

July 13, 2025 - 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time (C) <u>The Good Samaritan: From What Must I do to What Must I be?</u>

Deuteronomy 30:10-14; Psalm 19:8,9,10,11; Colossians 1:15-20; Luke 10:25-37

The question posed by the scholar of the law, "Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" invites profound reflection on the nature of love, community, and our relationship with God. Eternal life, in this context, is not just about life after death, but a life lived in full communion with God, a life of love, joy, and peace. At the heart of our Lord's response is the parable of the Good Samaritan, a parable that transcends cultural boundaries and challenges societal norms. The Samaritans, who were despised by Jews for allowing themselves to be influenced by the pagan practices and beliefs of a foreign ruler, demonstrate that anyone, regardless of background or status, can embody compassion and mercy.

What the Good Samaritan did, Jesus challenges us to do the same (cf. Lk. 10:37). No practical teaching of our Lord Jesus more accurately defines a Christian than the image of the Good Samaritan going out of his way to help a person in need. He illustrates that true discipleship is not merely about adhering to rules or religious observances but rather about embodying love in action.

St. Paul reinforces this idea by proclaiming Jesus as the image of the invisible God, a living embodiment of divine mercy and compassion (cf. Col. 1:16). In Christ, we witness a model of compassion that invites us not only to believe but to practice what we preach. St. Paul embodies this by declaring, "It is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me" (Gal. 2:20). His transformation reflects the call to live in a manner that exemplifies Jesus' love, a transformation made possible by the indwelling of the Holy Spirit. This Spirit empowers us to love as Jesus loved, to be good neighbors and champions for those facing hardships.

In the parable, Jesus emphasizes that love should be our guiding principle. When our neighbor is in need—a woman, a child, a man—the question transforms from "Who is my neighbor?" to "How can I be a neighbor?" The need takes precedence over analysis. Every act of kindness towards those suffering, regardless of their identity, becomes an act of service to Christ himself. This shifting perspective deepens our understanding of who our neighbors truly are, urging us to be vigilant and compassionate in a world often plagued by suffering and indifference.

Reflecting on this parable compels us to reevaluate our approach to love. Instead of asking, "What must I do?" perhaps we should ponder, "What must I be?" Jesus invites us to first accept His love, allowing it to transform us. We will never learn to love unless we first learn how to receive love.

The parable of the Good Samaritan reveals that the Good Samaritan represents Jesus Himself, and the victim symbolizes humanity. Jesus has attended to our needs, reconciled us with God through His crucifixion, and welcomed us into His Church, our sanctuary. Consequently, we are entrusted to embody and enact His love.

When we humbly receive His love, we learn to be good neighbors and champions for those facing hardships. The call to love is not burdensome; it becomes a source of joy and fulfillment.

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In conclusion, inheriting eternal life is about our commitment to embody the love we have received. As we engage with the world around us, let us embrace the Spirit of the Good Samaritan. Remember, each act of kindness offers a glimpse of eternity, a testament to the transformative power of Jesus' sacrificial love in our lives. When we live His love, we not only fulfill our divine purpose but also participate in creating a community bound by compassion and grace.
