


LITURGICAL NOTES

Marian hymns are Christian songs of praise and devotion dedicated to Mary, the mother of Jesus, used in Catholic, Orthodox, and Anglican traditions during services, especially in May (Month of Mary) and for Christmas; popular examples include "Ave Maria," "Salve Regina," "Immaculate Mary," and the ancient "Magnificat," focusing on her purity, Queenship, and role as Mother of God.

Popular Marian Hymns

- **"Ave Maria"**: Variations by Bach/Gounod, Schubert, and traditional plainsong versions are common.
- **"Immaculate Mary"**: Also known as the Lourdes Hymn, celebrating Mary's Immaculate Conception."
- **"Salve Regina" (Hail Holy Queen)**: An ancient antiphon, used in liturgy for centuries.
- **"Magnificat"**: Mary's own song from Luke 1:46-55, a foundational Marian hymn.

Salve Regina: This beautiful hymn is also known by its English name Hail Holy Queen. In 1218 the Cistercians adopted it as a daily processional chant and in 1251 as an ending to Compline. The Dominicans and the Franciscans also adopted it around this same time and the Carmelites used it for a while in place of the last Gospel at Mass. Pope Gregory IX (1227-1241) ordered it to be chanted after Compline on Fridays. From the 14th century down to today it has been a part of Compline for the Latin Rite. Traditionally this antiphon is recited at Compline from Trinity Sunday until Advent.

The Magnificat (Latin: *[My soul] magnifies*) — also known as the *Song of Mary* or the *Canticle of Mary* — is frequently sung (or spoken) liturgically in Christian services. It is one of the eight most ancient Christian hymns and perhaps the earliest Marian hymn. Its name comes from the first word of the Latin version of the canticle's text, which is taken directly from the Gospel of Luke (Luke 1:46-55) where it is spoken by the Virgin Mary upon her visitation to her cousin Elizabeth.

Ave Maria (Latin for "Hail Mary") refers to the traditional Christian prayer to the Virgin Mary, famously set to music by composers like Franz Schubert (as part of "Ellen's Third Song") and Bach/Gounod, becoming a beloved sacred piece for weddings, funerals, and worship, though it also refers to other works, places (Ave Maria University, Ave Maria, FL), and even a 1984 French film.

The Prayer

- **Origin:** Derived from the Biblical greeting of the Angel Gabriel to Mary.
- **Text (Latin):** Ave Maria, gratia plena, Dominus tecum. Benedicta tu in mulieribus, et benedictus fructus ventris tui, Iesus. Sancta Maria, Mater Dei, ora pro nobis peccatoribus, nunc et in hora mortis nostrae. Amen.
- **Meaning:** "Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee. Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen."

“The Hanging of the Greens”

“Greening of the Church” in the Episcopal tradition refers to two main things: a beloved annual holiday tradition of decorating with evergreens for Advent/Christmas, and a deeper commitment to Creation Care/environmental justice championed by groups like the Green Caucus, focusing on stewardship of God's creation through advocacy and action. The holiday practice dates back centuries, symbolizing life in winter, while the modern movement integrates ecological mission with faith, influencing policy and parish life.

The Holiday Tradition (Greening the Sanctuary)

- **What it is:** A joyful, community event where volunteers decorate the church with garlands, wreaths, and trees using fresh evergreens (pine, holly, ivy) for the Christmas season.
- **When:** Typically, on a Saturday in early December, before Advent/Christmas services.
- **Why:** Evergreens symbolize victory over winter and eternal life, a tradition with ancient roots that early Christians adopted to signify Christ's presence.
- **How:** Parishioners gather, hang greens, make arrangements, share cookies and cider, and create a festive, fragrant atmosphere.
