's cleansing power and remind us that we cannot truly experience the joy and peace of Christmas without recognizing our need for a Savior.



PILGRIMS OF HOPE:



The Sacrament of Reconciliation is an encounter with God's boundless mercy. It frees us from our sins and encourages us to show the same compassion and forgiveness to those who wrong us. Through this sacrament, we are empowered to forgive others. It helps us better understand the Prayer of St. Francis, which says, "It is in pardoning that we are pardoned."

Jesus entrusted the ministry of reconciliation to the Church (cf. Mat 18:18). This sacrament is a gift from God that allows the forgiveness of any sins committed after Baptism. In confession, we have the opportunity to repent and restore our friendship with God. It is a sacred moment when we enter His presence and honestly admit our sins, especially mortal sins. Through absolution, we are reconciled with God and the Church. This sacrament reminds us that we cannot live without God: "In Him, we live and move and have our being" (Acts 17:28).

Before going to confession, take some time to prepare. Begin with prayer and reflect on your life since your last confession. Consider how you may have, in your thoughts, words, and actions, neglected to live by Christ's commands to "love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind" and to "love your neighbor as yourself" (Matthew 22:37-39).
