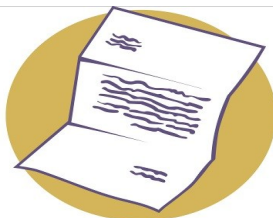

From Pastor Marissa Becklin

Marked with Water, Named with Love

January in the church year always brings us back to the waters.

On the First Sunday after Epiphany, we celebrate the Baptism of Our Lord—the moment when Jesus steps into the Jordan River and joins a line of ordinary, broken people seeking repentance and renewal. John's baptism was meant for sinners, and yet Jesus wades in anyway. The heavens open. The Spirit descends. And a voice declares, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."

It is a striking beginning to Jesus' public ministry: not with a miracle or a sermon, but with water and a promise.

That promise matters deeply in a world like ours. Baptism does not remove us from the brokenness of life. It does not protect us from grief, injustice, illness, or fear. Jesus' own baptism did not spare him from the wilderness, the cross, or death. Instead, baptism names us within the world as God's own—claimed, beloved, and sent.

In baptism, God does not say, "Nothing bad will happen to you." God says, "You belong to me. I am with you. And even here—especially here—I will bring life."

At the font, the church confesses something bold and countercultural: baptism is not our declaration about God; it is God's decisive declaration about us. This is why we baptize infants.

In a culture that prizes choice, agency, and understanding, infant baptism proclaims that God's grace does not wait for our maturity, our knowledge, or our consent. God acts first. God claims first. Long before we can believe about God, God is already faithful to us.

Luther insisted that baptism is not merely a symbol of human faith, but a means of grace—a concrete place where God binds God's promise to ordinary water and speaks forgiveness, life, and salvation into a real body, in real time. Infants do not bring belief to baptism; they are brought into belief. Faith, like life itself, is received before it is ever articulated.

To baptize a child, then, is not to presume future faith but to trust the promise God has already made: that the Holy Spirit is at work creating faith where and how God wills. The child's life will include doubt, struggle, and resistance—just as ours does. But baptism anchors that life not in the strength of human faith, but in the unwavering faithfulness of God.

In baptism, God names even the smallest among us as beloved, forgives sin before it can be named, and incorporates the child into Christ's death and resurrection before they can understand either. This is not sentimentality. It is a confession that salvation is sheer gift.

Every time the church pours water over an infant's head, it preaches the gospel in its most distilled form: we are saved not by choosing God, but because God has chosen us.

This January, that truth feels especially close to home as we recently brought our son Nels to the font. Like every child baptized before him, he did nothing to earn God's love. He did not understand the words or the promises being spoken over him. And yet God spoke anyway. God claimed him anyway. God said, "You are mine."

That is the heart of Lutheran baptismal theology: grace first. Always first.

January is often a season of resolutions and self-improvement, but the church offers us something deeper: remembrance. To remember our baptism is to return again and again to the truth that our lives are held by God's mercy, not our own perfection.

As we begin this new year together, may we remember the waters that have marked us. May we trust the voice that still speaks over us: Beloved. Claimed. Sent. And may we live boldly into that promise—for ourselves, for our children, and for a world that desperately needs good news.

January Worship

Baptism of Our Lord Sunday, January 11, 2026

Isaiah 42:1-9; Psalm 29:1-11; Acts 10:34-43; Matthew 3:13-17. In the waters of the Jordan, Jesus is revealed as the beloved Son of God. Through this great epiphany, Jesus fulfills all righteousness and becomes the servant of God who will bring forth justice and be a light to the nations. In the waters of baptism we too are washed by the Word, anointed by the Spirit, and named God's beloved children. Our baptismal mission is to proclaim good news to all who are oppressed or in need of God's healing.



Second Sunday After Epiphany Sunday, January 18, 2026

Isaiah 49:1-7; Psalm 40:1-11; 1 Corinthians 1:1-9; John 1:29-42. Today's gospel opens with further reflection on Jesus' baptism. He is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world and the one anointed by the Spirit. In the liturgy we come and see Christ revealed among us in word and meal. We go forth to invite others to come and worship the Holy One and to receive the gifts of grace and peace made known among us.



Third Sunday After Epiphany Sunday, January 25, 2026

Isaiah 9:1-4; Psalm 27:1, 4-9; 1 Corinthians 1:10-18; Matthew 4:12-23. Jesus begins his public ministry by calling fishers to leave their nets and follow him. In Jesus the kingdom of God has come near. We who have walked in darkness have seen a great light. We see this light most profoundly in the cross—as God suffers with us and all who are oppressed by sickness, sin, or evil. Light dawns for us as we gather around the word, the font, and the holy table. We are then sent to share the good news that others may be “caught” in the net of God's grace and mercy.



February Worship

Fourth Sunday After Epiphany Sunday, February 1, 2026

Micah 6:1-8; Psalm 15:1-5; 1 Corinthians 1:18-31; Matthew 5:1-12. Who are the blessed ones of God? For Micah, they are those who do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with God. For Paul, they are the ones who find wisdom in the weakness of the cross. For Jesus, they are the poor, the meek, the merciful, the pure in heart, the



peacemakers, those who mourn, and those who hunger for righteousness. In baptism we find our blessed identity and calling in this counter-cultural way of living and serving.

Fifth Sunday After Epiphany Sunday, February 8, 2026

Isaiah 58:1-12; Psalm 112:1-10; 1 Corinthians 2:1-16; Matthew 5:13-20. Light shines in the darkness for the upright, the psalmist sings. Isaiah declares that when we loose the bonds of injustice and share our bread with the hungry, the light breaks forth like the dawn. In another passage from the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus, the light of the world, calls his followers to let the light of their good works shine before others. Through baptism we are sent into the world to shine with the light of Christ.

FUEL Council Members Present

Tim Wise, Terry Burkholder, Scott Gola, Bob Gates, Kelly Leshner, Adrienne Arment, Rich Billings, Carol Wallace and Pastor Marissa Becklin.

Devotions

Scott Gola gave the devotions. He spoke about the color blue and what it means for Christmas. He reminded us that the gospel says that blue means peace, hope, and joy. Scott read several scriptures regarding the birth of Jesus. Matthew 1:18-25 and Isaiah 9: 6-7. Scott followed the scripture readings with prayer.

Treasurer's Report

Scott Gola presented the account balances. Main Checking Account, \$116,701.00; Money Market account, \$75,115.00; Endowment Account, \$80,035.00.

Scott reported that offerings over this past year were slightly higher than the year before.

Budget Discussion

The Council members reviewed the Proposed Budget with Scott leading the discussion. It was noted that the Evangelism budget was slightly increased and so was the Technology budget.

The Council discussed giving Shirley Sweigart a bonus. Kelly Leshner made a motion to give a bonus of \$2,000.00 to Shirley Sweigart. Bob Gates seconded this motion and all Council members were in agreement to give this bonus to Shirley.

Special Speaker/Guest/Kitchen Safety

Mitch Arment and Tim Hegeman spoke with the Council members regarding ideas to ensure safety in the kitchen when using the stove. Mitch presented the Council with a checklist of Standard Operating Procedures for kitchen use.

The idea of using a calendar to keep track of who is using the kitchen and when it is being used was discussed.

Each member of the Council was provided with a document to review regarding standing operating procedures for a kitchen.

It was decided that further discussion will need to take place regarding the calendar for the kitchen use and a checklist for kitchen safety.

Tim Wise, Council member, discussed the possibility of purchasing a fan to be used with the stove to ensure that gas would be vented outside.

Pastor Marissa recommended that the Property Committee continue to investigate and discuss the best solution for oven/stove safety.

Pastor's Report

Misson and Ministry Highlights: Pastor Marissa reflected on what a blessing it is to be back at FUEL and expressed her gratitude to everyone for all of their prayers and support.

Congregational Challenges: The safety of the kitchen and developing a calendar for kitchen use.

Prayer Priorities: Gerry Philips, Nina Mayhew

Council Action/Discussion: The Council members reviewed the agenda for the upcoming Congregational Meeting. This meeting will be held December 14 after the church service. After reviewing and discussing the agenda, Scott Gola made a motion to accept the agenda as presented. Adrienne Arment seconded this motion. All of the Council members agreed to accept the agenda for the Congregational Meeting. Four new members will be joining the congregation soon: Rita and Jon Dienst; Karen and Jim Larson.

Endowment Committee Information: The Council members reviewed the grant request for the Endowment Committee to give \$1,000.00 to the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank. Scott Gola made a motion to modify the amount of the grant to \$5,000.00. Kelly Leshner seconded this motion and all Council members agreed to a grant of \$5,000.00 to the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank.

Committee Highlights:

Property Committee - Tim Wise

A handrail for the stairs leading to the pulpit is needed. The Property Committee is developing a plan for this. A handrail will also be needed in the sacristy.

The sound system needs to be inspected and possibly repaired/updated.

The contract for the Stain Glass Window project will be signed after the project is approved by the congregation.

Peter's Porch - Terry Burkholder

The month of November saw a big turnout in regards to the number of families receiving food from the monthly distribution.

Anticipating another busy Peter's Porch this Saturday.

The Boy Scouts will be assisting with pushing carts on Saturday, December 6.

Fellowship - Carol Wallace

The Christmas Movie Night will be held Monday, December 29 with more information to follow.

We are need of someone to lead the Fellowship Committee. This can be one person or a small group of people. The congregation has been informed of this need.

Social Ministry—Rich Billings

The Christmas Card List for shut-ins will be available this Sunday.

All of the tags on the Giving Tree were distributed. Gifts should be purchased, wrapped and placed under the tree by Sunday, December 14. (5 families will be given gifts and food items this year)

Old Business

Rich Billings presented information regarding an AED to purchase. He provided Council members with documents to review for two specific AEDs made by Zoll. The pricing for the recommended AED would be \$2,307.00. This AED can be used with adults and children. Training for AED use will be available at the Ephrata Recreation Center and Rich will provide information about the date and time for this. It was suggested that Rich Billings attend an upcoming Endowment Committee meeting and request a grant for the purchase of an AED for the church.

New Business

The Council members said goodbye and Thank You to Kelly Leshner for her years on Council. This was her last meeting.

Meeting was adjourned at 9:15pm following the Lord's Prayer.

Congregational Annual Meeting Sunday, December 14, 2025

Council president Terry Burkholder called the meeting to order. The meeting was held after the 9:00am Worship Service. Pastor Marissa led the congregation in prayer. Carol Wallace, Council secretary, read the minutes from the December 8, 2024 Congregational Meeting. Barry Martzall made a motion to approve the minutes as presented, seconded by Terri Kilrain: motion carried.

Election of Congregational Council Members took place with the following members returning to serve in 2026: Scott Gola, Terry Burkholder, Tim Wise, Rich Billings, Bob Gates, Adrienne Arment, and Carol Wallace.

The following member has been nominated to serve on the Church Council beginning in January 2026: Terri Kilrain. There were no additional nominations from the floor. Todd Stewart made a motion to elect Terri Kilrain to the Council, seconded by Dawn Frees: motion carried.

The 2026 Budget was shared with the congregation. Scott Gola began by thanking all those who have supported him in developing the Budget. He mentioned that the church's expenses are in line with the revenue. He also stated that the 2025 Budget year marked a continuation of steadiness of finances for the church. No questions were asked regarding the Budget. Bruce Carpenter made a motion to accept the Budget as presented, seconded by Todd Stewart: motion carried.

Pastor Marissa presented information regarding the Endowment Committee. She referred to a list

of grants in the report that the Endowment Committee had granted this past year with a total of \$20,500.00. Pastor Marissa explained how often the Endowment Committee meets and how they review grant requests. She encouraged the congregation to ask for assistance writing a grant request if they have a specific need in mind. It was reported that the Endowment Committee will be matching the donations received for the Stained Glass Window project.

Scott Gola requested that Pastor Marissa explain the gift policy when persons choose to donate money to the church without any specifications for how the money is to be used. Pastor Marissa explained the policy and informed the church members that a copy of the gift policy is available in the Church Office. Pastor Marissa stated that a gift that is received with a specific request for how the monies are to be used is always honored.

An update regarding the Stained Glass Window project was provided by Pastor Marissa. She started by explaining that the scope of project and cost of the project had changed since the last Congregational Meeting in December 2024.

One group of professionals will be completing the work. The congregation was informed that they would need to approve up to \$70,000.00 for the project. The Council has designated \$10,000.00 for the project. This money had been budgeted for manse upkeep and since the church does not have a manse, the Council agreed that this money should be used for the windows. The Stained Glass Window project is slated to start this spring and the work will be completed by Castle. Pastor Marissa and Terry Burkholder thanked the Property Committee for all of their hard work in the past year regarding this project. Kelly Leshner made a motion to move forward with the Stained Glass project, seconded by Rich Billings: motion carried.

Terry Burkholder thanked everyone for their support of the church and the Council.

Barry Martzall made a motion to adjourn the meeting, seconded by Lisa Gable: The meeting was adjourned.
